# Grow operations, impaired drivers, and complaints keep police busy

Police were kept busy over the past week dealing with grow operations, theft of a sign from a bed and breakfast on Stewart Road, several noise complaints, abandoned vehicles, impaired drivers, and unwanted guests on private property.

Last Tuesday, RCMP executed a search warrant at a residence on Rourke Road. Inside the residence, police discovered a marijuana grow operation. Police seized marijuana plants, growing equipment, and a sum of cash.

Joseph Polishchuk, 22, has been charged with marijuana cultivation and possession of a controlled substance for the purpose of trafficking. He was released on a promise to appear in court on September 11, 2001.

On Friday, a 31-year-old Salt Spring female was issued a 24-hour suspension when she was observed turning from Purvis Lane onto Lower Ganges Road. The vehicle had crossed the lane divider and entered the oncoming turning lane.

The vehicle was released to a sober passenger to drive home.

Later in the evening, the same vehicle was observed stuck and abandoned in a ditch with the front of the vehicle blocking a roadway. The vehicle was towed from the scene.

On Saturday, RCMP observed a 1986 Dodge Aries speeding on Long Harbour Road. The 20-yearold Salt Spring Island male advised police that he was giving two females a ride home. An odour of liquor could be detected coming from the vehicle, so the male was issued a 24-hour prohibition from driving.

On Sunday, police attended a complaint of suspected illegal harvesting of shellfish. Investigation revealed that the subject harvesters were in possession of the correct permits for harvesting shellfish at this time.

Early Monday morning, police observed a vehicle failing to stop at a stop sign on McPhillips Avenue. The vehicle was checked and the officer could smell an odour of liquor from the driver. A 24-hour suspension was issued to a 19year-old male driver from Alberta.

Police remind visitors to Salt Spring Island that camping is permitted only in designated facilities. These include Ruckle Provincial Park and several private camping facilities. The names of these are listed in the Salt Spring Island telephone directory.

They also remind vehicle owners that if vehicles are broken down, they must not be left blocking driveways or roadways, and must be attended to for removal or repair as soon as possible, or the vehicle may be towed.

# Nurses consider protest resignations

As the government's 50-day cooling-off period for B.C. nurses draws to an end August 8, with no satisfactory resolution in sight, angry nurses indicate they are ready to resign.

Over the past 40 days, since the government-imposed ban on the nurses' job action, there has been little progress in the way of meaningful talks between the Nurses Bargaining Association (NBA) and the Hospital Employers Association of BC (HEABC).

According to Sharon Armstrong, BC Nurses Union(BCNU) local shop steward, HEABC'S latest offer is virtually the same as what was offered to the nurses on June 5, an offer

that was overwhelmingly rejected by 96 per cent of nurses.

"Nurses feel this is a fight for health care. Lots of people are blaming nurses for delays in the system but in our feeling, the situation will only get worse. Nurses are retiring, or leaving for Alberta and the States. It's not just the money. It's also the state of health care in this province. Nurses don't want to work under conditions where they can't provide the standard of care that people desire".

According to Armstrong, the NBA has made some movement on their part to negotiate.

"We've reduced our wage request from \$38 an hour for a level 6 nurse to \$35. We've offered to suspend one of the concessions, the designated days off for part timers for the life of this agreement, in order to help solve the immediate nursing shortage and we have agreed to have a joint committee look into the issue of overtime. We feel we've made some movement but HEABC hasn't moved at all," said Armstrong.

Armstrong has spent the last week in and around Victoria, handing out printed packages of HEABC's latest offer at work site meetings. She confirms that nurses, including some on Salt Spring, are seriously considering handing in their resignations.

"It's a struggle," says Armstrong. "I really enjoy my job and I don't want to leave. It's a big step." Never before has she seen so many nurses angry and seriously contemplating taking that kind of personal risk.

On July 19, the BCNU launched a patient's hotline in an effort to learn more about how the nursing shortage is affecting the public.

The union is also asking the public to assist them in resolving the dispute by contacting their MLAs and encouraging them to help negotiate a satisfactory contract with the nurses.





# More watershed funding

Two years and \$300,000 later, the Salt Spring Island Preservation Society and its partners, the Save Salt Spring Society and the Salt Spring Appeal are winding down their latest campaign to save the Maxwell Lake watershed. The latest bulge in the collective purse comes from Manulife Finance, who announced a donation of \$150,000.

