## BOOK REVIEW

# He'll never be able to identify with this book

*Paper Boy*, by Stuart Keate.  
Clarke Irwin. 237 pp.

There is a satisfaction in looking back over the years. There is nowhere near the satisfaction once afforded by speculating on the future.

Stuart Keate was a notable figure on the coast for the fact that he served as publisher of two notable newspapers on the west coast. After a stint as publisher of the *Victoria Times*, Keate went on to Vancouver to serve in like capacity with the *Vancouver Sun*.

He was a Vancouver boy who came back to the coast.

He had started out as a reporter or the same *Vancouver Sun*.

In addition to the laurels he gained from his own trade, he was named officer of the Order of Canada as recognition beyond the news room.

The writer is a notable Canadian and a notable newspaperman. His book takes the reader back through the years of the Canadian daily newspaper business.

Keate was an important, prominent Canadian newspaperman. **DELIGHTFUL LIFE**

I have been a small-time, unimportant, unknown newspaperman. Yet, my recollections are of a lively, delightful, often wild, but thoroughly enjoyable occupation. And I miss all this with Keate's book. I get the impression that he was much more dignified than the people I've known in the news bus-

iness. I can't see him running a special issue of his paper to lampoon a staff member. I can't see him delighting in the antics of his community.

I'm not knocking his book. I enjoyed it. I enjoyed reading of the people and places I have known, albeit from a distance. But there is no recollection of a deadline, of working to the last second to get in the last word on a hard-won story. He doesn't tell me of the satisfaction of writing something before somebody else gets the idea of writing it. Or the smugness that accompanies the story the other fellows missed.

### POMPOUS TRADE

It's a business that makes for pomposity, my family tells me. But all this is missing.

The linotypes never blew molten lead over the ceiling and no printer pulled back from the machine while it squirted. He doesn't recall a break in the web or the goof that nearly threw him. These are the things that made the business in my own small world.

The reader will learn a lot of the machinations of big business in the newspaper world, but he will be left disappointed if he wants to smell the hot lead in the back shop or chase the hot news in the front office.

I shall keep the book and I shall value it, but I shall never be able to identify with it.

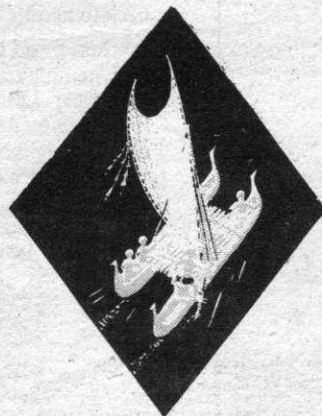

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## To seek design advisers

Salt Spring Island Trust Committee will advertise for candidates for the newly established advisory design panel. Last Tuesday evening the committee heard a recommendation from planner Dean Strongitharm that the draft terms of reference be approved in principle and that a notice be published soliciting interested parties.

"It's a touchy subject," cautioned David Lott, "and we should be careful!"

Was he referring to the terms of reference or the ad in the paper as the touchy subject, enquired chairman John Rich, amid laughter.

List of suitable candidates suggested by the Trust staff was rejected. The committee will invite participants and see who volunteers. It will then make a choice.

Five members will be appointed. Appointment of the advisory panel was approved by the Salt Spring Island Advisory Planning Commission two weeks ago, with the regional director, Yvette Valcourt, expressing opposition.

She feared that the panel would represent one more delay in the process of gaining approval and permit for building on the island, she told the commission.

Both Bud Kreissl and chairman Nick Gilbert were warmly in favour of the proposal.

He would like to get as much advice as possible, said Kreissl. He feels the planning commission is limited without such backing, added Gilbert.

It is creating another procedure someone has to go through, submitted Valcourt. She felt that the local trustees are "pretty good judges".

The proposal is among the factors putting up costs on the island, warned the regional director, and making the island a

rich man's paradise.

Most of the commission members were diffident at first, admitted trustee David Lott, and cited one applicant who had improved his design after consultation with the commission.

When a property is zoned commercially, the people are saying to the owner that he is to be allowed to make money, observed Kreissl, and the public is entitled to be protected.

