ELECTIONS '82: The islands candidates

Gulf Islands School Board: two-year term, Salt Spring

Gulf Islands School Board candidates are listed here and on Page Twenty-Two. Islands Trust candidates will be featured next week.

David Eyles

David Eyles became involved in the process of creating the new school in Fulford and served as chairman of the parents committee which informed the school board what kind of school they wanted.

He is seeking office to continue that involvement in the education system.

He was born in Vancouver and holds both Bachelor's and Master's degrees in Education from the University of Victoria. He and his wife, Carole have two children, Tony, 3, and Natasha, 6.

Eyles has attained familiarity with and experience in the educational system through his involvement as college counsellor and director of University Student Services at Notre Dame and Selkirk community colleges.

"In these tough economic times," Eyles noted in his campaign literature, "it is all the more important that our educational system be administered economically and efficiently while maintaining a quality educational experience for all our children."

FARMER

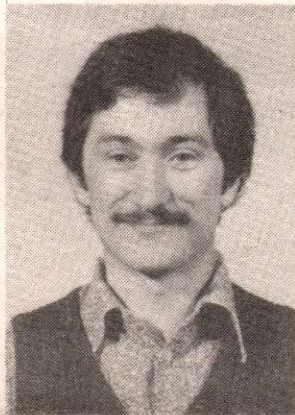
As a farmer endeavouring to develop his land into a more workable farm, Eyles said he has both the time and the desire to make a strong commitment to the

job of trustee. Although he lives in Fulford, he would represent all Salt Springers.

The school district, he said "should seek to ensure that our graduates are better equipped to go into today's world of work and future education."

The school board should also "ensure that decisions regarding economic restraint are made on a sound educational basis," he said.

"To help the decisions necessary to accomplish this some educational experience is a help," and Eyles said he has such experience.



Judy Ripley

Judy Ripley is a homemaker who is concerned about the education of her two children currently in the Gulf Islands School system.

She seeks office as trustee to make sure money spent by the school board will provide a good basic education without hurting the taxpayer.

She was born in Halifax, Nova

Scotia and came to Salt Spring Island five years ago, after living in the lower mainland.

Following graduation from high school, in 1962, she worked for an ear, nose and throat specialist.

She decided to travel and toured the United States and Europe. She eventually settled in Prince George where she met her husband.

FOR CHILDREN

"I am running for election," she said, "basically for children and their best interests. If anything interferes with those interests, I'd like to be able to deal with those problems."

A trustee should approach the job with common sense and logic, she said. An ability to listen with an open mind is also an asset. The details of the office require close study, and an understanding of the ins and outs of the School Act are also requirements, she said.

If elected, she would seek opinions from the public in order to make informed decisions.



Yvette Valcourt

Yvette Valcourt is running for school board because she is angry.

She said two things bother her about the current school board. As Salt Spring director at the Capital Regional District she has experienced difficulties obtaining information from the school board. The public, she said, should be able to receive more information than it does.



Her second point involves the "scare tactics used against parents" with regard to the new school in Fulford. The parents were told that if the school is not built now, it wouldn't be built for at least five more years.

Valcourt is in the first year of her second term with the CRD. She is mother of 10 children with 10 more grandchildren.

She came to Salt Spring in 1966 with her husband, Phil. The couple had lived in Langford before moving to the island. Valcourt was born in Mahler, Alberta.

BOTH JOBS

If elected to the school board, she said she could handle both jobs, as trustee and CRD director. Both boards currently sit in council on Wednesdays.

The Gulf Islands School Board, she said, faces many problems which she would look into if elected. The board needs a strong voice, she said, in setting priorities for the budget.

"I'm after getting the best deal for the students for the dollar," she said.

Who can vote?

Who can vote on November 20? When *Driftwood* asked Returning Officer Jean Vodden for the guidelines, she produced a long list of qualifications.

Every person whose name appears on the voters list of the Capital Regional District is entitled to vote in the voting area concerned.

