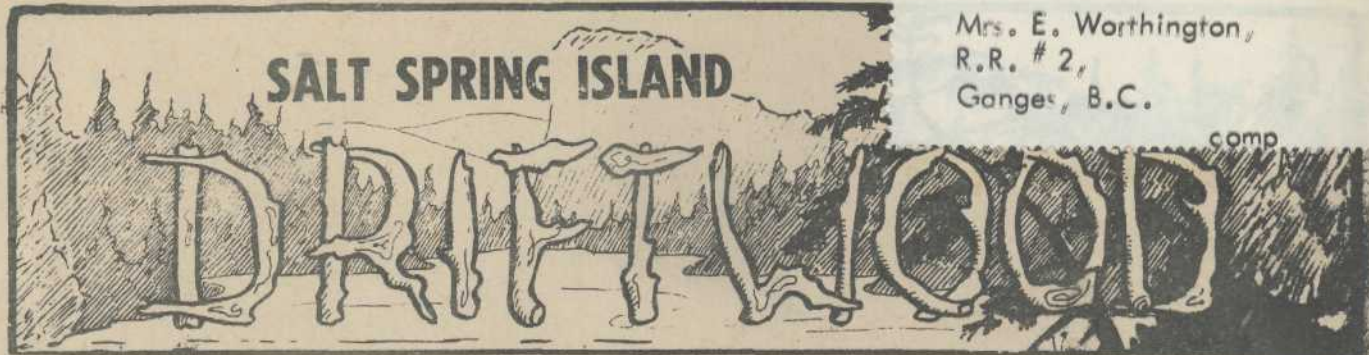

SCHOOL BOARD PLANS SEMINAR

At the regular monthly meeting, held on Saturday, Thursday last, School Board Chairman, J.M. Campbell presented a forward looking plan for a seminar to be held in the first week of September to discuss the newest trends in school planning to be incorporated into the new high school in Ganges.

The Seminar is to be attended by experts in the field from UBC, the Dept. of Education and prominent architects. An invitation is also to go to the school staff and other interested people.

Mr. Campbell stated that he felt the decision the board was faced with in the next few months in planning and constructing the new high school were much too important to be done quickly and without sufficient thought and assistance from as many experts in the field as possible. He said, "After all we want this school to be a monument to the most modern trends in school facilities. We need to plan for the next twenty years, not the last twenty."

The board also plans to present a resolution to the next Trustees convention to allow bona fide owner-electors to vote on school money by-laws in current elections, rather than have to wait until the next voters list revision. They also decided to support a Victoria resolution to go before the same convention calling for changes in the School Act to allow School Boards to spend money which is shareable by the Dept. of Education without first getting the consent of owner-electors. A motion to acquire the necessary school land for the new school was approved.

RETIRES

Sunday afternoon at Harbour House, former students and their parents gathered to honour Miss Reta Oulton on her retirement from teaching. The Harbour House gardens were lovely in the bright summer sun as the many, many guests took turns chatting with Miss Oulton and extending their good wishes to her in her years of retirement.

Miss Oulton came to Salt Spring Island in 1938 to teach at the old Divide School. One of her early pupils recalled that there were about 15 pupils in the ungraded classroom at that time. Twenty-six years later many of those early year pupils mingled with the 1964 graduates and pupils at the tea held in her honour.

When the high school was built Miss Oulton moved from the Divide School to become vice-principal under Mr. John Foubister. When Mr. Foubister joined the

COAST GUARD BOAT WRECKS SHORE INSTALLATIONS

July 7th evening around 8:30 p.m., the Coast Guard Boat "Racer", raced into Ganges Harbour and cut a wide sweep around the shoreline at a fast clip damaging several shore installations, including the BA Fuel Dock and a log boom adjacent to it.

Jim Hedgecock, BA agent in Ganges was refuelling a boat at this dock at the time and didn't notice the speed of the coast guard boat until the wash hit the dock, spilling gas and shoving the piling on one end of the dock askew thus damaging the ramp.

Fred Howard, busy at the time trying to tie a large boom of logs together, was also hit by the wash and was forced to spend several extra hours straightening out his mangled logs.

Mr. Hedgecock stated it was at least ten minutes before the extreme disturbance settled down. Several yachts moored at the floats near the main dock were also considerably jostled, but there is no report of any damage there. RCMP are investigating.

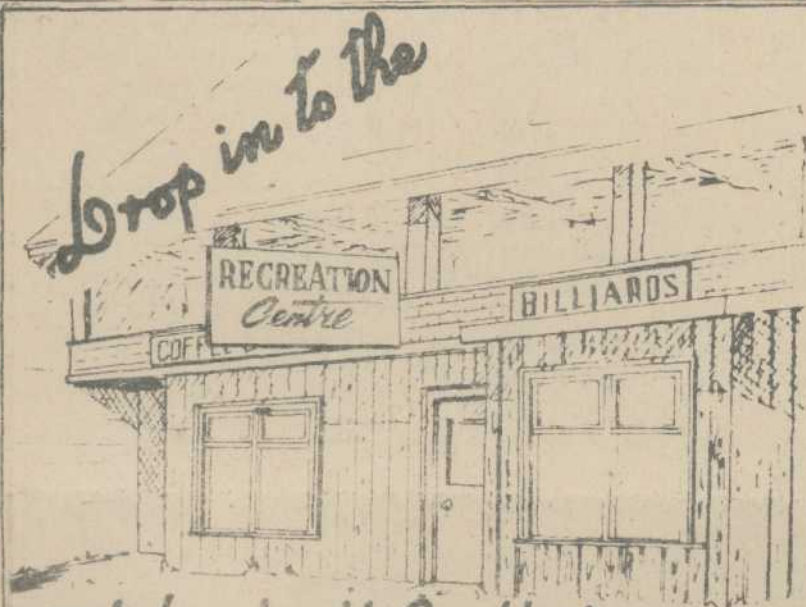

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EDITORIAL

We hear through other news media recently a bunch of the military and scientific brass from Great Britain and the U.S. as well as our own types are gathering at the military-scientific experimental base at Suffield, Alta. to watch several hundred tons of TNT detonate in what is described as the nearest thing to an atomic blast.