It is not a step in the way of gaining approval, he noted, but a short cut because the applicant will have a set of guidelines to follow even before he makes his plans.

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## Approval withheld by Trust

Subdivision approval of a property covered by a land use contract was not given by Salt Spring Island Trust Committee on Tuesday evening last week.

The property is the proposed golf club and residential development on Blackburn Lake, on the Luton farm.

Part of the contract refers to the renovation of the farmhouse, the original Blackburn home. Delia

Wilson, speaking to the application, explained that nobody wants to acquire the old building, with its 9,000 square feet.

Spokesman for the family explained that the land use contract was concluded in haste, when there remained only three months to complete it.

The committee does not know enough to make a decision, said chairman John Rich. Decision was deferred for two weeks.

# To our customers.

**We are receiving many questions about the current labour difficulties at B.C. Tel. We hope this ad will answer some of the questions most frequently asked.**

• **Does B.C. Tel want a new contract with its union, the T.W.U.?**

YES! Our number one priority is to get an agreement that is fair to both our employees and our customers, recognizing that in the end, the costs of any agreement must be borne by those who pay phone bills.

• **Why did the company not agree to the non-binding recommendations of Federal Conciliation Officer Ed Peck?**

It is our sincere belief that the Peck proposals would be highly inflationary and add significantly to the costs of phone service in B.C. In a monopoly situation, the temptation to take the easy route and pass the costs on to our customers is great. Instead, we have taken the far less popular route and tried to find middle ground that would, at least in our view, be fair to customers and employees alike.

• **Just what has been B.C. Tel's position?**

The company's recent offer of a 39% increase in wages over a three year period appeared reasonable to us. It still does. It would mean that **B.C. Tel union employees would be the highest paid telephone workers in Canada.** Such wage rates would compare favourably to those paid by other employers in B.C., and these wages could be paid without further increasing phone rates in 1981.

• **What other alternatives has B.C. Tel proposed?**

During recent talks and making every effort to find a reasonable solution, we proposed two alternatives:

1) If the TWU is prepared to modify its position, B.C. Tel would be willing to meet the union halfway between the company's offer and what we understand the union's position to be for 1981. If accepted, this alternative would bring an immediate end to the dispute. This proposal was made but did not receive serious consideration. We believe our employees should have an opportunity to vote on this.

2) If the union is not prepared to modify its position, then a second alternative is for the company to seek increases in phone rates through the CRTC and, if successful, make an offer to the union that would meet what we understand their position to be.

• **Will these alternatives necessitate increased telephone rates?**

Unfortunately yes. B.C. Tel must borrow a large amount of money during 1981 if we are to meet normal service demands. Lenders of money must have some assurance that the company's earnings will be sufficient to cover the interest payments. By meeting the demands of the union, the company would have difficulty giving such assurance. These are the facts of the matter when we say we cannot afford to meet the demands of the union, without a further increase in phone rates.

We will continue to do our level best to find a fair and reasonable solution to this most difficult problem. In the meantime we sincerely regret the inconvenience and difficulty the telephone strike is causing our customers.

# Plant berries until end of March

Well, they are up. On St. Valentine's Day I started a whole bunch of things in our insulated germination box which is sitting in our unheated greenhouse.

In order of appearance, marigolds, three days; tomatoes and dahlias, five days; peppers not yet, although I am sure they will be up as well by the time this article appears.

In the unheated part, onions, radishes, spinach and lettuce are growing.

I sure like this arrangement. The unheated greenhouse for the hardy ones and that marvelous germination box for the ones that like bottom heat. And only 168 watts instead of 10,000 watts. There is still time to knock one together. It pays for itself in your first season. Copies of a sketch are available at Foxglove. Every gardener should have one.

Until the end of March we may still plant all the various berries, with the exception of strawberries, or starberries as my wife calls them.

## IN APRIL

Strawberries are best planted in April. Loganberries, boysenberries, raspberries, blackberries, currants and gooseberries all prefer a slightly acid (5.5 to 6.0) clay loam. Blueberries require an acid (4.5) peat loam and strawberries and grapes prefer a light sandy loam at around 5.5 to 6.0 on the Ph scale.

