Shipyard goes to wood

New truant takes to the water

The crowd, watching the launching of the new ship in Ganges recently, recognized the crew but not the vessel.

The general curiosity was summed up by an onlooker who said, "That's not a Truant."

But the vessel is a Truant although not the familiar plastichulled sailboat for which Truant Marine has become famous. The Salt Spring shipwrights have changed to a different style of vessel.

"We're into a new style of construction," said Mike Betts of

The Ganges boatbuilders have sold the rights to the fibreglass sailboat, the Truant 37, and their new ship, a Heritage 31, was designed by John Lovett of Sidney. The Heritage 31, as the name

implies, is a 31 foot wooden ship.
"We can do everything on this ship from a pile of lumber," said Betts. The main timber frames and two of the layers making up the hull are of cedar milled in Fulford by

Mel Marchbank. **NEITHER WAY**

The designer's notes describe the craft as meeting "the needs of a particular customer who required a vessel of traditional lines without the usual association of either a converted fishing vessel or an outof-work tugboat."

The Heritage 31 combines features of two vessels from the east coast of England. In the last century, two towns on that coast were rivals in fishing. Each town had a distinctive fishing boat. The design by Lovett takes advantage of the best of both vessels.

The ship has a vertical bow and an oval stern. It is powered by an engine of up to 50 horsepower with top speed of 8.5 knots. The engine consumes 1.25 gallons of fuel per hour and the ship has fuel capacity for 100 gallons. The range is close to 800 miles. There is also accommodation for 100 gallons of

The vessel has a draft of two feet eight inches and displaces 11,556 pounds. The three-blade propellor measures 18 by either 14 or 16

The wheelhouse offers visibility in all directions and the engine is directly below

APPOINTMENTS

Inside, the forward cabin contains a vee-berth which follows the contour of the bow. There is a wardrobe on the right and the toilet is on the left.

The rear cabin doubles as a cooking-dining area and sleeping quarters with twin berths.

As the vessel sat on the trailer at the launch site, Betts surveyed the sweep of the hull. He said the Heritage 31 was probably the first vessel constructed with that hull configuration since early in this century.

Truant Marine's shipwrights, Betts and his brother Dave along with Tom Gilbert had worked 12 weeks to finish the vessel. Dennis

Beamish applied the fiberglass coating on the ship.

The hull was assembled by gluing three layers of wood with epoxy resin. The layers are diagonal to each other for strength as well as to keep the weight down.

The inner two layers of the hull are cedar and the outer layer is mahogany.

GRACEFULLY OLDER

At the launch site, the trailer rolled down the ramp and the Heritage 31 hit the water. With Betts and Gilbert aboard, the engines were revved and the vessel was taken around the harbour to Truant's boathouse. The vessel will be checked to determine how it sits in the water. The bow should sit high and the shipbuilders will trim the vessel accordingly.

The Heritage 31, notes the designer, "is a vessel which will grow old gracefully and become a classic, endearing her to owners in a way that few modern vessels are able.'

Valcourt under fire

Citing an "untenable and unacceptable situation", the Salt Spring Parks and Recreation Commission moved censure against regional director Yvette Valcourt

The motion reads: "...that the regional director, Mrs. Valcourt, be censured by the Salt Spring Parks and Recreation Commission for repeated episodes of confrontation and lack of consideration for the commission and its members.

The motion will be brought forward at the next meeting of the commission on May 16. Valcourt had left the meeting by the time the motion was presented but she had been given a copy of it before she

The reasons for the motion date from three years ago. When the commission tried to establish a recreation complex for Salt Spring, Valcourt did not raise any objections at any meeting. Just before the referendum on the issue was to be held, she came out against it. After the vote had been taken she suggested, without consulting the commission, that a swimming pool be built.

On the same issue, the commission was concerned about sewage disposal from the complex and passed a motion in favour of the Ganges sewer. The background paper to the motion noted the results: "Mrs. Valcourt reacted with

Salt Spring tax bill up

Regional district tax bill for Salt Spring Island property owners this year will jump by nearly one-third over the 1982 figure.

Tax requisition for the island amounts to \$195,099 this year. It stood at \$147,471 last year. The increase is about 32%.

The jump in taxes is brought about by the loss of housing starts grants to offset the building inspection costs. In 1982 the housing starts grant was devoted to offsetting this item. Building inspection department will cost island taxpayers \$38,007 this year.