The whole show is set up, federal-government style, with both dummy and real soldiers deployed around the several hundred square mile plot of eastern Alberta ranch country, just outside Medicine Hat.

The 'scientific' purpose of such nonsense is stated as being the need to find out more about shock waves as they travel through air, ground and whatever other natural resource is beneficial to mankind. Specifically, the blast is to simulate everything an atom bomb does 'without the heat blast'. It will, no doubt, give other important data on how to create a real scorched earth tactic just in case it ever becomes necessary.

Meanwhile, back at the disarmament table, we, the western nations, are trying to convince the other side that we have no other aspirations internationally than peace and prosperity for all. We are critical and impatient of Russia's constantly stated fears that any real disarmament agreement between east and west will be sabotaged or used as a screen for western military and scientific development of 'greater kill', a term that is facetiously confused with national security today.

For 'brinkmanship', this rivals anything we used to criticize former Secretary of State, Foster Dulles for some few years ago.

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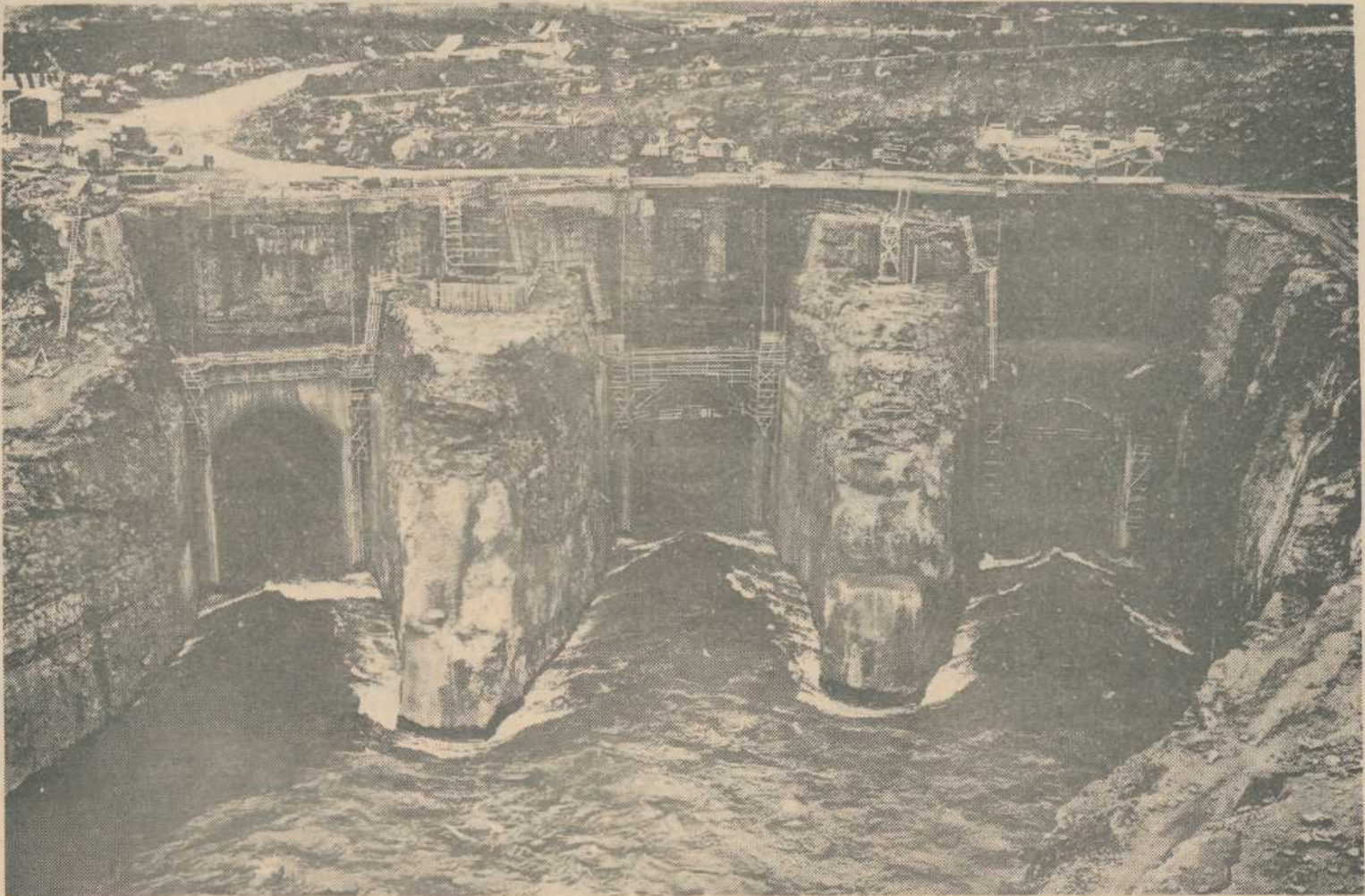