All are planted in the standard manner with the crown at soil

level. Just make sure that you do not create a clay "tub" with your planting hole, when the topsoil is shallow and the planting hole extends into impermeable clay soil. Make sure to provide some drainage at the bottom.

With grapes it is best to bury the whole thing except for the two top buds. It makes for a bigger root system. Space grapes at least six feet apart, 10 feet is better.

For maximum fruit production, the grape is grown and severely pruned each year for three years to develop three or four strong laterals to each side. These laterals are trained to horizontal supports at one-foot intervals and after three years are allowed to grow short fruit spurs for a dense and abundant crop.

### ABUNDANT CROP

If left unpruned grapes will produce a truly abundant crop of leaves and runners with the occasional cluster of fruit.

Rhubarb is another worthwhile perennial shrubby veggie which may be planted now. Rhubarb prefers a rich loam. Half a wheelbarrow of well rotted manure per plant would not be too

much. Plant the crown with buds at soil level in well drained soil. Spacing should be about four feet all around. Plants last for at least 10 years before the crown should be lifted, divided, the old centre discarded and new sections replanted.

It is an early summer treat but don't munch on the leaves, they are somewhat poisonous. Just make you sick, that's all.

To help with rooting, blooming and fruiting, chuck half a pound of bonemeal into each planting hole of all the above. To avoid weeding and to supply abundant nitrogen, grow all the above in a permanent ground cover of clover.

### LOW GROWING

White clover is a nice low growing kind and attracts bees for pollination. Just mow it like a lawn and let the clippings rot back into the soil. This will conserve moisture, lots of it, and fertilize and build topsoil as well. It also looks neat and will save you time and money. Can't go wrong at all.

The little snowdrops are out in full strength and lovely to behold. Snowdrops which have proliferated into dense bunches should now be lifted, lightly separated and replanted in smaller bunches.

The lovely little aconites (*Eranthis hyemalis*) which first started to show their buttercup-like blossoms in the middle of January this year, are making more and more of a show. They reproduce only from seed, and if you want to increase your supply it is best to save some seeds and grow under favourable conditions and then to transplant in fall to their permanent location. Bulbs should be planted two inches deep and about four inches apart. They look best massed in bunches or drifts.

Winter blooming heathers all benefit greatly by being sheared after they finish blooming. Cut the spikes of finished blossoms in half. This will generate numerous new shoots below the point of cutting, making a dense, instead of scraggly, plant. A dense, well-grown winter blooming heather will eventually cover an area of four feet all around at a height of two feet.

Geranium cuttings taken last fall should now be transplanted to larger pots. They may be grown inside or in the unheated greenhouse.

Houseplants which are starting new growth now will benefit from the resumption of fertilizing and watering after their dormant period.

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## Gulf Islands Shrine Club officers are installed

The newly elected president and officers of the Gulf Islands Shrine Club were installed recently in a ceremony at the Village Green Inn in Duncan by Gizeh Temple officer Potentate, Gordon L. Simons.

Installed were the president, Ken MacKenzie; vice-president, Stan Sage and secretary, George Dunaway.

The Gizeh Temple encompasses all of the province of British Columbia and the Yukon Territory and has a membership of over 3,700 Shriners.

Simons, a North Vancouver businessman, praises the orthopaedic, burns and arthritic research carried out by 21 Shriner hospitals in North America. "The latest project the Shrine of North America has instituted is a pilot research into traumatic conditions of the spinal cord in children

caused by accidents. I predict that this particular research will eventually entail treatment of more children than that carried out in orthopaedic hospitals in the past."

In 1980, over 400 visits were made by B.C. children to these Shrine hospitals and there were over 58,000 active cases in orthopaedic Shrine hospitals alone. This does not include the numbers in arthritic, spinal cord research hospitals or burn hospitals.

Up to the end of 1980, more than a quarter of a million children have been treated in Shrine hospitals. Many of the leading medical specialists in burns and orthopaedic work on the continent have received part of their training in these institutions, including the Shrine Arthritic Research Centre in Montreal.