To be so qualified, a person must be entitled, in the province of British Columbia, to the privileges of a natural-born Canadian citizen or a British subject: he must have resided in this country for at least 12 months and in the province for at least six months and in the area where he votes for at least three months immediately before his application for registration as an elector.

NOT SO

No person may vote if he is disqualified from doing so under the municipal act or any law in the province.

A voter who is challenged at the

polls may vote if he takes the oath as set out in the municipal act. If he refuses to take that oath, then he is not entitled to vote.

A qualified resident whose name does not appear on the voters list may cast a ballot after signing an application for registration as an elector.

TWO FORMS

A qualified non-resident has the same privilege, but completes the application for registration as a non-resident property owner or elector.

Vote early and often is out.

Voters may only vote once and they may only vote for as many candidates as there are offices to fill.

From now until election day the returning officer will be at home to answer questions. On voting day she will be at the School Board Office in Ganges, 537-5548. Mrs. Vodden is eager to answer any question or query relating to the election.

Charles Baltzer

Charles Baltzer helped guide a school district through economic restraint once before and he is willing to do it again.

He was serving on the Maple Ridge school board when W.A.C. Bennett imposed restrictions on educational spending. He is serving on the Gulf Islands school board when Bill Bennett is putting the province through a similar exercise.

With more than 20 years experience in school administration, Baltzer said, "With my past experience, I think I still have something to contribute to education."

He works for B.C. Tel and is active in both the Salt Spring Rotary and the local Legion. He has seen each of his five children through the educational system, although his son died just before graduation. Each of the other four has gone on to university.

"Stability," said Baltzer, "is most important at this time. The system is going to need a lot of stability in the next couple of years."

He had considered stepping down as trustee, but many people, he said, had urged him to stay.



"Now is the time not to quit," he said, "especially during restraint. The board will need someone with experience to work within the framework of the whole system."

Baltzer has served as chairman of both the Gulf Islands and Maple Ridge school boards. He said a trustee must maintain a balance of three duties required of a school board: the school board must supply the buildings and facilities as well as the teachers to educate the children. The board must also ensure the availability of money to finance the first two functions, he said.

Bert Beitel

Bert Beitel has managed the Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce in Ganges for the past five years. For the last two of those years he has served as Salt Spring trustee on the Gulf Islands School Board.

Beitel said that the reasons which prompted him to stand for office two years ago remain valid. With three children in the system, he wants to ensure the best quality education possible for them and for all children in the Gulf Islands.

His years of handling finances

prove invaluable for the board, he said.

"During this time of restraint, it is increasingly more important that all levels of education become more responsible and accountable for their actions," he said.

Beitel is also active in the Salt Spring Rotary Club and is a member of the Parish Council of Our Lady of Grace Church in Ganges.

EVALUATION

One way to ensure quality education for Gulf Islands students, he said, is to evaluate all programs being offered. The task should be completed within eight months of the term of the new board and any program which has outlived its effectiveness should be dropped, he said.

"This program evaluation should ensure that our children receive the best quality education which the district can provide," he said.

"My prime reason for seeking re-election remains as it was two years ago," he said, "to obtain maximum educational value to the students for each tax dollar spent."



ELECTIONS '82: THE ISLANDS CANDIDATES

School board: one-year term, Salt Spring

Pat Baines

Pat Baines said that resourceful solutions are needed to the problems of financing education in the Gulf Islands and the resources are there to use.

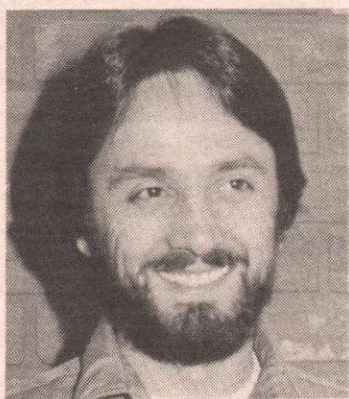
He was born in Cranbrook but graduated from high school in Surrey. He has been married for 11 years and the family includes three children, two of whom are in elementary school. He has lived on Salt Spring for 9½ years.