Valcourt also expressed strong opposition to the inclusion of Salt Spring Island in the costs of septage

disposal. The service is extended to areas on Vancouver Island and should be paid by those areas, she stated. She told Driftwood that she had already registered her opposition to the proposal and would demand its withdrawal from the islands' liability. Executive director Dennis Young had agreed, she said, that it "is not right".

Land banking and housing was charged for one year only.

Following is the breakdown, according to the figures furnished by regional director Yvette Valcourt.

The last item is no longer part of Salt Spring Island's liability this year, reported the regional director.

Society looking at sites for housing facility

With a promise of money from the provincial government, the Salt Spring Society for Seniors' Accommodation will begin the process of choosing a site for a proposed housing facility for senior citizens.

The society was given the green light when Hugh Curtis, minister of finance, recently announced the allocation of \$333,000 towards the cost of the 20-unit facility.

Fred Brookbanks, chairman of the society, said, "We're very enthusiastic now that we have a clear-cut go-ahead. Members of the society are eager to proceed."

The facility will be similar to Pioneer Village. Brookbanks indicated that the experience of

running Pioneer Village for the past 15 years will enable the society to improve certain aspects.

The new facility will contain, as part of the 20 units, three units for the handicapped. One of the special units will be for a blind person and the other two will accommodate persons confined to a wheelchair.

Brookbanks said members of the society are looking at a number of sites for the location of the facility. There are three specific sites which meet the requirements of senior citizen housing, he said, but would not elaborate on where the sites

When the site has been chosen, plans for the facility will be drawn up and submitted to the ministry of

housing for approval. When the plans are approved, tenders will be let. Brookbanks said the new facility could be opened in approximately

The total cost has been estimated at between \$1.3 million and \$1.5 million. The difference between the current provincial grant and the total cost will be covered by a mortgage guaranteed by the federal government with interest rates reduced through government

The rent on the units will be geared to income, said Brookbanks, in a similar way that rents on

Pioneer Village are structured. The society grew out of efforts by the Islands Trust to determine the

need for housing for the elderly on Salt Spring. The Trust had sent out a questionnaire on the subject and received 600 replies.

Since the Trust was not able to act on the answers, the society was formed with three members from each of the three service clubs, the Legion, the Lions and the Rotary.

The society is independent of the service clubs but works closely with

Brookbanks said that applications for accommodation in the proposed facility would be premature at this time. The society will release information about when and how applications should be

Growing leeks is well worth the trouble

If you are fond of leeks then you should by all means grow them. Leeks are delicious in stews and salads and quite indispensable for leek soup.

The mature leek is also extremely cold hardy and can stay in the ground all winter to provide fresh and delicious mild onion flavour to soups and salads.

This year we are growing two kinds of leeks: Durabel, a mild, sweet variety for fresh eating, and Winta with a strong leeky flavour, excellent for cooking.

A common, oft-encountered phrase in gardening is "but well worth the trouble," and this applies to the leek, but only in its infancy. Once established, leeks grow like

It is in the establishing that we need to take some care. Leeks may be started indoors in February if giant leeks are wanted, in light, fluffy potting soil, for easy transplanting.

KEEP IT LIGHT

That is why we keep our starting soil mix nice and light, so the young seedlings may be lifted easily without losing all their fine feeder

Our standard mix consists of about one-third soil, one-third compost and one-third vermiculite, to which we add a bit of seaweed for minerals and some well rotted chicken manure for an almost complete fertilizer.

Leeks especially thrive on the near balance of chicken manure with nitrogen, phosphorus and

potash all hovering around two percent.

Sow seeds about one half inch deep, half an inch apart in rows about 2 inches apart. This is to allow them growing room as they should not be transplanted outdoors until the soil is dry enough to provide a nice, loose seedbed. This will vary with your soil and location, usually anywhere between the beginning to the end of May.

During the early part of the year, when days are short, the little leeks will benefit greatly from an additional two to three hours of Gro-Lux or similar light. Keep the tops trimmed to three inches long to make stockier and sturdy plants for

transplanting. TWO METHODS

Now there are two methods of transplanting leeks to the garden. One is in two-inch individual holes; the other is an open trench. We prefer the trench method as it provides more light for the young seedlings.