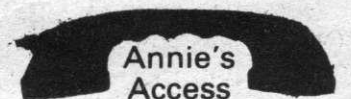

Sgt. Mitch Hanks of Ganges  
RCMP warns that police are about

# Campaign under way at Pender to aid refugees

## Contributed

A campaign is under way on the Pender Islands to canvass donations to help save the lives of refugees in the troubled East African nation of Somalia.

The money raised will help aid hundreds of thousands of homeless people who are the victims of one of the most tragic and least publicized human crises in modern history.

A committee to be known as the Pender Somalia Relief Fund came into existence through discussions of several Pender residents after the island's senior physician, Dr. Don Sutherland, recently went to Somalia on a four-month mission for Oxfam.

He has been made responsible for organizing public health programs and training paramedical personnel at Sa'Abad refugee camp, where 50,000 displaced persons - mostly women and children - are perilously close to starvation. There are 1.2 million refugees in Somalia, driven there from the Ogaden area of Ethiopia where war and famine have combined to lay that region in ruin.

## SMALLER SACRIFICE

The Penderites who formed the refugee fund felt that if Dr. Sutherland could sacrifice his

family and his practice for four months, the people he has served here might make a smaller sacrifice.

It turned out that many shared that view, and the Pender committee has mushroomed from a few to a large group. It is hoped that about 70 volunteer canvassers will be available for a door-to-door blitz beginning Wednesday, Mar. 4, for five days.

On March 14 results of the canvassing will be announced.

The Somalia Fund has as honorary sponsors island residents Mrs. Myrtle MacGregor and Douglas Harker.

The money raised will be channelled through Oxfam and disbursed under the direction of Dr. Sutherland. It is expected that the funds will be wired to him through Oxfam before he returns to Canada in May.

## LACK OF WATER

One of the most serious problems facing the refugees is lack of clean water, and among Oxfam's projects is the construction of solar and petrol water pumps to provide water from wells which are being drilled in the arid Somali plains. Each well and pump costs about \$3,000, and the aim of the Pender fund is to raise enough to pay for at least one well,

drilled and operating.

The open wells which do exist near the camps have been found to be bacteria-ridden, sources of typhus, cholera, tuberculosis, and more common diseases such as measles - easily handled by healthy children of the rich nations but a destroyer of life among the undernourished children of the Somali camps, who are barely able to survive on a daily intake of little more than 1000 calories. Health authorities estimate that 1,800 calories is a minimum survival level.

Sa'Abad camp near Hargeisa, where Dr. Sutherland is working, at last count had a population of 50,000, and that population is growing, swelled by refugees arriving in Somalia at the rate of 800 a day. They have been driven there by long years of war in Ethiopia, and by equally long years of drought and famine that have ravaged East Africa.

## ORGANIZE FACILITIES

Dr. Sutherland's main work is to organize health care facilities for a refugee population that is 10 times the size of the population of all the Gulf Islands, and he is the only doctor at the camp. The health team that he is training is urgently in need of drugs and medical supplies and food to keep the

people alive.

Somalia has recently not only attracted the attention of bodies such as UNICEF, Oxfam and World Concern, but has also stirred the hearts of a number of notable theatre celebrities. The Swedish actress Liv Ullman was there recently and is now on a world tour for UNICEF's Save the Children Fund to raise money to aid the refugees.

Television actress Valerie Harper, star of *Rhoda*, has been touring America campaigning for aid to Somalia, and Stevie Wonder, Dom Deluise, Vidal Sassoon, among other celebrities, are filming public service commercials aimed at raising money and public consciousness of the problem.

## IT ISN'T HOPELESS

Arthur Beals, international director of World Concern, recently wrote from Somalia: 'This morning I saw a sign which read, "The refugee problem isn't hopeless. Unless you think so." That's a little bit of what I'm feeling. The rational side of me says that the situation here is almost without hope.'

"Here's a country that is listed by the United Nations as the fourth poorest in all the world. It's a land of about four million people who

have in just two years received another 1½ million refugees. That's like 60 to 70 million new people entering the United States."