The campaign, which was designed to purchase watershed lands from the Texada Land Corporation, drew support from across Canada.

Donations, in the form of money and pledges, came not only from Islanders, but also from people who just wanted to help.

A small and innocuous looking, hand-written envelope appeared in the Water Preservation Society mailbox containing a cheque for \$2,000. The donation was from a retired couple in Victoria who wanted to "help preserve the water-shed of Maxwell Lake".

A month ago, the society received a postal money order for \$5 from a woman in Ontario who wrote to sav how much she enjoyed visiting Salt Spring, and that she wanted to "help keep Salt Spring's water pure and clear.

Ordinary people have supported the cause and have helped the society surpass their original goal of \$250,000. Just last week, Manulife Finance, which holds the mortgage for Texada Land Corporation, gave \$150,000 for the purchase of trees in the watershed. -

"It was a way for them to give back," says Karen

Hudson, the executive director of the Salt Spring Island Conservancy.

Now, the task is to convince the provincial government to contribute money towards the purchase of the trees on the 110-hectare (270 acres) parcel of land.

"We're certainly hopeful that the government will be inspired to help us purchase the trees," said Tom Gossett, of the Salt Spring Water Preservation Society. "The land is spoken for and we will close that fairly soon. The campaign is winding to an end, but we're still short of our \$100,000 commitment."

The society still needs to raise \$7,000 to meet its overall goal of \$100,000 toward the purchase of the Rippon Creek watershed with about a month to go in the campaign.

The purpose of the on-going campaign has been to help the North Salt Spring Waterworks District purchase watershed lands from the Texada Land Corporation. The \$650,000 purchase price of the Rippon Creek land does not include the standing timber on the property.

District ratepayers will be making up the difference of \$350,000, from taxes, tolls, and deferred projects.


Last year, the water district announced an agreement to purchase 50 acres of primary lakeshore watershed property for \$437,000. Partners in this purchase were the SSI Conservancy, \$33,000; SSI Appeal, \$17,000; the Water Preservation Society, \$100,000. The waterworks district ratepayers contributed the balance of \$287,000. Obtaining this strategic parcel for the community, the southeast corner of Maxwell Lake, has been a goal of the WPS for almost 20 years.

All of this complements the June 21 purchase of 250 hecatres of eco-reserve by Forest Renewal BC and the Nature Trust of B.C. This eco-reserve links another 32-hectare Garry oak ecoreserve with Mount Maxwell Provincial Park.

The total amount of funds to save the watershed of Maxwell Lake raised by public appeal, so far, is an impressive \$443,000. Add \$637,00 0 of water district ratepayer participation, and the total is an eye-popping public contribution of \$1,080,000, said Hudson.

To raise the \$7,000 the society still needs to meet its commitment of \$100,000, they are holding a dance with a Celtic band from

# Sea lice allegations rebutted

In a report issued to the Barnacle by Linda Sams, Senior Aquaculture Biologist for Marine Harvest, the B.C. Salmon Farmers Association stated its skepticism regarding recent news releases from B.C. environmental groups blaming salmon farmers for an alleged large scale outbreak of sea lice in wild salmon.

The report states that, BCSFA members "had not recorded any increase in sea lice infestations at farm sites in the area."

Calling the news releases "poorly substantiated", the report, which originated from DFO's Pacific Research Station, went on to say that a survery had been conducted between June 29 and July 4, 2001 in the area off Northern Vancouver Island where a coalition of environmental groups and First Nations claimed to have observed an unprece-

dented sea lice outbreak.

A total of 53 trawl samples were taken by Canadian researchers on the commercial trawler Caledonia as part of a larger project surveying the juvenile salmon population in the coastal waters for future stock and catch estimates.

More than 1,000 coho, chinook, sockeye, pink, and chum were captured and examined during the sur-

Of the 102 pink salmon captured, 88 fish had no sea lice present, 12 fish were infected with one sea louse, and two fish were infected with two sea lice. Ninetyone of the pink salmon showed no visible external damage. The remaining 11 pink salmon had varying degrees of external damage of which nine cases could be attributed to a sea lice infestation.

Inasmuch as pink salmon are particularly susceptible to sea lice, DFO officials have speculated that increased pink salmon populations may lead to elevated sea lice populations.

The B.C. Salmon Farmers Association reports that their farmers monitor their fish stocks for sea lice on an ongoing basis, and though the farm salmon are prone to infestations, the naturally occurring parasites are always transferred from wild stocks to farm stocks.

