When Harold Derbitsky, of Isabella Point Road, rolled his car into the ditch on Saturday, Jan. 29, he had only one comment to make. He was lucky to get out alive.

Derbitsky slid off the road on Vesuvius Bay Road near Mobrae Ave. The car rolled on to its roof and the driver was trapped. He spent about an hour climbing out of the vehicle, he explained later.

Car, a 1971 Vega Hatchback, sustained damage estimated at \$1,000.

Derbitsky was charged with driving too hard for the road conditions.

The grant permits the employment of island students on public-orientated projects funded by Ottawa.

The directors agreed that there will be a number of island students looking for employment during the summer months.

Details of the program have not yet been announced.

## GAS PRICES REDUCED EIGHT CENTS AT GANGES STATIONS

Gasoline prices came down in Ganges this week with regular being offered at 85.9 cents and premium at 91.9 cents a gallon.

The new prices represent a reduction of eight cents a gallon.

First to announce a reduction was Bill Trelford, of the S.S. Island Garage. The decision was reached without reference to the recent Salt Spring Island Chamber of Commerce plea for an enquiry into the cost of bringing gasoline to the island.

As prices come down this week the service stations are waiting for the province-wide price hike already announced.

Steve Nelson, president of the

Chamber, explained that this reduction was brought about by the service station operators themselves and not through any action of the chamber.

"I am glad to see prices come down," he told Driftwood, "and I hope the car owners on the island will support the local operators and buy their gasoline at home."

He said he is satisfied that the long-established price discrepancy between island prices and Vancouver Island rates was due to outside influences and not local stations.

"I would still like to see an in-depth survey of how this came about in the first place, he concluded.

## REPORT TO GALIANO CLUB

## Vandals wreck equipment in playground at Galiano

At the monthly meeting of the Galiano Club last week it was reported that the Centennial Playground Park had been van-

dalized in recent weeks.

Mrs. J. Marchant, chairman of the parks committee, told the Club Executive that the swings

had been torn down and the hobby horses wrecked, as well as other damage done to the playground equipment.

The building and equipping of this playground was the Centennial project of the Island for 1971. The cost was covered by Centennial and L.I.P. grants as well as private donations. The land on which it is located is leased from Gulf Islands School District, but was given originally to the school board by Mr. and Mrs. Fred Robson and Mr. and Mrs. Jack Bickerton.

Making use primarily of logs cut on the site, this adventure playground has always been popular with local children. Overnight camping by Island visitors is prohibited but from the amount of garbage which has accumulated since last November it is evident that improper use has been made of the area.

The Galiano Club is endeavouring to have the damage repaired and the park put in order before spring, but has appealed to residents and school children to help take care of the facility.

## SALT SPRING BUILDING STORE IS ACQUIRED BY COMPANY

Salt Spring Building Centre has been purchased by Windsor Plywood. The Vancouver company has added the island building supply operation to its chain of 33 stores in three provinces and the State of Washington.

Windsor operates in British Columbia, Alberta and Saskatchewan, reported a spokesman for the company last week.

Robin Fisher will continue as manager of the facility at Valcourt Business Centre.

The island store will be operated in conjunction with existing stores in Duncan and Central Saanich.

Established about 12 years

ago, the building supply firm was originally the only business at the Valcourt Centre. It was then operated by Phil and Yvette Valcourt.

The Valcourt family moved to Salt Spring Island from near Victoria where they operated a small lumber mill. Initially they ran a portable mill on Salt Spring Island before switching to the retail end of the same business.

When the business centre was opened several years ago the founding couple sold their lumber and hardware outlet to Salt Spring Building Centre Ltd.

The international lumber and supply company is the third operator of the island business.

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

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# HOW SAFE IS VACCINE ?

## Safer than Victorian Flu says Arniel

Swine Flu-Victoria Flu vaccine injections have resulted in few complaints in the Capital Regional District, according to Regional Health Officer A.S. Arniel.

In the district 11,000 persons were immunized during November and December. Apart from mild headache or fever resulting from the vaccine, 15 complained of greater effects. These ranged from dizziness, vomiting, cramps, allergies, loss of weight or weakness said the Health Officer.