A Christmas donation of relief funds for Somalia was made several weeks ago by the United Community Church on Pender Island.

## Driver collides with boats

Approximately \$3,000 damage resulted from an accident Sunday in which a Ganges man lost control of his auto, which then struck three parked boats at the Ganges Auto Marine.

Ganges RCMP report that Mike Fraser, 19, of Lower Ganges Road, was travelling down Ganges Hill at about 6 am when he turned into the Auto Marine parking lot and collided with the three boats.

Fraser has been charged with driving without due care and attention, said Sgt. Mitch Hanks of the RCMP.

Fraser's 1974 Dodge suffered about \$1,000 damage as a result of the accident.

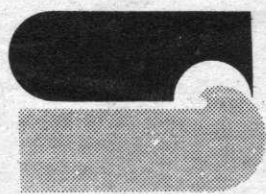

# Farmers' Institute looks back on active year at annual meet

Pender Islands Farmers' Institute and Garden Club held its annual meeting on January 27 at the Legion Hall.

President Joyce Jones chaired the meeting and gave the president's report. She said 1980 was another active year, and noted that the needs are different in every rural area.

Rural areas experience great changes these days with the pressures of increasing population.

"But the Farmers' Institute objectives remain constant and with imagination and energy the pursuit of these objectives can meet the present needs of our small Gulf Island area."

The institute sponsored 11 program meetings during the year. Many subjects were covered, some with slides and films, and attendance varied from 35 to 75 people.

## SPONSORED FAIR

As usual, the Farmers' Institute, in conjunction with the Women's Institute, sponsored the Fall Fair, with Peter Campbell acting as co-ordinator and chairman. During the summer months the institute sponsored a children's art program to encourage creativity and in the Fall Fair children's art categories. In this they were assisted by the Women's Institute.

During the year the institute was responsible for regular monthly visits from a veterinarian from Saanich, who has averaged 10 calls per visit.

The annual children's picnic was once again sponsored by the institute during the summer holidays.

After a workshop and panel discussion on the regional plan for the Islands Trust, a brief was presented on July 5 to the Islands Trust regional plan meeting.

The group has registered its opposition to federal legislation on seed patenting, Bill C-32, in a letter

to Eugene Whalen, minister of agriculture.

## REMOVAL OPPOSED

Also, a letter was sent by the institute to the Agricultural Land Commission objecting to the removal of a piece of land from ALR for the erection of a firehall on South Pender.

The third annual Fun Night was held in December, which raised a large sum of money to be donated to the Pender Islands Health Care Centre.

A report on the Farmers' Market was given by Frank and Joyce Jones. After a successful season including the new venture of opening on Thanksgiving weekend, Mr. and Mrs. Jones said "the market is a venture that is very appropriately sponsored by the institute. It expresses some of the aims and objectives of our constitution, and has boundless potential as an improvement to our rural life."

## OPEN FORUM

In October, the Farmers' Institute sponsored an open forum to discuss the Islands Trust, past

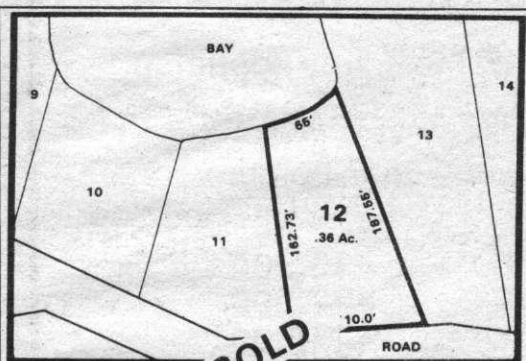

## Good crowd attends Golf Club meeting

The annual meeting of the Galiano Golf and Country Club was held in the clubhouse at 8 pm Saturday. A good crowd was on hand to hear reports of the various club activities, amend the bylaws and elect new officers under the chairmanship of president Bill Paterson.

