We enter this month on our eighth year of publication.

In our first issue, seven years ago, we noted among other things that the "Joan" was likely to be withdrawn owing to the competition of the "Mary Hare," also that there were already prospects of erecting a Public Hall, and a possible school house at the Divide; the autumn had been unusually dry.

SALT SPRING ISLAND.

Llewelyn Wilson has made quick recovery and is now able to be about again.

The ploughing match was to be November 1st, but owing to the unusually dry weather, may have to be put off.

The Divide school house has been very much improved, the main part being lengthened and a cloak room added.

The new government wharf at Ganges Harbor has been completed. It is probably one of the finest and largest wharves on the Islands' route.

Our blacksmith, J. Malcolm, has been laid up with inflammatory rheumatism for over a month. A man from Ladysmith is temporarily taking his place.

Edwina Elizabeth Cotsford, six years of age, after a long period of weakness and suffering, was taken to her heavenly rest on the 6th of October. Mr. Wilson being away in Victoria, the Rev. R. J. Roberts, of Kuper Island, kindly came over and conducted the funeral, which was attended by a large number of sympathizing friends.

The new picket fence and gate in front of St. Mary's Church, Fulford Harbor, have a very neat effect. St. There is still the painting to be completed and the pence at the back to be finished.

Ladysmith seems likely to become a good and near market for Salt Spring Island fruit, vegetables and dairy produce. Some very fine Gravensteins, grown by Mr. H. W. Bullock, were exhibited there recently, and produced quite an effect.

Eight or ten boxes of apples and pears and a quantity of vegetables, some collected after the Thanksgiving services, and some from the Agricultural Hall, were sent down to the Portestant Orphane' Home, the Old Ladies' Home, and the Old Men's Home.

His Lordship, the Bishop, assisted by the inculbent, conducted the Harvest Thanksgiving services at St. Mark's and St. Mary's Churches on Sunday, October 5th. There was a good attendance at each service, and both churches were prettily decorated for the occasion.

Salt Spring Island fruit seems destined to take a first place. At the Provincial Fair, held in Victoria October 7th to 11th, six prizes, ranging from \$200 to \$25, were offered for the best district exhibit of fruit, grain, grasses, dairy products, roots and vegetables. Last year our Islands' show came out second, but this year we stand first, and have received the \$200 prize and a silver medal. Even last year, though behind in some things, we stood first for fruit.