These instances were closely screened, in company with the attending physicians. There was

no evidence to tie them in with the Guillane-Barre syndrome. A second factor was there at the same time, added the report from Dr. Arniel.

Even if there were evidence to suggest the syndrome, there was still no firm connection with the vaccine.

He also noted that the only two cases of the syndrome in the regional district have been completely unrelated to the flu vaccine.

### FIVE TO THREE

Up to January 7, there had been eight cases in all of Canada

of the Guillane-Barre syndrome. Of those stricken, five had received the flu vaccine and the other three had not.

The parallel in the United States ran still closer. Of a total of 571 cases of the Guillane-Barre syndrome, 296 had been vaccinated and 261 had not.

Vaccine used in Canada was not manufactured in the United States, states the Health Officer.

If there is a direct relationship between the syndrome, with its paralyzing effects, and the vaccine, then the incidence in the Capital Regional District, based on the experience of Canada and the United States, could be expected at one case in every 12 to 20 years, stated Dr. Arniel.

One or two cases of swine flu, reported recently, indicated that the victims had been in contact with pigs and had probably gained the infection from the animals. There have been very few cases of Victorian flu, on a world-wide basis. It is hoped that the incidence will not be very high.

It must be recalled, warned the medical officer, that last year the Victorian flu started in this area in January and peaked in March.

### FLU TAKES 50-100

Attributed by Dr. Arniel to Victorian flu last year were 50-100 deaths beyond what would have been expected.

"These deaths I attribute largely, if not entirely, to Victorian flu," said the doctor.

The deaths mostly occurred among persons aged 65 and over. This would represent about one in every 500 of this group dying of the late effects of flu, he suggested. There is no record of how many might have been immunized against flu.

ed against flu.

It is up to the individual, concluded the doctor's report. He may discuss it with the family physician. He warned that Victorian flu in the elderly or chronically sick can be a serious or a fatal disease. There is no vaccine to control Victorian flu alone.

Capital Regional District offers immunization to all over 64 and to any between 19 and 64 who are suffering from a chronic disease which may be adversely affected by flu. Those between the ages of three and 18 who are suffering from such a chronic complaint may be immunized on the request of parent or guardian and the recommendation of the physician.

Candidates for the vaccine should make an appointment with the islands office of the regional district in Ganges.



# This is Roger's fingerprint



This is Roger. He is in Grade 4 at school. No other child in his class is the same. No other child anywhere is exactly the same.


## Everyone knows that no two fingerprints are the same

You can't tell by looking at him, but Roger has reading disabilities that require special reading methods. Other children in Grade 4 at his school have special needs too.

Joanne is partially deaf. Bob is slow to grasp math. Tony is a new Canadian who is just learning to speak English. May has emotional problems caused by a troubled home environment. Barbara reads at a Grade 9 level, although she is in Grade 4. Her classmates show the usual range from Grade 2 to Grade 8 reading ability. Dan comes to school hungry every morning from a poverty-stricken home. Faye has an eye co-ordination problem. John has a mathematical mind. Garry learns very slowly.

Roger and Joanne and Bob and Tony and May and Barbara and Dan and Faye and John and Garry are not peculiar. They are just examples of the differences normally found among children. It's normal for children (like fingerprints) to be different.

### Does it make sense to use the same curriculum and the same test for educating all these children?



Is this what the Ministry of Education is planning?

The B.C. Teachers' Federation favors an education system that challenges children to learn reading and writing and other skills *to the best of each child's ability*. . . . but it rejects the idea of a single core curriculum that ignores differences in children. A single core curriculum also neglects many important life skills.

Because such a curriculum is designed to fit the mythical average child, it fits almost no one. Reading courses are as basic a need as shoes but no one would insist on the same ill-fitting average-sized shoe for every child in B.C.

The B.C. Teachers' Federation *supports testing* that helps to diagnose children's needs and to find ways of helping them learn, but it *rejects province-wide tests* that ignore differences and make a mockery of individualized learning.

To prescribe that every child must reach a set standard regardless of mental and physical gifts or impairments, is a gross violation of children's rights.

Such a strategy is comparable to setting the high jump bar at four feet and insisting that all children jump it, knowing full well that some will never make it while others will surpass five or even six feet.

