Death of Tom Harcus Gulf Islands Drift wood

in Alberta after illness SECOND SECTION

Veteran, teacher and community worker, Tom Harcus died in Alberta on Friday, Dec. 9.

Mr. Harcus had been a teacher on Salt Spring Island for more than 10 years. He was on the staff of Gulf Islands Secondary School, until his retirement last year.

The island teacher was born in the Orkney Islands. His father was a deep sea ship's captain. He was educated in Scotland and undertook post-graduate studies in

During the Second World War he served with a Scottish regiment.

Following the war, he was farming in southern England for a time before coming to Canada with his family.

He served for a time in the Canadian Army, retiring from uniform to engage in teaching. He was teaching on the mainland before coming to Salt Spring Island.

About 10 years ago he was actively concerned in a campaign to frustrate a proposal for a boatlaunching ramp on Beddis Road. He joined the Salt Spring Island Chamber of Commerce and worked for the prevision of the ramp now located adjacent to Salt Spring Lands office in Ganges.

RECREATION

He became concerned with parks and recreation while a member of the island Chamber of Commerce and headed the parks committee for a number of years.

From that office he was named to the Salt Spring Island Recreation Commission by the Chamber. Subsequently he resigned from the Chamber to devote greater attention to the Commission.

He was vitally concerned in planning and the statistics of an island municipality during his Chamber service. He was responsible for the identification of many parks and recreation areas on the island and remained an authority on parks here up to the end of his

He was named chairman of the Recreation Commission and served in that capacity until ill-health demanded his retirement from the Commission this year. A staunch member of the Royal Canadian Legion, he was a director of the Salt Spring Island branch.

Last month he left his home on Beddis Road to move to Alberta. with his wife, and to live with their daughter and her family.

He leaves his wife Winnifred; a daughter, Susan and three grandchildren, all in Alberta.

Planning Association to concentrate on Ganges Plan

The Salt Spring Island Community Planning Association decided Monday to concentrate its efforts on a plan for Ganges. Upon the suggestion of Henry Elder, it was decided to form a committee to work with the authors of the Alternate Plan for Ganges, examine the plan and make alterations if necessary and hold a public meeting on it.

The association also plans to hold a workshop in order to get input from island people.

Chairman of the group, Mike Clement, said that the nonsense that's been going on has to be

"I'm very upset with the document prepared by the Capital Regional District," he said. "We need a specific document for the task in front of us.

'It's nonsense for the Ministry of Highways to sit back and say, we're conducting traffic studies' They've had enough time.'

Mr. Clement said he was very depressed and frustrated after a

vear as chairman.
"I'm terribly disheartened at the way our affairs are being handled at such great expense. I feel that I should resign before my term is up.'

ANOTHER HEARING

Islands Trustee Chuck Longeuay said he expected the Trust would take the Ganges Plan and study it and hold another public hearing. Mike Clement asked if there was to be no further public discussion. Local trustee Jack Fisher expressed hope that there could be a public meeting held before the hearing, to which Mr. Longeuay agreed.

"I would prefer a public meeting but the Trust might not go along with it," he said.

"Chances are that if we want one, we'll have one," observed Mr. Fisher.

Mr. Fisher urged the association to go ahead and work on the Ganges Plan but he warned that it was necessary to have the support of the business community as well as the people of the island. He also felt that, as far as a road to by-pass Ganges was concerned, the island should decide where it wants the alternate route.

Then put the document on the Ministry of Highways' table and say this is what we want," said

"They'll say that you don't need another road because all the traffic goes to Ganges anyway. They must be convinced that this road is of importance or they won't get off their butts.

"Get the public behind you and then raise polictical hell until you get what you want.'

Regional director Jim Bryce

suggested that the plan could not be proceeded with without considering the sewer system as well. Jack Fisher didn't agree. He felt that the plan should be made first and the services should follow to suit the plan.

Henry Elder spoke on what the goals of the committee should be.

"It may be possible to link the two plans together instead of compromising," he observed. There is a difference between the two that may be reconcilable. The regional district's plan is definitely a by-law; it's a plan for developers, not development. Ours (the alternate plan) is a document of strategy

"We have the opportunity of bringing together the by-law and the strategy of carrying it out.'