Choose the most well-drained area of your garden as the leeks may well stay in the ground until next spring in splendid health if the ground does not get soggy with winter rains.

With tiller or fork, work up a nice loose bed about 10 inches deep. Excavate this to the width of a garden shovel, six to eight inches deep. Pile the soil to the north or west of the trench so there will be maximum light in the trench. Sprinkle about 10 lbs. of well rotted chicken manure in the bottom of a 10-foot row, or about five pounds of fishmeal for the same length of row. MIX WITH SOIL

Mix this well with the soil at the bottom of the trench. Plant the seedlings about four inches apart in two staggered rows four inches apart. Spread the root hairs gently in all directions, and holding the seedling gently, lightly press about half an inch of soil over the roots, first on one side, then the other.

Water gently so as not to wash away the soil over the roots. Depending on weather, water frequently for the first week to 10 days to keep the soil constantly moist. After this period they can be left on their own and nothing short of an outrageous drought can deter them. From here on in they will grow like weeds.

As growth proceeds, keep filling in the trench with the excavated soil, keeping about three inches of top growth exposed. Be careful not to get any soil above the branching point when the leaf starts to branch. You will find this soil again in your soup or salad.

If the leaf has not branched by the time it is completely above ground, the leeks can be hilled with additional soil for a longer white

Harvesting begins in the fall when the stalks are about one inch in diameter, and from then on dig them as needed.

Leeks will keep on growing for a long time, even in mild spells in midwinter, to as much as three inches in diameter, sometimes even more.

Leeks may be sown outdoors in early May in the same manner as for transplants. However, they hardly

ever get beyond the thickness of a pencil by fall, but will make additional growth by next spring.

In any case, leeks must be harvested before the seed stalk

appears next season, when they become unpalatable, and their very special delicious flavour is lost. However, as I said...well worth the trouble.

Ganges Harbour is scene of emergency exercises on Sunday

Learning to deal with emergencies on the water was the purpose of an exercise at Ganges Harbour Sunday.

The exercise, which involved Gulf Island Water Taxi, Canada Coast Guard, the RCMP patrol boat and Beaufort Air-Sea Equipment Canada, was staged by the Ganges ambulance service. It drew participants from Victoria, Parksville, Sooke, Langford, Lake Cowichan, and Mayne and Galiano

The full day of activities began at 9:30 when Jack Hughes and Lee Anderson of Gulf Island Water Taxi took participants through one of their boats, showing the safety equipment on board and how it was used.

Inflating and launching a liferaft was demonstrated by Gordon Ruckle of the coast guard. Ross Walker, also of the Ganges water taxi service, donned a survival suit to show how to right the raft if it inflated upside down in the water.

Participants also learned the procedure for loading a person on a stretcher into the raft and getting the crew out of the Beaufort raft in case of an emergency.

The exercise moved to Beddis Spit during the afternoon, where one of the participants played the role of a patient in the water, having to be loaded into raft, boat and coast guard Zodiac.

To make the exercise more realistic, the RCMP boat and that of Erling Jorgensen provided waves to hinder the would-be rescuers.

Those taking part in the train program concluded the day with a

Mika knocks lack of 1983 budget

BY ELEANOR HARRISON

John Mika, NDP candidate for Saanich and the Islands, addressed a crowd of 60 residents on the Penders two weeks ago, at the School-Community Centre.

He was introduced by Doug Tyre from Saanich, past-president of the NDP constituency office. Jim Manly, NDP representative in the Federal house for Cowichan-Islands accompanied him and spoke briefly on the imperative need for disarmament if we are to continue to live in a free world where we can hold elections and meet together without fear. He saw a choice in the coming election and said the NDP offers a positive alternative to the present provincial government.

John Mika said he would concentrate on the election issues and outline some of the changes the NDP would bring about.

"Social Credit has increasingly concentrated more power in Victoria; the NDP are offering a decentralized option," said Mika.

The Islands Trust was created by the NDP for this very special area.

Years ago it was necessary for the highways department to be a powerful entity when basic highways were built throughout the province and uniformity was desirable, but today that is in the past. The NDP would strengthen the Island Trust and would establish an all-party committee to find out what Islanders want today.

NO BUDGET

Right now in a new fiscal year, there is no budget, a great weakness this late in the year, continued the candidate. Government depart-ments are "on hold", businesses cannot make their own plans because they don't know where the government is going.
Public accounts which tell us

where the money was spent last year we don't have and government by cabinet order in a democracy is a violation of democratic traditions. He criticized taxpayers' money being spent on advertising to enhance the present government's position.