Although survey work is ongoing, a preliminary report from DFO's Juvenile Salmon Survey in the Broughten Archipelago and Northern Straight of Georgia concludes that "these data suggest that sea lice infestation of pink salmon is not significant in the survey area.

"We are now able to demonstrate that these claims do not appear to be supported by fact," Anne McMullin, Executive Director of the BCSFA told FIS.com. "The preliminary report supports our initial scepticism to the environmental groups' allegations that salmon in any of our members' farms were causing a sea lice problem," Mcmullin said.

"BC salmon farmers react promptly whenever legitimate questions are raised with respect to the environmental impacts of our operations," she said. "We are pleased that the DFO assessment of this matter strongly supports the conclusion that last month's allegations were unfounded, and we look forward to receiving a final report later in the summer." Anne Mc-Mullin concluded.

Rusty Smith of the Salt Spring Aquafarm said, "We do regular weekly testing for sea lice-there are no unusual or adverse levels of infestation. We've got no

# Pulp mill working on environmental standards

Norske Skog, in their commitment to minimize the impact of their operations on the environment, have been successful in registering for the ISO 14001 standard for environmental management.

Norske Skog's Crofton Printing Papers, and Vancouver Fibre Supply Operations, join the Crofton Pulp Operation, and Elk Falls Pulp and Paper Operations in registering to ISO 14001.

ISO 14001 is a standard set internationally which requires participating organizations to identify and continually reduce their impacts on the environment. their efforts in reducing air emissions, says Michelle Vessey, company spokesperson.

"Plans are in place for collecting TRS gases which are typical pulp mill odours," she said. "They are being burned in recovery boilers.'

She said the company is spending \$17 million by February 2002 to curtail particulates, like ash fallout. The company is focusing Another \$22 million will be

spent to install a new precipitator to contain their particulate emissions to far below the permitted levels.

To develop the Environmental Management System, Norske Skog employees identified the actual and potential environmental impacts of their operations and worked with management teams to find ways to prevent and reduce

# Museum holds part of Island's history

Bittancourt House, built in 1884, one of Salt Spring's historical buildings, sits in a field that is part of the Farmer's Institute property at 351 Rainbow Road..

The original owner, Estal Bittancourt, was a Portuguese immigrant and one of the first settlers of

Now the quaint white and red house is a museum managed by John Fulker, a director of the Farmers Institute.

The museum relies entirely on its volunteers and members of the local Historical Society for its sup-

Local history unfolds everywhere within the walls of the museum. Antiques, old photos, and memorabilia of every description line the walls and fill the broadplanked hardwood floors. An oak hide-a-bed stuffed with horse hair stands beside an ornately carved old organ. All the items are donated; a wicker baby cra-

dle, a wooden butter churn, old typewriters, and cameras. A glass display case holds Native artifacts of stone arrowheads, and

carved wooden spoons.

Our early settlers were primarily farmers. A hand written poster reads: "It meant slow hard work to clear a homestead from the forest, felling trees, burning them, and digging among stumps."

The tools attest to the claim of hard labour. A buck saw, sickle, draw bar, branding iron, and assortment of axes speak of toil and sweat. A rusty tin lantern conjures images of struggle in blustering nights. There are mechanical sheep shears operated by two people. One person cranked the handle and the other did the shearing.

One item is unidentifiable. It is an ominous black case lined with green fabric holding strange glass containers and other objects. It is thought to be holding some sort of medical instrument. A note on the box reads, "If you know what this is and know how to use it, let us know.'

An old fiddle, cotton bloomers trimmed with fine lace and weary chests all hold their stories. An orange gas mask from World War I reminds us of the many Island men who did not return.

Many items originated in other countries and were brought to the Island by families when they settled


By 1895 the population of 45 was very diverse. Faces of people long forgotten in black and white photos wearing long dresses and high starched collars stare

at their visitors with somber expressions.

Museum tours often consist of school children, tourists, and special organized groups. The museum

encourages more visitors and will be open during the Garlic Festival, remaining open on week-ends for the duration of the summer and the Fall Fair weekend.

So some small-minded denize, of the Island makes a conscious move to destroy something so



Harry has incorporated a whole new generation of equipment, along with the very latest knowledge of exercise principles and techniques, to come up with a world-class, advanced holistic fitness facility.