"You don't have to be a christian to walk on Elk Lake," Chairman Ken Patrick, of North Salt Spring Waterworks District told a meeting on Thursday in the government buildings in Victoria.

The quality of water in the Saanich lake has deteriorated to the point where it is so thick it will support a man, he suggested.

He admitted he was exaggerating when he cited the condition as a warning against carelessness in safeguarding water sources.

Resort operators examine St. Mary Lake

The broad waters of St. Mary Lake attract people to make their homes on its shore and invite others to partake of its millions of gallons.

When a meeting took place in Victoria last week to consider the future of the lake there was much comment on the use of the lake for recreational purposes and on the conservation of the lake for drinking water.

One voice was raised to consider the lake from the standpoint of those who make their living from it: the operators of resorts around its

Gerry Haarbrucker, of The Cottage Resort, presented a brief from the eight resorts on St. Mary

The resorts are trying to carry out Tourist Minister Grace McCarthy's instructions, to share the island life with visitors, explained Haarbrucker.

He looked back over the years. In 1937 a campsite was es-

tablished where Shady Willows stands today. In 1943 the Cottage Resort came into being and in 1945 two more campsites, Cedar Beach and Circle K were established. The latter is no longer a resort.

The resort operators fought from 1968 to 1970 to gain Commercial 4 zoning for their operations, he told the meeting called by Municipal Affairs Minister Hugh Curtis. Their success was rewarded with an ever-increasing property tax. HIGHEST TAXES

"We are the highest taxpayers on this lake," he stated "This year, 1977, the eight resorts have paid a gross tax of approximately \$16,000. Per frontage foot on the lake we pay \$3.99. Our land improvements amount to about \$644,500.

"With the arrival of the 1978 tax assessment notices we cannot help

but wonder how we are going to be property taxes."

The operators have made a living because of the enthusiasm of tourists to visit "our beautiful

The resorts pay two lots of taxes, he noted. There is the property tax and then there is the five per cent tax for every room or cottage

"We can definitely say that the tourist industry is one of the financial back bones of the island."

The tourist resort operator uoted another operator: "The quoted another operator: resorts are dead without the lake."

Visitors come to the lake for swimming, boating, water skiing, fishing or relaxing.

FISHING

St. Mary Lake is unique in its game fish population, he reported. with small mouth bass up to 513

pounds and cutthroat trout to 61/2 on the south by a line from Lot Six

What are the aims and desires of the resort owners towards the future use of the lake? Two extremes present themselves.

The establishment of a closed watershed or uncontrolled multiple use of the lake.

The operators are aiming for the middle and ask for multiple, controlled use. "It is endorsed and expected by us.'

The brief listed its priorities: Water for human consumption: water for irrigation: use of the lake

for recreational activities. Pros and cons of power boating

and water skiing has been debated for some time, but the resort operators are not getting into that. They offered no judgement on the pollution factor of modern outboard

A water skiing area bounded

wards the point at the bay at Maple Ridge Resort and to the north by a line from Blue Gables Resort to the easterly point on Byron's Farm,

There should be no skiing where the depth is less that 20 feet, it

The resort operators do not object to float plane activity on the lake. It is designated an alternate landing site by the ministry of transport.

"We do protest, however, the use of the lake for practice flights, take-off and landings. This is, in our opinion, very hazardous to swimmers and boaters alike.

Frank Pearce outlined the objections to the proposal from his Fernwood Water District. The district takes water from St. Mary Lake and distributes it to the Fernwood area. Among its consumers will be the Fernwood School, he told the meeting.

The water district was particularly hostile to the establishment of a recreational facility so close to its

Pearce also spoke of the use of · copper sulphate in the lake water as a means of eliminating the snails and the swimmers' itch.

When the proposal was made to establish a new beach access at Maycock Road a petition was taken up and more than 80 names were listed in opposition to the plan, reported the spokesman for the

In conclusion, he asked for signs around the lake calling attention to the fact that it is a source of domestic water.

The road at Blue Gables should be straightened, he urged and posts placed across the access to restrict the size of boat that could be launched there.