Last year the present government approved the tax credit for the elderly.

"Last fall the minister of finance issued a press release wiping out the tax credit in the forthcoming budget," he told islanders.

The North East coal development of the Social Credit has been a bad deal for B.C. Of 1,900 miners laid off in the South East coal mines, 400 will never go back to work.

The NDP would establish an economic advisory council composed of leading labour leaders, municipalities, professors, credit unions, financial institutions and consumers.

In answer to a question from the floor, "that steel is imported from Japan now at a price that's cheaper than Canadian prices," Mika said we should have a policy of five percent preference for B.C. and evious feasibility studies showed this could work.

When questioned as to where the funds come from to build the railway for North East coal, Mika said "possibly by cut backs on hospitals and schools, but this the but there is public subsidy money going into building the railway.

537-2249 531-4247 Peter Campbell asked "if the NDP would stop the North East coal project?" Mika said that it is too late. In the long term the

Japanese need the products so it's in our interest to work with them with good will on both sides. The NDP would insist the Japanese invest some of the profits in B.C. to create jobs here. At present they can't take all the contract amount, so renegotiation has to take place.

"Will the family farm not be able to be passed on?" asked Bill Mundy. "It will continue to be as at present." replied Mika.

Mika said the NDP would probably break up B.C. Hydro "which has become a monster." They would insist on conservation methods and bring gas to Vancouver Island.



Island drinkers guzzle 70 million gallons

Salt Spring Island people are a thirsty group. In 1982 the North Salt Spring Waterworks District delivered 68,644,840 gallons of water to patrons. This quantity represented an increase of 4,444,780 gallons over the 1981 figure of 64,200,060.

The trustees' report to the annual meeting last week of the water district outlined the accomplishments of the utility over the year.

No water restrictions were necessary last year as a result of the work undertaken on watermains. Replacement of some 30-year-old pipe had not only allowed much better service, said chairman Don Lochhead, making the report, but the work has resulted in a notable reduction in maintenance work.

There were 22 new connections made during the year.

The upgrading and modernization program was the completion of the five-year plan started in 1977. During this time the water district has replaced 32,218 feet, or better than six miles of deteriorating asbestos cement pipe. The pipe was 30 years old. Not only was the pipe beginning to break down, but it was too small for the load placed on it today. The old pipe was four inches

pipe is eight, 10 and 12-inch PVC, or plastic, Permastran and cast iron. **NEW STORAGE**

A new 15,000-gallon storage tank has been erected and a second 15,000-gallon and a 28,000-gallon tank have replaced two wood-stave tanks with a total capacity of 15,000 gallons.

New pumping station at St. Mary Lake nearly doubles the capacity of the old station. The old unit is now out of regular use and is used as back-up equipment in case of repairs and maintenance.

Major jobs undertaken in 1982 included the new pumping station and the upgrading and replacing of the old main through Ganges, from Drake Road to Harbour House. It was of asbestos cement. The new line is of PVC and is an eight-inch line, compared with the previous six-inch pipe. Branch lines along the Ganges service were of galvanized iron and have been replaced with PVC. It is anticipated, explained Lochhead, that the constant leaks and service calls will be a thing of the

SEWER SIGNAL

The district had to make a snap decision on replacing the line when the Capital Regional Board and ministry of highways both reported that the Ganges sewer was to be installed in the spring and that blacktopping the Ganges roads would follow. The installation was accomplished with a minimum of inconvenience.

The report also took note of the watersheds. Their protection is one of the prime concerns facing the board, said Lochhead. Last year the trustees had been assured that the occasional taste and odour problem with water from St. Mary Lake did not represent a health hazard.

We must, however, continue our ongoing campaign to prevent any changes to zoning of property in the St. Mary Lake watershed that could reflect harmfully on the water quality."

During the past five years, said the chairman, the cost of needed capital projects has forced the taxes to rise to meet the necessary payments.

He expressed confidence that the tax increases are unlikely to be repeated.

The use of high quality pipe, concrete meter boxes and five years of upgrading the system will bring about a reduction in maintenance costs as well as a more reliable service.