The club's landlord is the government of B.C., owner of the golf course since 1975. The fact that the government impinges on the club through several different agencies may lead to amusing conflicts. By terms of the lease with the department of recreation 50% of any profit made by the club must be paid to the department, yet by liquor board regulations, no bar profits may be paid to the landlord.

The club secretary and treasurer, with the co-operation of the appropriate bureaucrats, were eventually able to find a way to reconcile these contradictory edicts. When the assessed value of the property for tax purposes was doubled for 1981, it was discovered that the provision for reducing the assessment on a "community facility" had not been observed so the decision was successfully appealed with the aid of several tear-sprinkled letters from the secretary.

## RECOMMENDATIONS

Art Woods, the manager, told members how much he and his wife, Joy, had enjoyed their first year on Galiano. Art had many constructive recommendations for the new board which might increase the use of the club's facilities and improve the operation of the club. He was particularly concerned that the tennis court was not earning its way and suggested it might also be used for volleyball, floor hockey and summer evening square dances.

Marney Burton reported a club membership of 265, 79 of whom are social members. Her duties as chairman of the house committee had proved varied and many. The sub-committee to consider the extension of the clubhouse was recommending the construction of an office on club premises, complete remodelling of the clubhouse including a new bar. The pro shop has already been expanded and, with changes made by the manager, increased service and range of products available have been provided.

## HEALTHY YEAR

Treasurer Jim Robertson reported a healthy financial year ending in the black. To cope with inflation members voted in favour of increasing membership fees for 1981 although green fees will

remain unchanged.

Amendments to the bylaws were approved, changing the administration to a board of directors, four of whom will be elected at each annual meeting to serve a two-year term. In addition, men's and ladies' captains will be members of the board. The directors will elect the club's officers from among themselves.

At the ensuing elections Jean Lockwood, Jim Robertson, Al Lantinga and George Stephens were elected for two-year terms and Elspeth King, Lillian Morissette, Jamie Linton and Ellis Goodrich were elected for one year. Ladies' captain is Linda Carpinin and men's captain is Frank Sarson.

On Monday evening directors of the club elected officers for the coming year. Al Lantinga will serve as president; George Stevens, vice-president; Jean Lockwood, secretary; and Jim Robertson, treasurer.

## Status of Women

Galiano was well represented at the Saturday evening birthday party for the Vancouver Status of Women, held February 21 at Highcroft, University Women's Club, where the organization came into existence 10 years ago. Well over 100 women came to celebrate the fact that Vancouver Status of Women is alive and well after 10 years of doing battle for women's rights in this area.

Five speakers recounted with humour the decade of skirmishes resulting in both victories and defeats. Rosemary Brown gave a clear and urgent call for more women to enter politics, for it is only as members of decision-making bodies that they can influence legislation that is of vital concern to women.

The high point of the evening for all, and particularly for those attending from Galiano, was the presentation of Sylvia Spring's audio-visual program, *Women of Canada*. With slide pictures from three projectors fading in and out on the screen, accompanied by music, Sylvia presented a fascinating series of images of Canadian women at work, women from many nations and provinces, many walks of life, all ages and a variety of occupations including mother and housewife. It was pleasing to

see Sylvia's excellent photographs of Galiano women at work: Nancy Quist, Francine Renaud, Shari Street and Elisabeth Hopkins.

Sylvia is to be congratulated for her fine photography and for creating this tribute to women and their work.

## Housing Society

The annual meeting of the Galiano Island Housing Society was held in the lounge at Page Drive on Sunday afternoon. This non-profit society is responsible for operating the senior citizens' housing complex at Page Drive. Twenty members were present for this, the fifth annual general meeting with president Winnie Liver in the chair.

In her report the president announced that Joe Fleming had been made an honorary member of the society for his sterling work as manager over the past year and more. She thanked Jean Tully and Sheila Ripley for creating the rhododendron garden in memory of their mother, Mrs. Isobel Murphy, who was one of the first tenants of the complex and a founder of the Senior Citizens Association.

The work of retiring treasurer Art McKenzie was much appreciated and that of Frank Greenhalgh for his unstinting diligence as rent-collector. George Tully was thanked for his maintenance of the emergency generator. Mrs. Liver also thanked the directors for all their work for the society and the tenants during the past year.