First call on the lake should be drinking water, he stated.

Also from Fernwood was Bill Delong, who was not called on to speak.

Frank Pearce referred to the cost of bringing water from Vancouver Island. He suggested that it would be "\$2 or \$3 millions". What was the source of his figures, enquired Curtis. It was merely a guess, he told the minister.

"We are not questioning anything that the gentleman has stated Nelson. "Our main aim is to close the beach access next to Blue Gables.

former commissioner of the Greater Vancouver Water Board. 33 MILLION GALLONS

The district is licensed to take a half-million gallons daily, said *Patrick and it is estimated that this year the district will have taken 33.4 million gallons. More than 400 customers of the district draw their water from the lake and this would represent about 1,000 people.

North Salt Spring district started using St. Mary Lake in 1973, he recalled. The water is perfectly satisfactory, he noted.

There is an inevitable deterioration of the lake due to residences, resorts, farms and chemical fertilizers, power boats, easy accessibility, he told the meeting and all these factors tend to prejudice the quality of the water.

Patrick offered two opposite examples. The policy of the Great-er Vancouver Water Board is to isolate its sources. Elk Lake, on the other hand is being phased out as a water supply due to its deteriorating quality, perhaps, said the speaker.

"The multiple use concept is an excellent one," noted Patrick, "but we must take into consideration the highest use and give it the highest priority.

The island lakes are the only source of potable water in a community surrounded by salt water, he concluded. The salt water is ideal for recreation and no good for drinking.
"And cold," added the minis-

'It is common sense to preserve the quality of water," urged Chairman Patrick and suggested that the Chamber throw its weight behind the board in an effort to keep the quality of water as pure as

Dr. Jack Fisher spoke for the

He expressed Chairman Marc Holmes' apologies for his inability

"I would like to support what has been said by Mr. Pearce and Mr. Patrick," he told the meeting.

The water source must be protected but the rights of the property owners in the area cannot

"We hope to co-operate with the various water districts in the preparation of a by-law to protect the quality of water, giving recognition to other uses of the lake and perhaps with compensation to residents of the lake.'

Dr. Fisher asked the minister to hold in abeyance any further approval of access to the lake, awaiting further study.

There is an excellent opportunity now, particularly as Blue Gables Resort has decided to close the present beach access on North End Road.

NO COMMUNICATION

Dr. Kreissl recalled that many government bodies have a say in

those bodies have no communication with each other in respect of

He listed the Water Rights Branch, recreation, highways, health, regional district, Islands Trust and the federal government.

'They are all concerned with every drop of water we take from the lake," he noted.

There have been rumours of water from the Cascades serving St. Mary Lake. The fact is, said the doctor, that most of the water in St. Mary Lake is due to run-off.

He finds it frustrating, said Kreissl, when people tell him that the water quality is excellent because it is tested once a month. In the Greater Vancouver system up to 6,500 tests are made every year. Twenty tests a day is normal.

The Chamber of Commerce was

not sitting on one side or the other, commented Gary Macpherson.

'We are here to analyze the situation.

WITH SUPPORT

The Chamber had made some recommendations, but not without government departments giving some indication of approval and only then with the support of the Salt Spring Island Regional Director George Heinekey.

"We accepted his guidance on a number of items. We made a proposal: it was nothing more.'

Pat Baines spoke very briefly. "We have been set up as trying to perpetrate something," he commented, "and it is far from that. The Chamber is willing to devote all its energy to supporting the protection of the lakes. If it has to be closed, I will support that

PINEAPPLE CHICKEN

2 packages (1 lb. each) chicken breasts or legs

or 1 broiler fryer (21/2 lbs.) cut in

1/4 cup flour 11/2 tsp. salt

1/2 tsp. pepper

1/4 tsp. thyme

5 tbsps. butter or margarine 1 cup (1/4 lb.) shredded sharp

... Cover and bake in a moderate oven (350) for 30 minutes; remove cover and continue baking 10 minutes longer. Makes 4 to 6 servings.