Employing the latest studies and recommendations from the World Organisation for Reviving Knowledge, Harry is taking a bold step in attempting to change our view of exercise.

At South End Fitness, you won't find the traditional machines that you would see in a typical fitness facility. Stair climbers, for instance, have been replaced by fixed vertical climbing de-

This ingenious, lightweight, portable apparatus can be carried and

in the orchard. Once set in place, the user then simply climbs up and down the twelve

steps repeatedly.

Here's where the holistic training approach comes in: the step-climbing device includes a piece of equipment called a Systemic Activity Container. Prior to beginning the climbing exercise, the user selects two containers and places one over each shoulder (mounted crosswise so they won't slip off during the workout). When the user reaches the top step, they then begin an aerobic stretching exercise which involves alternately reaching out as far as one can with each arm and retrieving small roundish objects, tens of thousands of which have been randomly placed throughout the facility (by God knows who, but Harry swears it wasn't him).

Once the Systemic Activity Container is full, the user steps back down the vertical climbing device (using a whole different set of muscles than were used for the climb up). At this point in a typical program, Harry melds an aerobic walking exercise with a free-weight workout.

The Systemic Activity Containers now weigh about 20 kilos each. According to Harry, this added weight create a new acronym made from that provides an additional cardio-vascular

placed anywhere benefit of approximately 65 per cent to this exercise. The circuit takes the person from the base of the climber, along a well-designed track where balance testing obstructions have been placed at very precise intervals-similar to the tires you've seen in the movies, strewn around the ground on those Army obstacle courses. At the far end of the course, the user sets down the full containers, picks up two empty ones, then retraces their steps back to the climbing device. Because the containers are empty for this part of the exercise, participants are encouraged to run this portion.

Harry says he's amazed at the progress of his first customers. "So far, I've tried to find customers who've never been to a fitness facility before, so I can be the first to teach them just how beneficial regular exercise can be. Some of these people are actually carrying 3-or even in one case, 4-Strategic Activity Containers during their workout.

In an interview last week, Harry mentioned that he's having trouble with the concept of what to call his customers.

Says Harry, "Client' sounds way too uptown and 'user' has a whole different meaning in some circles. The folks coming here are all 'dedicated users of precision equipment', so we might phrase to honour them."

Although many adults are familiar with CPR training, CPR for infants is not as commonly known. The volunteer firefighters are now offering to teach basic life saving skills, including CPR, to all parents of newborns. Classes are set to be-

# There was relevance in Beatlemania

whose news featured more bloody protest, more strikes, and more of the sort of evidence that the world has progressed, if that is the word, from warring among nations to warring amongst ourselves, it was the state of George Harrison's health which most claimed my attention.

Why the life or death of an ex-Beatle should matter in this mad world is a good question. I doubt George would think so. However, we are a culture keen for the marking of the ends of eras.

A great many people of a certain age have a favourite Beatle. Often their Mop Top of choice is a pretty accurate clue as to personality type.

Ringo for compassionate nurturers; Paul for sentimental extroverts; John for those who would actively defy any societal or outward structures or the individual; and George for inner-searching introverts.

The Beatle myth-making machine has been in operation more or less steadily for nearly 40 years.

Like snow-making machines, the apparatus goes into heavy production each year before Christmas This is a benefit for the Ono) themselves, of course, but also

for the entire industry that feeds off them. I would argue too, that it is important for us.

For all of the excesses of the post-Beatlemania factories, there remains the essential kernel of their relevance: they epitomized the grailseeking mythos which underwrites our civilization. They were, are, examples of Joseph Campbell's Hero Myth, three or four, if you include Ringo, individuals who undertook personal journeys, braved perils and returned with knowledge to serve as a boon to

their community.

Sure Beatlemania has its source in great rock 'n' roll and legions of girls experiencing spontaneous orgasm, but in a remarkably short period of time George was experimenting with the sitar and eastern mysticism, and John was penning a song inspired by the Tibetan Book of the Dead.

Paul's thing was to forge a sort of bridge between the conventional, classical, and the modern, by employing more traditional lyrical themes, along with strings, and piccolo trumpets, and the like. It is no accident that he became the wealthiest of the four; he became the interpreter of the new world to the old and vice versa.

John expressed the

dilemma, still bedeviling us today, between the activist approach to societal change through Revolution, ("when you talk about destruction, don't you know that you can count me out-in"), and a more individual peaceful path to human progress in All You Need is Love.