As an electrical contractor, he served four years apprenticeship in Smithers. On Salt Spring he became involved in the Chamber of Commerce and was elected vice-president before stepping down.

He seeks the job as trustee because "right now the education system is having the squeeze put on it by the provincial government when they try to centralize decisions in Victoria."

When the ministry of education controls the dollars, he said, they control the system. He would like to see the Gulf Islands School Board have more local control and he feels that the board is in a good position to do just that.

"I'd like to see local boards,



province-wide, regain and maintain as much local control as they can. That would ensure that the board here would be able to do the best job possible, here."

"Children are our number one resource," he said, "and I want to make sure they have the best possible environment for learning."

He is pro-education, he said, both provincially and locally and sees a necessity for trustees to be tenacious in holding the line against the provincial government.

Robin Cherney

Robin Cherney worked as an aide in the Gulf Islands Program Serving Youth until her position was dropped, due to the restraint program.

She is a mother of two children and has made working with children her occupation. She holds a bachelor's degree in social work and is a member of the B.C. Child Care Services Association.

She would approach the task of trustee with a belief in growth and change not through idealism but through an attitude of doing what she can.

One area of improvement she would look at involves communications. She would work to set a tone of trust between the board, the public, as well as



with teachers and other school board employees.

"It's a time when we're going to

have to work a lot harder," she said, "towards working together."

FISCAL RESTRAINT

Another problem facing the new school board will be dealing with the fiscal restraint for 1983. The way to handle the problems, she said, is to set priorities for spending in order to make decisions which would be in the best interests of the children.

With her degree from the University of Victoria, Cherney has worked with children through a probation office as well as through child care counselling.

She also has an understanding of the classroom side of education having gained credits towards a teacher's certificate from Simon Fraser University.

School board, Galiano

Michael Hoebel

Michael Hoebel has been active in community organizations on Galiano Island.

He is a volunteer with the South Galiano Fire Department and a director of the fire department society. As well, he is active in affairs of the Galiano Club and the Activity Centre Society.

He and his wife have a son in the elementary school on that island and as a former teacher and professor of education, he has a strong interest in education, he said.

"As a property owner and taxpayer, I share the concerns of many others about educational financing and obtaining maximum value for our educational expenditures," Hoebel said.

In addition to his personal

interest in education, the involvement with Galiano Activity Centre Society prompted him to seek a seat on the school board.

The education system faces tough times, he said, and the financial restraint program of the government has not helped. He feels that school facilities should be made available to the community whenever possible.

If elected as trustee, he said, he would work towards helping organize afternoon and evening recreational use of the activity centre as well as the school. The activity centre would allow adult education classes to be conducted by qualified Galiano residents as well as visitors from elsewhere.

"In the near future, important decisions will have to be made



regarding priorities for our district," he said. Co-operation and flexibility will be required of everyone.

"If everyone works together our educational system can not only be preserved but improved for the benefit of school children and the whole community," he said.

Ron McQuiggan

Ron McQuiggan would bring sound financial experience to the school board if elected.

He works as a notary public and real estate appraiser. The money experience comes from those occupations as well as from his efforts as chairman of the fund-raising committee involved with the expansion of the Salt Spring library.

McQuiggan was born in Winnipeg, Manitoba, and graduated from Royal Military College in Kingston with a Bachelor of Science degree. He also obtained a Bachelor of Arts degree from Queens University in the same city.

When he worked for Xerox, Canada, as a business planner, he helped develop one of the first computer-based budget plans in use in Canada.

He can see the possibilities of such a system to help plan the budgets of the Gulf Islands School District.

McQuiggan has also served as president of the Salt Spring Lions Club, a director of the library board and as a member of the fund-raising committee for Mahon Hall.

He seeks the task of trustee as an



"opportunity to gain more local control over the school system and the way funds are raised to support it."