Annual meeting of the North Salt borrowed for the major works and Spring Waterworks District on April 25 represented one of the rarest of all public meetings when trustees relinquished their chairs to the standing public.

With more than 125 people in the hall, the orderly meeting re-elected the two trustees whose terms had ended, chairman Don Lochhead and Bud Kreissl.

When the minutes of the 1982 general meeting were read it was revealed that there had been 11 ratepayers present on that occasion.

The chairman introduced the trustees, J.J. Fairley, Ken Patrick, Bud Kreissl, Don Lochhead and Don Storr. He also identified the members of the staff of the district. superintendent Mike Larmour and Sandy Blakeway, his assistant, and Ellen Bennett, office manager, and her assistant, Theo Parsons.

Lochhead noted the absence of the former auditor, Chuck Harrison, missing from the meeting for the first time in the district's

OPPOSING BOATING

The ratepayers applauded when the chairman spoke of the activities of Percy Hawkins who had undertaken the distribution of a petition opposing the use of power boats on St. Mary Lake. Rates of interest on monies borrowed range from 10% to 14.5%, ratepayers learned. The largest single issue of debentures, for \$650,000, carries the highest interest

Colin Nicholson expressed concern for the manner in which parcel tax has risen. He recalled. wryly, that the annual increase of \$10 had resulted in a falling percentage figure for the same

The \$10 increase was a 50% increase, then it was a 33% hike and then a 25% jump, but it was \$10 each time, with a 400% increase over five

Nicholson expressed the hope that the board was not planning for condominiums in 10 years' time. He was assured that this was not the

When the election of trustees was undertaken, Lochhead stepped down and Don Storr was chairman for the elections. Each candidate was invited to make a brief presentation.

John Crofton explained that he was a native of the island and had been away for many years. About three years ago he had read a letter in Driftwood regarding Tom Gossett's concern for adequate potable water and he had become part of the Salt Spring Water Preservation Society as a result. He is treasurer of that organization devoted to the protection of water and watersheds.

Crofton listed other organizations in the community to which he belongs and with which he has been active.

MOUAT

Gil Mouat recalled that his family had been partly instrumental in building the water supply system. His community concerns were no less than those of his forebears. The stewardship had been in good hands, he admitted, but new blood was indicated.

WATSON

John Watson was not happy with the past administration. He observed that the parcel tax had jumped 100% last year and that was 94% more than the increase in his pension, limited to six percent.

When he had called the water office to express his concern, he had been told that it was hig own fault for not attending meetings of the

"I am asking you to support me to represent pensioners whose pensions are pegged to a six percent increase," he said.

KREISSL

Bud Kreissl told the ratepayers that he had been approached six years ago by people who were concerned with water quality. He was, and is, the only pathologist on the island and his concern is with disease, he explained. He went on the board with only one purpose and that was to ensure that quality and quantity were maintained and that there would be "decent water to drink on the island". He asked for another three-year term to complete the project.

LOCHHEAD

Last speaker was Don Lochhead, who explained that his professional concerns had been mining and geology. He was happy with what the board had accomplished and he'd like a few more years to round it

A vote of thanks and appreciation was given amid applause to the water preservation society and a vote of thanks to the trustees for "many hours of voluntary work on our behalf".

Les Linnett was re-elected auditor.



Although the Galiano activity centre is not expected to have its official opening until June it is already a busy place. The school children, of course, are making good use of the gymnasium, especially as principal Bob Brownsword is a physical education specialist.

The adults use the gym on Thursday morning at 9:30 am for an exercise program and on Friday morning for movement to jazz. Evening activities include carpet bowling, floor hockey, badminton and basketball.

An allocations committee of four is responsible for administering the centre, setting rules for users, accepting bookings and establishing policy.

With the flute part unchanged Paul had written a very attractive complementary accompaniment for the guitar and executed this with skill and discretion.

Down Through the Years with Driftwood

Twenty years ago

Driftwood had been sold. Owner and editor Woody Fisher sold the weekly newspaper to Arelene Ward. Fisher, after three years of publishing Driftwood, had an opportunity to report for a daily newspaper. Ward had worked for Driftwood for the previous two years.

The Women's Institute on Salt Spring donated \$51 to the Fulford Hall fund to help pay for a new floor. The ladies also had two trees to plant in honour of Canada's centennial.

Residents of Salt Spring were warned about parking restrictions on portions of Rainbow Road as well as in front of Mahon Hall.