SCALLOPED CLAMS

4 slices bacon

small onion, minced 2 cans (71/2 oz. each) minced clams,

drained, or cups fresh minced clams

soda crackers, crushed egg, slightly beaten

3/4 cup milk

.Fry bacon until crisp; lift bacon out of pan and drain. Add the onion to the bacon fat in the pan, and cook slowly until golden brown. Then stir in the clams and crackers.

.Combine egg with milk and stir into the clam mixture. Turn into a well-greased 1-quart baking dish. Crumble the bacon over the top.

.Let the casserole stand at room temperature for 15 minutes, then bake, uncovered, in 350 oven for about 20 minutes. Makes 3 or 4 servings.

ZUCCHINI CUSTARD CASSEROLE

1/4 cup (1/8 lb.) butter or margarine melted.

2 pounds zucchini, cut in small pieces

3 eggs

1/2 cup undiluted evaporated milk or light cream

2 tablespoons fine dry bread crumbs 2 tbsp. minced onion

1 tsp. Worcestershire Dash of hot pepper seasoning

3/4 tsp. salt

1/8 tsp. pepper 1/3 cup shredded Parmesan cheese .. In a large frying pan that has a tight-fitting lid, add to the melted butter the zucchini pieces. Cover and cook over low heat, stirring occasionally, until tender (5 to minutes). Remove from heat and set aside

...Beat the eggs with the milk or cream; stir in the bread crumbs, onion, Worcestershire, hot pepper seasoning, salt, pepper, and about 2 tablespoons of the cheese.

... Combine with the zucchini, stirring until blended, then turn into a buttered 21/2 quart casserole.

... Sprinkle the remaining cheese over top. Bake, uncovered, in a 350 oven for 35 to 40 minutes

... If the dish has been refrigerated, allow about 10 minutes longer baking time. Makes 4 to 6 servings. **GOLDEN CORNED BEEF**

CASSEROLE (for a crowd)

2 cans (12 oz. each) corned beef, cubed, or 4 cups cubed freshly cooked corned beef



More Food for Though

The first shipment of foreign food aid from Canada was made in 1951, when 10 million dollars' worth of food was sent to India. Since then nearly 13 million metric tons have been shipped as aid to the third world. Altogether the cost has been \$1,700 million, which amounts to about one-third of the total value of the Canadian foreign aid programmes in the last 27

Some people, both here and in the receiving countries, think it has been a great programme. For the prairie farmer it has been a steady export market. For government officials in CIDA (the Canadian International Development Ag-ency) it has been a good way to disburse funds quickly, as food shipments don't require much staff

For some of the starving people in the poorest countries it has meant, quite simply, survival. But most shipments have been not of emergency rations, but of supplies to cover a country's general shortfall; the government (of India, or wherever) sells it into the market and uses the proceeds (called, for some obscure reason "counterpart funds") to finance other development projects. The food aid also saves them foreign exchange these governments might have spent on commercial imports. So most governments like food aid program-

But criticism, quite rightly, is mounting, and for several reasons.

One is that the system is wide open to abuse. In 1975-76 Canada provided \$99 million in food and cash to the World Food Programme which supports food-for-work projects. the food is stored in, say, the house of a village head man, to be doled out to forestry workers in lieu of wages-what a temptation for the head man to take his cut, slip food to his friends and cheat the workers!

Another is that it provides a soft option for recipient governments. As CIDA admits (Canada and Development Cooperation, 1976) food aid sometimes allows gov-ernments to "postpone essential agricultural reform, or at least give rural development a lower priority than it deserves."

UNRELIABLE

A third reason is that we are unreliable, and anyway can never provide enough. In 1973 and 74, both years of great need, Canada shipped only two-thirds of the previous years' volume. Total needs are far beyond North America to supply.

CIDA is trying to put up to one third of its bilateral (country - to country) funds into renewable resources projects - agriculture, for-estry, fisheries - between 1977 and 78. But there are difficulties.

Eighty percent of CIDA's bilateral funds are tied to the provision of Canadian advisers or Canadian materials.

There is just not enough Canadian equipment, whether machinery or fertilizer. And there are not enough Canadian experts on, say, tropical agriculture.

What is needed in most developing countries is help with smallholders' programmes, but since we have ignored the interests of our own smallholders, we are not able to offer much advice.