The School Act, he noted, will be changed next year and trustees have a chance to influence the minister of education on the subject of local control, but only with the right approach.

The budget of the Gulf Islands school system has doubled in the past four years, he said.

"With the funds available, we should have a good system which everyone is pleased with. But that's not the case."



Andrew Loveridge

Andrew Loveridge would use the resources of the Galiano Island community to cope with the financial crisis facing the Gulf Islands education system.

Loveridge, a 30-year-old native of Birmingham, England, received a Bachelor of Arts degree in Spanish and German from Trent University in Peterborough, Ontario. He came to Galiano in

1979 because he enjoys the atmosphere of island life.

Currently he is the librarian at the Galiano School and had helped set that library up. As a director of the Galiano Club and treasurer of the Galiano Peace Group, he has uncovered talent in the population of Galiano which could be used at the school.

The library work has offered him the opportunity to be in contact with the process of education and while not being part of the official structure, he has been able to maintain an independent view of the process.

The provincial government and the teachers' federation are set in their ways, he said, which makes them remote.

"We must pull together as best we can," he said. "I attack only those who say, 'It can't be done.'"

"The time for protest is past," said Loveridge. "The need now is to create."

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Signs of affluence still seen in England

In 1982 England is, on the whole, not a happy country. At the latest count there are four million people unemployed — that is, they are declared redundant, a fancy word economists use to soften its meaning.

They generally live on the dole, before or after they spent their redundancy payments which, in some cases, are quite large.

All political parties now realize that unemployment is the key factor in their success or failure. Michael Foot, the brilliant writer and orator, who leads the Labour Party, declared at the annual Labour conference in September that "the Tories have reduced the richest country in Europe to an industrial wasteland." He was wildly cheered.

On a trip to Shropshire, my wife and I saw many factories in the Midlands closed and their chimneys smokeless, whereas in former years we found the air around the industrial cities polluted and the plants beehives of activity.

MAD LOVE AFFAIR

Although England is suffering from the deepest depression since the 1930's, many signs of the affluent age are still visible, as, for example, the ubiquity of the motor car. English people have a mad love affair with the automobile, like the Canadians, Americans and Japanese, so that cities are jammed with cars, villages are scoured by traffic pileups, including 40-ton lorries of English and continental companies, and though petrol is over \$3.50 a gallon people seem to be driving as much as ever — that is those who haven't had their autos repossessed.

In Surrey, where we lived, there was a plethora of cars, mostly fairly new, around the shiny new apartment houses, and the old houses as well. Car advertising is the single largest category in terms of lineage in the *Daily Telegraph* which I read.

The ads are full page, for domestic and foreign makes as well. England has a tough quota on foreign cars which comprise less than 15% of sales.

PRICE STRUCTURE

As Frank Richards noted when he was in England earlier this year, the general price structure for many commodities is higher than in Canada, thanks partly to VAT (value added tax) of 15% which the Tories raised from 8% when they took office in 1979. This money goes to pay for England's Common Market membership and the high salaries of thousands of bureaucrats living in splendour in Brussels, headquarters of the Common Market, and as subsidies to farmers to produce commodities which become the Market's property if they cannot be sold in normal trade channels.

The result is that the Market owns mountains of butter, cheese,

and other items, subsidized by the English, and other nations, that are eventually sold to Russia and other "undeveloped" countries at bargain basement prices. Meanwhile, the consumer in England pays a high price for these foods, though not as high as in Canada.

FOOD CHEAPER

In general, food in the markets is less expensive in England than here, especially bread (which as the staff of life is subsidized by the government), eggs, cheese, cookies, crackers, canned and fresh fruits and vegetables.

Restaurant prices are outrageous as a whole.

I noticed men's clothing is also less expensive than in Canada or the United States, and usually of better quality, except in such fancy London stores as Burberry's or Harrod's. One can still get a pair of good men's trousers for about \$75 and jackets for \$125, and this is one reason why some of us get to England frequently enough to buy good English clothes. Ten years ago a two-piece suit could be made to order for \$50 by a tailor in Holborn.