Curriculum should be developed *locally*. Tests should be made *locally*.

It was Prime Minister Trudeau who poured scorn on the idea of a "Particular Status" for Quebec. He was convinced that bilingualism was the required panacea; but it has been so mismanaged that neither the Francophones or the Anglophones are satisfied. Perhaps it is not too late for both of the founding races to assess what adjustments are needed to enable Quebec to protect its way of life so that two great cultures can flourish within the bosom of a strong and united nation.

The triumph of the Parti Quebecois represents the chickens Mr. Trudeau hatched in 1968 coming home to roost. We Canadians had better learn from our past errors. As Santayana said, "Those who will not learn the lessons of history are condemned to repeat its mistakes."

### ISSUES WERE ECONOMIC

The real issue in the Quebec election was not separatism - in spite of Liberal efforts to make it so - but the record of the Bourassa government. In the elitist society run by Bourassa and Trudeau the plight of the ordinary citizen has steadily worsened. Quebec's unemployment rate is one of the highest in Canada. Not enough money has been available for low-cost housing while millions were frittered away on the Olympic Games and on the James' Bay project whose main beneficiaries will be the power companies of the State of New York. The public life of Quebec has been riddled with corruption and distracted with unsettled labour disputes. The people of Quebec had enough! In spite of all the dire warnings blasted at them in the dying days of the campaign they elected the Parti Quebecois - not necessarily because they wanted to separate from Canada but because they couldn't stomach the Liberals any longer.

Rene Levesque has described himself as a Social Democrat similar to Social Democrats in the Scandinavian countries, West Germany and Great Britain. He has pledged himself to provide additional health services for the elderly and for needy families; more low-cost housing and better labour conditions. Levesque says he will make those who benefit from the province's natural resources share some of their gains. When one remembers that as a Cabinet Minister in the Lesage Government he nationalized the electric power companies and was in the process of making the mining companies cough up, one can understand why the Montreal Establishment turned pale at the mere mention of his name. As New Democrat I heartily support Levesque's social and economic policies just as heartily as I disagree with his views on separatism.

In my opinion Quebec has much to lose and nothing to gain by withdrawing from Confederation and I suspect that most of the people who voted for the Parti Quebecois share that view. The same polls which predicted Levesque's election showed that only 18% of those interviewed favoured Quebec's independence. I think that Quebec electorate voted P.Q. for two reasons; first because they were fed up with a corrupt and incompetent government, and secondly, because they saw in the social and economic reforms proposed by Levesque an opportunity to break out of the Economic feudalism imposed upon them by successive stand-pat governments.

# ARCHIVES AND IROQUOIS

## It wasn't beer and skittles in those days

The loss of the Iroquois, off Sidney on April 10, 1911, represented the greatest tragedy on local waters for all time.

Today, the name of the vessel is still linked with death and flotsam on island beaches. Only in the provincial archives is the name of the ship associated with evil drinking men, dashing aboard the coastal steamer to drag on a crock in defiance of provincial statutes.

The archives know!

Here is the official report from the provincial files of an enquiry into the habits of evil island men flagrantly seen aboard the Iroquois accepting alcoholic beverages. The real essence of the

report is the price paid. Only in the provincial archives, today, can anyone find whisky at 145 cents a shot or a flask of Bonnie Lassie whisky, distilled by Donald McPherson and Co., of Glasgow, for 50 cents.

*Here is the report of Gerald Cookson, of Royal Oak, B.C., addressed to Provincial Police Superintendent F.S. Hussey, in Victoria. His official title was omitted.*

\*\*\*

Sir:  
In compliance with your verbal and written instructions I purchased an all round trip ticket on the "Iroquois" passenger & freight vessel on Saturday the

10th of September, 1910.

I joined the Victoria & Sidney train at Royal Oak at 8 am that morning & proceeded to Sidney where I went on board the "Iroquois", voyage lasted 9.30 am to 6.10 pm. There were about twenty passengers & a crew of six or seven men.

Our first stopping place was South Pender, where the following incidents occurred. The barman Herbert Harknell, supplied two non passengers with two whiskys for which he charged fifteen cents a drink.