The dog was small and of mixed breed but it knew its paces by winning the Novice A class competition at the North Saanich dog obedience club trials. The 11month-old labrador-spaniel, Lindy Lou, came ahead of 28 other dogs in the trial. She gained the honour of champion for her third win in the event in three tries. The dog was owned by Fred Luddington.

Fire permits would be required for all otudoor burning for the remainder of the summer. May I was the start of the fire season and the permits were needed before anyone burned brush or other materials.

The adult roller skating club got off to a good start. Membership stood at 50 people and was open to anyone older than 21 years as well as married couples. Plans for skating parties were in the works.

Lady Minto Hospital would be open to the public on Hospital Day May 10. Tours of the hospital and nurses' residence would be conducted by members of the nursing staff. The event was being sponsored by the women's auxiliary.

Fifteen years ago

The Red Cross fund drive on Salt Spring gathered \$1,613.20. Canvassers knocked on doors of most residences on the island to come up with the amount.

The Galiano Ladies' Service Club, in preparation for its first birthday, held a rummage sale. Used articles, books and houseware items sold briskly but no total sales figure was released.

The Salt Spring Youth Encounter received approval for funding of the jobs from the federal government's Opportunity for Youth program. The young people would work in the various playgrounds supervising children for the summer.

The annual art show and sale would take place in Mahon Hall on Salt Spring for the summer months. The Community Arts Council announced plans for the two-month sale of work by artists and craftsmen from the islands.

Response to the announcement of the Aage Villadsen Golf Classic overwhelmed the organizers. At least two people rushed to sign up for the event. Proceeds would go to Lady Minto Hospital. Tee-off time would be 8 am and the 19 foursomes would be swinging their first strokes until at least 10 am. Late starters would be welcome but no word had been heard from Jack Nicklaus or Arnold Palmer

The artists of Mayne Island made money. The Paint and Sketch Club held the third annual sale of work in the community hall and the event proved successful again.

Members of the provincial legislature would visit Saturna Island to meet residents. The trip was to be part of a tour of the islands to discover what islanders felt about various issues concerning them.

B.C. Ferries officials promised an improved bill of fare in the restaurant on the Tsawwassen-Long Harbour run. Better food went along with a better reservation system but suggestions for further improvements were asked for from the public.

A report about fires being started in Bluffs Park on Galiano Island caused concern to members of the Galiano Club. The fires were started by campers but constant attendance and had assumed the post. New careless camper could cause a major fire in the park.

Motor boats on lakes on Salt Spring Island should be banned, said officials of the island's Rod and Gun Club. The club urged the ban on all lakes on Salt Spring with the exception of St. Mary Lake.



Another instance of confrontation with the commission has occurred as a result of the debate over the Farmers' Market in Ganges. The commission discussed the matter at length last year and Valcourt appeared to support the position of the commission.

Then almost overnight she did a 180-degree turn and decided that the straw vote was meaningless because her 'directive' as to the wording was not used," is the explanation for the

censure motion.

The issue which has the commissioners most frustrated centres on the hold-up of the lease for the tennis court to be built in Fulford. Both the commission and the fire district, which owns the land, have agreed to the terms of the lease but the matter is being held up at the Capital Regional District by

Valcourt.

The tennis court issue had been discussed by the commission at various meetings and the go-ahead for the plan had to wait until the budget for 1983 was approved by the CRD. Valcourt had, in committee at the CRD, moved that the lease be tabled until she could investigate the situation. At the commission meeting Monday, she refused to approve the lease.

The motion was introduced, said Hugh Borsman of the commission, to gain one of three results. Valcourt could give assurances that she would work with the commission. The CRD board of directors could be informed of the problems which exist. Or the members of the commission could resign and leave the administration of parks and recreation on the island to Valcourt.

Bob Wanless noted that Valcourt seems to approach the efforts of the commission from a negative point of view. "Every way we turn," he said, "we get stabbed in the back."

Edith Sacker said, "We cannot work under these conditions. We shouldn't just do what one person wants us to do.

She noted that Valcourt was only

a member of the commission but chairman Glenn Woodley refined the definition. He said she is also the regional director and represents the commission at the CRD

"If the mechanism doesn't work, he said, "the commission can't get things done.

The whole basis of the recreation commission is to work through the regional director and that's breaking down," he said.