One of the main reasons for visiting England, however, is to live for a time in the most civilized country in the world where courtesy prevails; where BBC and ITV provide a high quality of educational and cultural programs daily and the news is presented without the interference of stupid commercials. A country where one can read papers like the *Telegraph* that compact the world's vast panorama of news in 40 pages or less, and pay due attention to the arts, literature, architecture and the like, and also offer intelligent capsule summaries of the day's TV offerings and next morning perceptive reviews of the most important programs.

This is why one usually feels a bit of culture shock when he gets home.

Schedule causing hardships for many islanders

Since the winter schedule came into operation in September a considerable number of Gulf Island residents have been forced to spend the night away from home because they were unable to get back to their island on the 6:30 pm sailing of the *Mayne Queen*.

An elderly couple, in not particularly good health, arrived at the terminal an hour before sailing time but were still unable to get their vehicle on board. Their case is typical and it is not surprising that the stress and ill-affordable cost of overnight accommodation generates anger which is unfortunately directed against the wrong people, the terminal staff at Swartz Bay.

The terminal agent's log at Swartz Bay records a long sequence of such incidents and includes pleas to higher authority for permission to add a sailing. There are also warnings that if the level of anger continues to escalate, violence or damage might result. The situation is at its worst on Friday evenings when weekenders augment the traffic.

The *Mayne Queen* can load a minimum of 65 vehicles and this is the number allowed through the wicket. If there are no large commercial vehicles in the line-up it is probable that another 10 cars can be loaded, so this number of drivers are advised to remain on standby outside the terminal. If the proportion of small cars is high and the crew both skilful and lucky, up to 80 cars can be packed on the deck of the *Mayne Queen*. After that — "the next sailing will be at 5:35 am."

The obvious cause of the evening overload is the removal of the Swartz Bay-Otter Bay run from the schedule. During the morning three boatloads of vehicles are brought into Swartz Bay, but there are only two sailings (at 3:30 and 6:30 pm) to take them back. As one learns in primary math, three into two won't go. Consequently almost every weekday frustrated travellers are left behind.

It is difficult to determine at what level in the hierarchy decisions are made. Certainly not by the terminal staff and passenger agents yet these are the people who receive most of the complaints and abuse.

Frank Ramsay, the area operations manager, must have some executive authority, but probably has little option except to carry out policy set at a higher level. Ramsay wants complaints directed through the Islands Trust, but for Galiano the trustee transportation representative is Ed Williams of Mayne.

It would seem that the only hope of remedy is through political pressure, so next time you are left behind at Swartz Bay, don't get mad with the staff there - it isn't their fault. Phone or write to your

Let's Die Living

Former owner-operator of the Galiano Lodge with her husband Allan, Vivienne Clarke has just written a book with the intriguing title *Let's Die Living*. After they left Galiano the Clarkes went to work as volunteers for CESO assisting developing countries with their tourist industries, and their adventures while on this assignment provide the material for this book.

This is not the first book Vivienne has written for, while still at Galiano Lodge in 1968, she wrote *Witchin' in the Kitchen* - a collection of easy-to-prepare recipes that she and her chefs had used at the Lodge. Other interests of the Clarkes include puppets and historical costumes.

The Clarkes ran the Lodge during one of its heydays, in the 60's. Many visitors came by boat from as far away as California, and the fame of its restaurant was widespread.

This is a sad contrast with the present situation, for last week the Lodge had to close its doors through lack of funds. The

ambitious plans for large-scale time-sharing development seem to have foundered on the economic rocks and a change in taxation rules. The difficulties being experienced by the Lodge have thrown the staff out of work at a time when it is most difficult to find alternate employment.

During the past dozen years the Lodge has seen more than its share of failure and tragedy. It is to be hoped that something can be salvaged from the wreckage of so many dreams.