The great shame in John's murder is the sense that he was never quite able to resolve that conflict. He, we, needed more time.

George on the other hand seems clearly on the side of personal growth. Within you, Without You, My Sweet Lord, and even Taxman, express a wry individual's quest for individual freedom as well as inner peace. For George, fundamental change must come from the self.

These were important journeys the Beatles embarked upon all those years ago, as relevant to us today as they were then. For this they are entitled to their wealth, and to the immortality afforded them by their music.

And yes, when one of them is ailing it is legitimate news.

The Beatles, I think, have always represented our better selves and sometimes our better selves are conflicted. They expressed that too.

But they also express something more about us and that is that one individual or a small group of individuals can exert a powerful influence to exact positive change. Or at least to try.

# **ArtSpring receives** additional funding

Last Thursday, Art-Spring's executive director Paul Gravett received confirmation that the British Columbia Gaming Commission had approved funding for ArtSpring to the tune of \$48,500.

"I couldn't be happier, " said Gravett. "I began working on this application about nine months ago, so it has been a long time com-

ing."
The funding will make it possible for ArtSpring to improve the existing lighting in the exhibition areas and theatre, to purchase audio/visual equipment, and to acquire furnishings for a public lounge in the lobby.

Additionally, the gaming commission has allocated funds towards ArtSpring's community events, such as the annual Christmas Sing-Along and Canada Day celebrations.

This grant also provides the resources to produce informational material that will be key in marketing and developing ArtSpring.

"We need to get the word out how great ArtSpring is, and we can't do that without the right tools," said Bob Weeden, chair of the Development Committee.

This project is also being supported by grants from

the Victoria Foundation and Gulf Islands Community Arts Council.

"Perhaps best of all, we now have the money for a complete sound system in the theatre," says Gravett. "This has been at the top of the wish list for awhile.

Summing up the reactions from the directors of the Island Arts Centre Society, President Victoria Olchowecki said, "This grant is good news indeed. It is vitally important that Art-Spring be able to grow and develop and this grant will enable us to improve the services we offer to the community. This will take ArtSpring to an entirely new level."

The British Columbia Gaming Commission receives funds through lotteries and bingos throughout the province, and has a mandate to monetarily support community enterprises.

ArtSpring's volunteers and staff are busy organizing their next big event-the Festival ArtSpring. The event will feature performances throughout August, all of which focus on Baroque.It opens with a gala on August 3 with guest violinist Kai Gluesteen performing Vivaldi's Four Seasons. Concert at 8 p.m.

"That makes me feel very, very good," he said. "It's nice to be appreciate. It strengthens the feeling of doing it."



# Interesting B.C. information in annual statistics report

The 2000 Annual Report of the British Columbia Vital Statistics Agency was released by the Ministry of Health Services.

The report provides vital statistics and population health status indicators based on registrations of births, deaths, and marriages in the province.

These data show trends in natural population growth, total fertility, infant mortality, and the health of British Columbians.

The information is widely used by regional and provincial health-care planners and managers.

The report includes these kev findings:

There were 40,467 live births to B.C. residents in 2000. The rate of 10 live births per 1,000 residents was the lowest to date.

\* The infant mortality rate dropped to a record low of 3.7 per 1,000 live births from 3.8 in 1999.

 There were 27.273 deaths of British Columbia residents in the province, down slightly from the previous year.

The 2000 death rate was 6.7 per 1,000 people, the lowest to date.

° The three leading causes of death among British Columbians were cancer, cardiovascular disease, and cerebrovascular disease, responsible for over 60 per cent of deaths in the province in 2000.

About 28 per cent, or 7.507 deaths, were due to cancer, and 25 per cent, or 6,827 deaths, were due to heart and other cardiovascular diseases.

Stroke and other cerebrovascular diseases were responsible for about 8 per cent, or 2,207 deaths.

° In 2000, 5,514 deaths were attributed to smoking and 1,689 deaths were directly or indirectly related to alcohol.

There were 1,493 deaths from accidents and violence among British Columbia residents. This was the leading cause of death for all age groups under 45, excluding infants.

Suicides and motor vehicle accidents each accounted for almost a quarter of the deaths.

Accidental falls accounted for about a fifth of deaths.

Accidental poisoning accounted for about a sixth of

° A total of 22,074 couples married in 2000.