I was unable to obtain the names of the two men who were supplied with drinks but carefully noted a man who bought a bottle of whiskey and concealed the same inside his shirt & can identify this person if required. The barman Herbert Harknell also took a bottle of whisky ashore and placed it in a box on the wharf.

for instance no one attempted to board the boat except those who were actually engaged unloading freight.



At North Pender, I personally purchased three beer and three whisky for myself, Mr. Robertson, Mr. Hope, whilst vessel was tied up and for a Mr. Jives, a passenger who lives at Salt Spring Island. I paid ten cents for beer & fifteen cents for each glass of whisky.

### HE KNEW HE WAS

From the above remarks of the man whose name I was unable to obtain I gathered that that person clearly understood he was breaking the law when he boarded the "Iroquois" & purchased an intoxicating drink.

I can easily identify the three men who were supplied with drink at North Pender if necessary. At two of the stopping places no business was done at the bar of the Iroquois. At Bayne

**SOME OTHER ISLANDS**

**The enticing Queen Charlottes**


For islanders the Queen Charlotte Islands offer an island setting with a quiet that was once more evident among the Gulf Islands. You will share the roads with shaggy-haired cattle, bounding blacktail deer and, occasionally, an ambling black bear, which are not familiar nearer home. The "Charlottes" are a tri-

angular archipelago of some 150 islands and islets, 156 miles (250 kilometres) long by a third as wide, forming the western shore of Hecate Strait. Their moist and moderate climate results from the warm Kuroshio current swelling around the Pacific rim, carrying along glass balls torn from Japanese fishing gear, treasures for lucky beachcombers.

**LIKE ALL ISLANDS**

Like in all islands, life's pace in the Charlottes is slow. There's time to behold the flood tide swashing up the beach. Here,

there are great trees, large salmon and steelhead.

Graham Island's spacious north and east coast, around Naikoon Provincial Park, has miles of smooth, golden sand beaches where delectable razor clams may be dug.

Numerous islands decorate the east coast of Moresby Island, protecting tree-flanked waterways especially attractive to boaters and divers. A soak in the tub

at Hotspring Island is a must.

Near the turn of this century, survivors of decimated Haida villages moved from their scattered ancestral grounds and gathered at two sites, both on Graham Island. Haida, two miles north of Masset, is home for over 800 Haidas.

Here, in 1969, the first Island totem carved in 100 years was erected near the church. Other new totems now stand in front of a museum displaying Haida artifacts.

**ANOTHER 300**

Skidegate Mission, east of Queen Charlotte City, is an attractive settlement of some 300 Haidas, where a single totem faces a shore once thick with tall carved poles and crowded with giant sea-going cedar dugout canoes.

Nearby is a new regional museum, a good place to get acquainted with the islands' past and present.

Haida artisans in both villages carve argillite -- a black, slate-like rock unique to the Slatechuck Mountains -- into small totems and brooches.

Others work with gold or silver, creating rings, bracelets, brooches and earrings of delicate lines and exquisite beauty.

In addition to over 125 miles (200 kilometres) of good public roads, there are hundreds of miles of privately owned logging roads snaking through valleys or coiling up hillsides, leading to scenic camping spots or fishing streams. These roads are normally accessible after working hours or on weekends. For those desiring to photograph abandoned Haida villages, a boat or float plane is needed.

**IROQUOIS**

Two non passengers were also supplied with liquor at the above harbour.

At Salt Spring Island saw mills, one mill hand was supplied with a glass of whisky at fifteen cents.

At Beaver Point, Salt Spring Island, I bought two whisky & soda for which I paid fifteen cents a glass & one non passenger purchased two whiskeys for fifteen cents a glass.

**BARMAN DOES IT**

Apparently the barman, Herbert Harknell, supplies any non passenger with liquor at any port where the "Iroquois" stops when asked to do so. I gathered from conversations I had with the crew that quite a large quantity of whisky is sold daily by the above barman to residents on these islands.

The person who concealed a bottle of whisky inside his shirt at South Pender evidently knew he was breaking the law.

I regret I was unable to obtain this person's name, but as already stated I could easily identify him if required to do so as I made a careful note of clothes he was wearing etc.