UNICEF Cards

Last year Donald Macdonald of Retreat Cove was unable to obtain Unicef cards on Galiano. This year he is making sure of getting his supply of Christmas cards by acting as the selling agent for this international organization for children in need throughout the world.

Proposed Salt Spring Island Trust Committee By-law No. 69, being Amendment By-law No. 9, 1981, is a By-law to amend By-law No. 14 cited as "Zoning By-law No. 2, Salt Spring Island, 1978", as follows:

1. By creating a new zone, the "Uplands and Forest Cluster" (UFC) zone. This zone permits uses which are similar to those uses permitted in the "Uplands and Forest" (UF) zone as defined in the Salt Spring Island Zoning By-law No. 2, Salt Spring Island, 1978. It also permits the construction and use on one lot of a number of dwellings and seasonal cottages in relationship to the size of the lot and subject to certain conditions as specified in the proposed By-law.
2. By changing the zoning classification of a portion of D.L. 35, North Salt Spring Island, Cowichan District, as indicated by Plan No. 1 which is attached to and forms part of the proposed By-law, from the "Uplands and Forest" (UF) and "Watershed 1" (W1) zones to "Uplands and Forest Cluster" (UFC) zone, and to designate this area as a "Development Permit Area".

A copy of the proposed By-law may be reviewed at the offices of the Capital Regional District, Building Inspection Department, in the Provincial Government Building, Ganges, B.C., during normal working hours of 1:00 p.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday to Friday inclusive. Greek artists.

A tour of North America in 1978 persuaded Enzo and his wife to come to Canada and the West Coast. They found that Galiano had the double advantage of quiet beauty and easy access to the greater cultural centre of Vancouver.

Enzo's recent creations utilize a wide range of materials and techniques. He has carved in wood and stone, in both abstract and realistic styles. He casts in bronze by the traditional lost-wax method with a modern refinement known as shell mould casting. He is incorporating modern synthetic materials such as tinted plexiglass and coloured resins into wood and metal sculpture with exciting results. On a smaller scale he creates costume-jewellery in silver and semi-precious stones.

Up to 50 pieces of Enzo's work will be on display at the Earthen Things Gallery near Sturdies Bay Wharf on the weekend of November 27-28. The exhibition will also feature the paintings of Betty Steward who needs no introduction to local residents or to the B.C. art community.

Down Through the Years with Driftwood

Twenty years ago

The Gulf Islands School Board invited the public to an open house at the new school board office. The public health people also had space in the building. The ceremony to officially open the building was set for 2 pm November 13 and the offices would be open for inspection until 4 pm.

The Ganges school soccer team lost two close games against a visiting team from Hope. The local side were defeated 3-2 and 2-0 in games played in the morning and afternoon.

A group of parents from Fulford threw a Hallowe'en party for youngsters at the Fulford Hall. Prizes were awarded for various categories of costumes and the children enjoyed games and refreshments.

The hospital reported 55 patients under care during October. The operating room had been used for two major and 30 minor operations and five blood transfusions were given. The board of directors was to meet later in the month to interview applicants for the position of administrator.

Archdeacon G.H. Holmes would be conducting his last official services on the coming Sunday. He was to be part of services at four Anglican churches at various parts of the island. He was to retire after devoting 21 years to the Salt Spring parish.

Fifteen years ago

The school superintendent retired from several years service to the Gulf Islands School District. He had also been serving as superintendent for the Saanich School District. F.A. McLellan was given a token of appreciation from the trustees and R. Price was announced as his replacement.

Hallowe'en was quiet, reported Ganges RCMP. Several traffic signs were pushed down and at least one broken window reported. Other signs of exuberant spirits were to be seen but overall, the spooky evening was peaceful.

The Salt Spring Chamber of Commerce was studying at least two sites as a location for a boat launching ramp. One site was on Long Harbour near the ferry terminal and the other was at the

foot of Quebec Drive. Beddis Beach had been rejected as a location following protests from residents in the area.