The marriage rate has declined in the last two decades from nine marriages per 1,000 people in 1980 to 5.4 in 1998, 1999 and 2000.

The average life expectancy in British Columbia was 79.5 years for 1996-2000. For females, life expectancy was 82.2 vears; for males, it was 76.8

The 2000 Vital Statistics annual report is believed to be one of the first publications providing medical information using the most recent World Health Organization's International Classification of Diseases coding scheme (ICD-10), which includes extensive changes for selection of underlying causes of death.

Births, deaths and marriages on a typical day in British Columbia in 2000:

•111 babies were born. 57 males and 54 females, of which 53 live births involved maternal complica-

38 babies had perinatal complications; 26 were cesarean deliveries;

8 were pre-term; 6 were low birth weight babies;

5 were born to teenage mothers: 21 were born to mothers

35+ years old; 3 were multiple births;

8 stillbirths occurred every 10 days.

•75 people died. Of these, 39 were male and 36 were female.

26 deaths were the result of diseases of the circulatory system including:

19 from cardiovascular diseases, and 6 from cerebrovascular diseases;

21 deaths were the result of cancer including:

- 5 lung cancer
- 2 colorectal cancer - 1 breast cancer
- 1 prostate cancer

15 deaths were attributable to smoking.

7 deaths were the result of diseases of the respiratorv system, including three from pneumonia/influenza and three from chronic lung disease.

Four deaths resulted from accidents and violence including:

- 1 suicide
- 1 motor vehicle accident
- -1 homicide every 10

5 deaths were alcohol-related, 1 directly and 4 indi-

1 death was drug-induced;

2 deaths resulted fromo diabetes;

1 death was from

Alzheimer's disease and other senile dementias; 3 deaths every 10 days

were from HIV disease; 4 infants died every 10

•60 marriages were solomnized: 34 were civil ceremonies, and 26 were performed by religious representatives;

36 marriages were couples where both parties were marrying for the first time. Two teenage couples married every 10 days.







Recently, this very danceable blues band played to an absolutely full and enthusiastic house at the Vesuvius Inn.


To end the summer concert series, well known local musician, Vaughn Fulford. and the Folke Fiendes, will take the stage August 25.

# Dean's art full of symbolism

Accomplished local artist Diana Dean previewed her latest works, A Gulf Island-A Painter's World, in her studio last Friday.

The moody, rainy day helped emphasize the brilliant use of colour in the large paintings on the exterior of her studio and whet the appetite for the visual experience to come.

Each painting, full of life and rich symbolism, is different in its depiction of light and dark and each contains an underlying story of a journey of discovery.

The main bodies of her work are of metaphoric figures depicting human experiences that draw the viewer in. Intimacy is evoked by each character's intense, expressive eyes, and subtle nuances.

"What I know about life takes on a visual story," explains Dean. "The stories are of this world but also of another world."

Her work has been slowly evolving over 40 years, the

first 10 years of which were devoted to sculpture.

She is in her studio every day studying the effects of light, and to be present to the intuitive current of emotion and spirit that flows from the subconscious. She confesses to a deep connection to her Salt Spring surroundings, Mount Maxwell

# We find ourselves in an adventure story with Island Anthony Bruce's latest thriller

Anthony Bruce's third book, A Lie to Comfort the Dying, is a thriller; in the tradition, it's a good story, full of mystery, suspense, false identities, revenge, and love. It's a story, too, of commitment to a cause, however misguided that cause may seem to those not so committed. With each step these characters take, the walls narrow on either side like a funnel, reducing their choices and leading to their various

In Tehran, a plan is made to kill an author, living in London, who has written a book even more blasphemous to the Prophet than Rushdie's The Satanic Verses.

Nick, who lost his beloved wife and child in the fighting in Serbia, has now pledged his loyalty to the Muslims who rescued and cared for him when he was horribly wounded. It is he who has been assigned to carry out this killing, aided by his backup and his control.

The writer, Talawi, is a dismiss. They are killers,

acter, handsome and talented, but self-centred and arrogant. He is uncooperative with the British operatives, finding the opportunity to seduce the woman assigned to protect him to be the only interesting aspect of the circumstances.

Vancouver is chosen as a temporary hiding place for the writer, and once Nick, Talawi, and the protection team have all reached Vancouver, the various threads of the story come together quickly. Nick and Anne meet, and everything is changed irrevocably for everyone involved. Bad timing and bad luck bring about the end. Well, not the real end; there is a second ending that may well be another beginning.