\*\*\*

J.D. Taylor, of the Pacific Detective Agency was also engaged in this investigation. His report shows he was no amateur in Liquor Board enquiries. He, also, reported to Supt. Hussey. Sir:

I, the undersigned, have the honour to submit the following report showing the results of an investigation of what kind of bar business is done by the steamer Iroquois after she has stopped at wharves and stopping places.

This Agency finds that the said steamer is committing an offence against the provisions of this Act respecting Liquor Licenses and the Traffic in Intoxicating Liquors, that came into force on this first day of August, 1910, by committing an offence against the provisions of Section 72 of the said Act by selling to persons at wharves and stopping places who are not passengers on the said steamer and while the said steamship is not actually travelling between ports, wharves and stopping places in waters contiguous to the Province of British Columbia.

**THAT'S WHAT!**

This Agency is of the opinion that she also sells to members of the crew of the said steamship. As a result of the investigation it appears to the satisfaction of this Agency that the said steamship has been guilty of a contravention of the provisions of the said Act and if it be a second or further contravention on the part of the Licensee, you have the power to by writing under your hand cancel the steamship license of such Licensee.

No record was kept of possible subsequent legal action. The evidence may have gone down with the ship. Most of the reports here were published recently in the Sidney Review.

**Pacific coast oil**

Bluepeace was launched recently at Sooke.

The Mirror, published in Sooke, reported that about 100 people gathered in the Sooke Community Hall to form a branch of Bluepeace. Committee of 14 people was elected to head the branch.

Bluepeace is the community organization closely concerned with the threat to local waters represented by the passage of giant tankers bringing oil to west coast ports, particularly Cherry Point in the state of Washington.

Dr. Harry Carter, of Victoria, was the sponsor of the Bluepeace movement. He became keenly concerned with the threat when a series of disasters struck oil tankers off the Atlantic coast.... and on.

It is only a matter of time, Carter told the meeting, before a similar disaster hits the west coast.

**PRESENT AND FUTURE**

He has two areas of concern, said the oil-spill spokesman. One is the present tanker traffic on the west coast. This represents a great danger of oil spills, he told his audience.

Second fear expressed by Dr. Carter was the arrival of super tankers at Kitimat bringing oil to the United States. Giant ships in narrow west coast inlets would be inviting a disaster, he suggested.

Urging the establishment of a branch in Sooke, Dr. Carter told the meeting he was not sure where to go next.

"But I'm not going to lie there like a dead cow," he told them, "We're mad: we're concerned: we're worried! And if it comes to nothing, at least we tried!"

Invited to speak to the newly formed branch, David Anderson was the guest of Bluepeace on Friday evening.

**EASY LAWS**

Addressing an executive meeting of Bluepeace last week, Anderson explained that the port of Kitimat was selected for the super tankers because Canadian laws are less stringent than those elsewhere on the coast.

"And they think that Canadians are less concerned," he added, "and they're right!"

The former Member of Parliament for Esquimalt-Saanich and former provincial leader of the Liberals, David Anderson gained international note for his one-man campaign against pollution several years ago.

# WEATHERMAN CALLS FROM TOWER ON SLOPES OF MOUNT TUAM

Newest transmission tower on Mount Tuam, at the southern end of Salt Spring Island, went on the air on Monday, Jan. 24.

It is transmitting weather date, and nothing else and it is doing it all the time.

For 24 hours of the day, seven days of the week, mariners, and others will be listening to the transmissions from Mt. Tuam.

It is Canada's first radio transmitter designed for the purpose, on a continuous basis, without other messages.

Owned and operated by the Atmospheric Environment Service of Canada's department of fisheries and environment, the new Weatheradio Canada service will provide listeners with a weather warning capability and instant access to hourly updated weather reports and forecasts on

a round-the-clock seven-days-a-week schedule.

### DETAILS EARLY

This new service will provide weather sensitive special users and the general public with storm and other severe weather warnings at the earliest possible moment and with current, detailed weather information on an

ongoing basis.

Broadcasts are prepared by the meteorologists at the Pacific Weather Centre in Vancouver, and relayed by ultra high frequency radio link to the automatic transmitting station.

The transmitter is located at the 602 metre level of Mount Tuam on southwestern Salt