Ferry service between Fulford Harbour and Swartz Bay was inadequate, claimed the Salt Spring Chamber of Commerce. The group of merchants sent a letter to the ferry corporation explaining the transportation needs of the island. The letter noted that more than 800 auto licences had been issued islanders that year. During the previous year, 16 new businesses sprang up and 74 new buildings were constructed.

Home delivery of raw milk was phased out by Burgoyne Dairy due to a drop in consumption. The milk would be available, by the bottle, in stores around the island. The drop in consumption added to labour turnover and the cost of the delivery by truck ended a part of the Salt Spring scene.

Ten years ago

A memorial cairn was dedicated to land surveyor Peter Arnell. The cairn was located on Salt Spring in the Stewart Road park named in tribute to Arnell who had been shot while surveying on Galiano Island in 1968. He and Gavin Reynolds had surveyed the site as an alternative park to Mouat Park in Ganges.

Volleyball teams from the Gulf Islands Secondary School won two championships in tournaments on Vancouver Island. The senior boys and the senior girls teams were named mid-island champs after coming out on top in their respective events.

Five years ago

The Salt Spring Island Farmers' Market would not be closed, said the chairman of the Capital Regional District board, Jim Campbell of Saturna. He said the matter was being looked on by the CRD as purely a local problem. Any solutions would have to be decided by residents of Salt Spring, he said.

The sewer area in Ganges may be changed, said Hugh Curtis, MLA for Saanich and the Islands. He was commenting on a question about the area involved. He said he

was reluctant to recommend postponing the project because of escalating costs. He also said his ministry of municipal affairs would be reviewing the sewer petition.

The Galiano Chamber of Commerce met to discuss various projects on that island. A suggestion to dress the ferry wharf at Sturdies Bay in Christmas lights was put forward and would be looked into.

The Salt Spring Players were primed for their production of *Blythe Spirit*. The play would be presented on four days and was directed by five-year veteran of the Players, Ken Gaylor.

Central Hall would be renovated and expanded with money from grants given by various governments. The building dating from the 1880's had been used variously as a school, a jail as well as a meeting place for islanders.

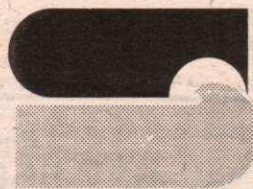
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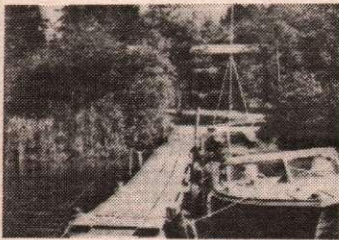

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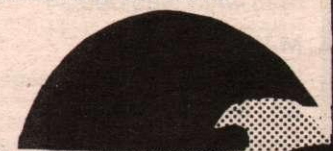
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The Slug Trail