WHITE HELP

In the Chaco of Northern Argentina, indigenous people being pushed off their land by multinational corporations and white settlers are being assisted in the purchase of land for homes and agricultural purposes.

The Anglican Church is being helped in this programme by the Inter-church Fund for International Development and the Primate's World Relief and Development Fund, with matching funds from



The way the breath alcohol units work is simple. And very effective. Remember that police officers are extremely adept at spotting impaired drivers. There are all sorts of clues. And once a suspected driver is stopped, he or she can now be asked to take a breathalyzer test immediately in a mobile unit. If anyone refuses, a criminal charge will result.

A blood/alcohol reading over .08% means a driver is legally impaired. Conviction means a criminal record. Three months or more without a driver's licence. A fine of up to \$2,000, or even jail. Just for a first offence. Penalties for second offences are even more severe.

Know Your Children

Course offers help for parents in dealing with their children

Are you feeling discouraged by your children's behavior or misbehavior? Do you want your children to become more responsible and co-operative? Do you believe that communication skills within your family could be im-

MODERNIZE WITH PROPANE proved

If you answered "yes" to these questions, perhaps you need STEP -Systematic Training for Effective Parenting.

Recently, a dozen people completed the nine-week STEP program, held under the auspices of the Continuing Education Department.

The participants, with group leaders Barbara Persson and David Chase, enthusiastically agreed that the course had been effective in improving their own parent-child relationships.

HANDBOOK

The STEP course consists of study of a parents' handbook, and weekly discussions involving tapes and some role-playing.

The participants were required to apply the concepts and methods presented in the course to their own family situations, then report back to the group on the results. Most of the group members felt real progress had been made in understanding their own and their children's motivations, behavior, and goals.

Several teachers in the group

observed that they had applied STEP methods successfully in their classrooms.

THE CHALLENGE

STEP participants agreed that the challenge to parents and teachers in our society is to encourage the development of responsible, self-motivated, self - confident children.

The fluctuations of the water level have caused the resort operators some concern, it was stated. Last year the lake reached its lowest point in 20 years.

its lowest point in 20 years.

Was this evaporation? Or excessive pumping? Or are the springs

drying up?

The brief also expressed concern for the future of the lake in the event of earth tremors.

POLLUTION

Pollution is paramount.

"Man and beast can easily turn this precious bowl of good water into a cesspool according to the experts."

There are two reports available and the operator is confused. One report says that there is nothing wrong with the lake water and the other side has "people using fancy words declaring this lake to be doomed forever".

The operators are constantly checking and improving their sewage disposal systems and even choosing the least pollutant soaps for use in their cottages, said Haarbrucker.

"A clear, understandable directive from the responsible provincial agency would definitely contribute to a better awareness of the dangers of pollution."

Where animal droppings are entering the lake, the farmers should be advised of the hazard to the lake, it urged. Fertilizer run-off is also a factor in pollution of the lake waters.

FENCE THEM OFF

The brief also refers to a mooted Capital Regional District by-law which would require farmers to fence animals from the lake to a minimum distance from the water of 100 feet.

"We are in favour of public access to St. Mary Lake, but only if it can be controlled."

The lake is a place for all islanders and many visitors, said the operators. The lakes are owned and controlled by the government, which is the people.

"We cannot imagine the government buying all the property and improvement around the lake. To buy the resorts alone, according to the 1978 valuation, would cost in excess of \$1½ millions."

There are nine gazetted road allowances on the lake and only three are opened to allow access to the water.

SELL AND BUY

"We suggest the sale of most of the road allowances to adjoining properties and the use of the proceeds of these sales for the purchase of some land near a remaining road allowance, with a minimum of two acres."

A proper picnic beach could then be provided and at least chemical toilets. A boat-launching site would be an asset, it was also

Public access should be controlled. An existing access has been a thorn in the flesh to water districts, SPEC, resort operators and the RCMP, commented the brief.

The brief also urged the government to consider the acquisition of the Black Diamond Resort of 12 acres with 1,200 feet of lakefront.

"After careful consideration, we endorse a Multiple Controlled use of this jewel of Salt Spring Island."