The three men in the assassination team, Nick, his backup, and his control, are strong and sympathetic characters. All terrorists, each has come to these horrors in a different way, and their stories are difficult to

less than attractive char- in one way or another, but they are impossible to judge out of hand.

The novel ranges back and forth across the world, from Israel to Tehran to Corsica to Vancouver and, finally, for a little while, to Salt Spring Island. Island readers will recognize Island people and places, as well as a few names-some really themselves, and some borrowed for the use of fictional characters. It's

Anthony Bruce has lived on Salt Spring Island for over a decade. He and his family had spent years in either rented houses or company houses provided wherever Bruce was working, until finally, tired of living in other people's places, they found Salt Spring, where they have now made their home.

His careers have included soldier, surveyor, and commercial pilot, whence comes the background for his books. He began writing with articles for flying magazines, and now that he has settled down here, we have the novels.

Bruce's travels and abundant experience have given him the perspective needed to give his characters life and depth. A Lie to Comfort the Dying is a good story, full of people and places I was immediately able to see and hear for myself. It's left me wondering, though, how I will now read newspaper accounts of the sort of things Bruce writes of in this book.

# Monkeybone not for kids

Monkeybone is very clearly a Tim Burton production, filled with creepy characters, twisted black sets, and a very morbid sense of humour.

The Boreas String Quartet will be performing works by Erwin Schulhoff, a composer born in 1894 who died in a concentration camp in 1949.

"We found the music through the Terezin Chamber Music Foundation in Boston, says Boreas' second violinist David Visentin. "It's mind-blowing, I couldn't believe the depth and genius behind it."

Schulhoff, says Visentin, was a part of the wonderful 1920s. He was a soldier in WWI and became demoralized and shattered by his experiences and leaned towards Communism as a philosophy.

"He was a typical Bohemian, and little by little, as the Nazis encroached on Czechoslovakia, it limited his ability to perform.

He's a 20th Century composer who was brilliant and nobody knows who Schulhoff is," said Visentin.

Along with the work of Schulhoff, the quartet will be performing works by Haydn and Beethoven.







# A capella group sings in disharmony

Who needs drums, guitar, bass or trumpet when you can emulate those instruments with vocal manipulations on the microphone, providing both the music and lyrics to the song? m•pact, the five-man Seattle a cappella group, made their second Salt Spring appearance Friday at Art-Spring, travelling light on instruments but strong on vocal ability. The group showed off strong voices ranging from bass to a near soprano.

While members of mopact were impressive for their considerable talent, individual style, and showmanship, the performance fell short. In some of the selections, created a jarring and discordant effect. The voices were over amplified, particularly for such a small venue, creating a bombardment of sound, which was almost cacophonous at times.

The more mellow slow tempo songs seemed better suited to the group's abilities and strengths. In its renditions of the Earth Wind and Fire tune, A Land Called Fantasy, and Miles Davis's, Shades of Blue, mopact produced a more melodious melding of sound. A medley of Prince songs gave the group an opportunity to highlight harmony and rhythm. An original mepact composition, A Mile in My Shoes,

overzealous back-up vocals was one of the more pleasing pieces, in which four singers really sang back-up to the lead vocals rather than detracting from them.

The arrangement of another original piece, Hold on My Heart, also was mellow and conducive to harmony. But in this song, as in most of their original pieces, the lyrics were hackneyed, peppered with tired cliches.

Most impressive was the singers' ability to create the sounds of instruments with their voices. The most talented of the group, Jake, created the sound of drums and harmonica, and convincingly made the sound of a record being squeaked back and forth on a turntable. Although his singing and vocal versatility made him stand out, even his solos went on too long, and the novelty had worn

The group's style is reminiscent of Manhattan Transfer, with the contemporary technique of beat boxing thrown in. Young and somewhat unpolished, mepact would do well to look for material better adapted to their capabilities. Turning down the volume would also be an improvement. Some of their improvised gyrations detracted from the performance.

Going to the concert with high expectations, I was disappointed, but most of the full house appeared to be much more receptive, even giving the group a standing

Salt Spring Island's Second Annual Garlic Festival is, in the words of organizer, Kristie Straarup, "a celebration of garlic.


Planned for harvest in early August, the festival will bring together vendors eager to display their offerings of fresh, braided, and pickled garlic.