### FIVE YEARS AGO

Five members were named to the Salt Spring Island Recreation Commission at its annual meeting at the Gulf Islands Secondary School on Monday evening. To serve for two years are Ray Tenisci, Loes Holland, Jack Albhouse, Edith Barber and Rodney Pringle. All were elected by acclamation.

James Russell Wood lost his life when his log cabin on Fernwood Road was destroyed by fire on Thursday evening last week. It was Wood's second bout with fire. About a year ago he was rescued from his smoking home by a neighbour after a fire resulted from his smoking in bed.

The treasurer of the Gulf Islands Heart Unit reports that it has raised just over \$1,400 in this year's Heart Fund campaign. The local organization raised \$3,400 in last year's campaign.

The Islands Trust should be phased out of existence as community plans for the islands are adopted, according to the regional districts. Representatives of all seven regional districts which have islands in the Trust area met with Municipal Affairs Minister Hugh Curtis and the three appointed members of the Trust on February 18 to explain why they felt the Trust should be abolished. Spokesman for the regional district delegation, Harold Lennox, chairman of the Powell River Regional District, made it clear that all seven districts agree that the Islands Trust has outlived its usefulness.

The project has been enthusiastically received by the community with the Lions having already presented the committee with a \$1,000 cheque. The Rotary Club is under-

taking the costs of furnishings for the children's playground.

Salt Spring Island farmers will attend the annual meeting of the oldest organization on the island next Wednesday. The Salt Spring Island Farmers' Institute will hear annual reports and elect officers for the coming year.

Norman Mouat, chairman of the transportation committee, reported on the efforts of the Islands Joint Council to establish an efficient ferry schedule. Parks committee chairman Ernie Booth reported that the chamber is hoping to interest the department of recreation and conservation in a 400-acre block of land as an extension to Mouat Park.

## Family left homeless after fire

A Salt Spring Island family was left homeless February 13 after an early-morning blaze reduced their nearly completed house to a pile of smoldering ashes.

But the efforts of a concerned neighbour to raise money on their behalf, have left the three devastated members of the Ottosen family of Beddis Road with a ray of hope.

Fifteen firemen and three pieces of equipment answered the call to the Ottosen house, at 1335 Beddis Road, shortly before two o'clock in the morning, but the house was already engulfed by flames by the time firemen arrived at the scene.

Fortunately, Niels and Greta Ottosen and their five-year-old daughter Kayla were visiting relatives in Victoria at the time. It's believed that the house was insured.

The two bedroom house, which Niels Ottosen had been in the pro-

cess of building, was burned to the ground, with just a portion of the chimney left standing.

#### STARTED DRIVE

Pam Clement, a next-door neighbour, has started a drive to raise money for the Ottosens. She has opened an account at the Bank of Commerce where she works and where donations can be deposited.

She said that an announcement during services at Ganges United Church resulted in church-goers donating about \$100, which helped to get the fund off to a good start.

Clement encourages people to make cash contributions to the fund because the Ottosens have no place to store goods while getting re-established.

The family is staying with relatives in Victoria.

#### AT 1.30

The alarm was sounded by another neighbour, Jeremy Goodwin, at about 1:30 am.

Fire chief Bob Leask said the single-storey house was totally ablaze and that the chimney had already collapsed by the time the department arrived.

He said that firemen had the fire under control within 20 minutes but remained at the scene for about another hour and a half dousing the smoldering ruins with water.

Cause of the fire has yet to be determined and it may prove difficult to pinpoint its origin due to the extent of the damage, according to Leask.

Clement said that smoke and hot cinders rose about 100 feet into the air and that the fire generated so much heat that dampness caused steam to rise from their own home next door.

"I've never been so frightened since the blitz. It was really just something I never want to see again," she said.

### Camera stolen

A Salt Spring Island construction worker reports that a 35 mm camera was stolen after he left it at a construction site on Salt Spring Way.

When the man returned to the site, he noticed that his Voigtlander 35 mm camera and its brown leather case were missing.

The theft occurred February 19.