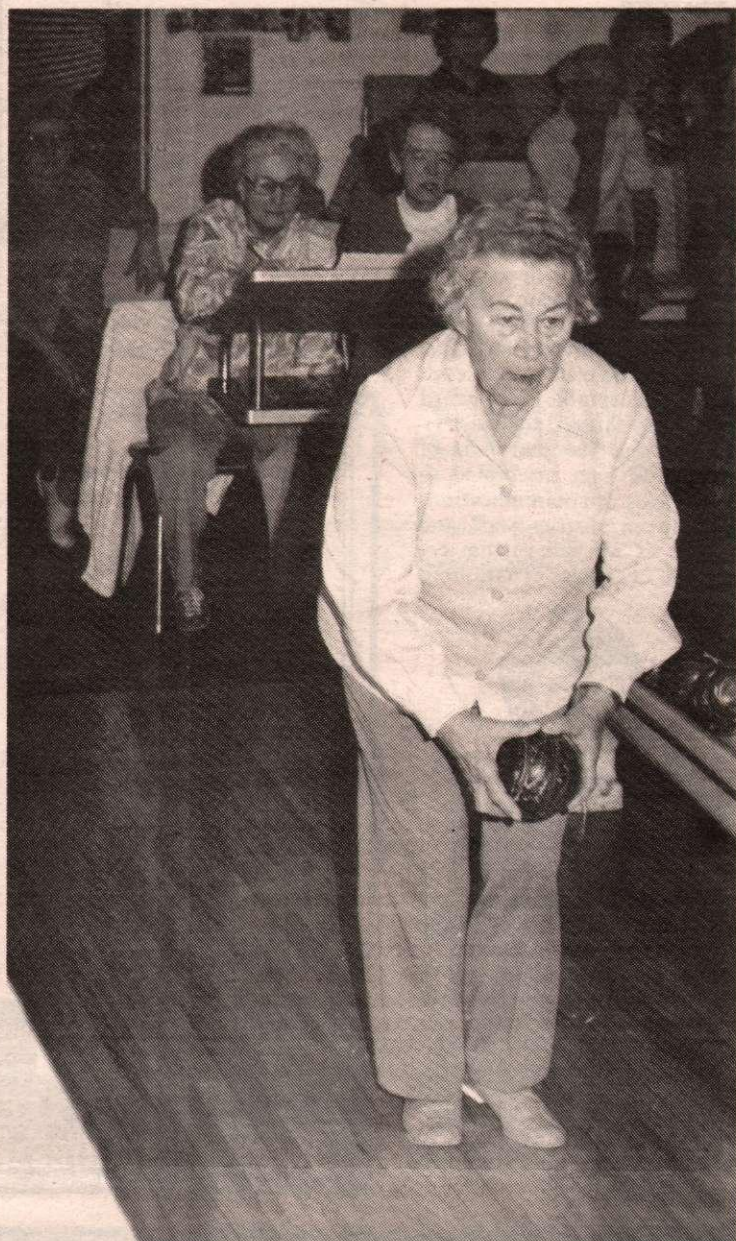

Parents complain to trustees

When children were used by several teachers to carry the message of protest against government action, parents complained to school trustees.

The trustees, following discussion of the incidents, issued a statement condemning such actions on the part of teachers. The board was concerned, said chairman Strick Aust, that teachers who were not involving their pupils would be upset by the statement.

The school board, however, felt the necessity of making a statement so the community would realize the board does not condone the involvement of the children in the controversy over restraint.

Mike Hayes, president of the Gulf Islands Teachers' Association, told the board, "We as an association have been very sensitive of involvement of students in the program."

He said the executive of GITA had told the teachers to keep partisan feelings out of the classroom.

NOT THE ASSOCIATION

"We have never, as an association, promoted or involved the children in any action, even though it concerns them," he said.

Charles Hingston, trustee for Salt Spring Island, told Hayes, "I'd like to assure GITA that the complaints came only in a few instances. They were brought to the board by concerned parents and apparently only a few teachers were doing it."

Aust asked Hayes to pass the concern of the board along to the teachers but noted that the board could not do much about the situation except inform the public.

"I appreciate that you can't hit them over the head with a two-by-four," he said in asking Hayes to inform the teachers.

The statement issued by the

board follows.
STATEMENT

"During the basic teaching program conducted by GITA, a small number of teachers involved their students in the program by discussing their concerns with them.

"The board recognizes and respects the GITA's right to take actions that they deem necessary to make the public aware of their concerns over the present restraint program, but to involve students, especially at the elementary level, is totally unacceptable to the board and unfair to those students.

"Throughout the past year of restraints, we have attempted to keep the lines of communications open between district staff and ourselves, as we believe that co-operation creates trust, and

mutual trust is necessary for the continuation of a strong education system in this district.

"We cannot allow this action to pass without registering our strongest protest.

"It is our hope that the teachers who have involved students in their trust will recognize that this type of action is counter-productive to the creation of trust in the district and it is also our hope that they will refrain from similar actions in the future."
