Pickup, **Vickers** taking positive attitude

It may be a tough fight, but it's going to be a clean one, the contestants for two Saanich-andthe-Islands seats agree.

But New Democratic Party candidates Carol Pickup and David Vickers aren't pulling any punches in their criticisms of Social Credit government policies. The government has failed to gain the trust of the people, they said last week while campaigning on Salt Spring Island.

Pickup and Vickers have been knocking on doors in the large riding for months. Community involvement in decision-making, fiscal responsibility, the end to education cutbacks, improvements to the health care system and preservation of the Islands Trust are some of the issues they are hearing about and raising.

The Social Credit government did not practice restraint, Pickup said in an interview. There were cutbacks in some areas while the government spent billions more in other areas, she said.

Local people should have control over what happens in their community, Vickers said. Gulf Islands residents should have a greater say in education, health, economic development and family

The county government system proposed by the Socreds would erode local accountability, said Pickup, former chairperson of the Greater Victoria School Board. The county system would replace

all local boards with a small "mega-board" that couldn't offer the flexibility and accountability people want, she said.

Education is an important issue in the election, the two candidates agree. The province must take another look at access to postsecondary education, possibly putting a moratorium on some of the massive debts students have wracked up, said Vickers, a Victoria civil rights lawyer.

"We demand public universal education and universal health care," Pickup added. "Education is linked to economics. The government has missed the boat on that entirely." As evidence, she cited the shortage of trained nurses and a deterioration in training for the trades.

Pickup called for a commission looking at the education system. Cutbacks should stop, but the government must take a close look at the system rather than throwing money at the problem, she said

The candidates visited Salt Spring retailers last Wednesday, knocking on doors in the afternoon. They plan to visit the major Gulf Islands before voting day on October 22.

The candidates say they anticipate a tough campaign, but feel voters in the riding want a change.

One of the most critical islands issues is maintaining the island lifestyle while recognizing the need for economic growth, they said. One way jobs and a rural lifestyle can be fostered is through tourism. The integration of transportation and marketing services in neighbouring communities on Vancouver Island can help spur the Gulf Islands economies, but only if ferry service and public transportation can meet the tourists' needs.

Pickup and Vickers vow to stick to the issues during the campaign. "Going door to door, we hear people say they want to avoid confrontation. So we're emphasizing the positive possibilities, not name-calling," Vickers said.



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Report due in December

Island garbage disposal studied by regional district

How do you feel about your garbage? Do you want it hauled away, recycled, burned, buried or barged? The Capital Regional District (CRD) wants to know.

This summer the sanitation and water committee approved an expenditure of \$277,000 to study the methods of waste management in the capital region and to come up with a 30-year plan for dealing with solid waste disposal. The plan is intended to integrate a number of forms of waste management according to what the public prefers in each area.

The Gulf Islands have been included in the study with a subcommittee of their own. Committee members stress that no system of waste disposal will be imposed on a community and that there could be five or six different plans for the Gulf Islands — each one tailored to the individual problems and concerns of each island.

The deadline for the study is September, 1987, at which point whatever plans the provincial environment ministry has approved will go into effect, possibly for as long as 30 years.

Shamus McDonnell, CRD spokesman and chairman of the Outer Islands Subcommittee, stresses that the time to make feelings known is now.

He said the committee is "acutely conscious" of the need to listen to what islanders want. The CRD will welcome phone calls and letters with complaints, suggestions and problems.

Each of five Outer Islands subcommittees is studying incineration/material recovery, recycling/composting and satellite sites and landfills, and will be submitting a preliminary report to the steering committee on October 14. After that, there will be open houses on each of the islands and a formal report will be submitted on December 9.

The report's recommendations must be approved by the environment ministry before going into

effect. Open houses will continue through February, March and April. The CRD "will be listening very closely to what's said," assured McDonnell. "The solutions will come out of those meetings." Proposals are also being solicited from businesses.

The committees have been at work all summer looking at land requirements, costing, estimate of quantities of waste produced in each area, present and future methods of funding, and volume reduction by recycling and composting. A representative from the Gulf Islands is on each of the other committees.

The study was begun because the Hartland Avenue landfill site in Victoria will be full up in less than four years and is currently having problems with leachate, the fluid that results from water seeping through piles of garbage. Leachate contains a heavy concentration of ammonia, suspended solids and biochemical oxygen, which will absorb the oxygen out of water. Fish have a very low tolerance for ammonia. The district is looking into diverting the leachate from the landfill to the sewer, where it will then travel to the ocean.

Of the Gulf Islands, Salt Spring has the most immediately serious problem. The landfill site owned and operated by Mr. Twa is on the watershed shared by Blackburn Lake and Cusheon Lake. Tests conducted periodically by the Waste Management Branch show no contamination of surface waters to date.

In addition to this problem, there have been complaints from neighbours about the burning of refuse and smells from rotting garbage.

On Saturna, the problem now is an indefinite lease on the land being used for a combination of recycling, composting, incinerating and landfill disposal system. Alternate sites are being researched.

All garbage is dealt with on the island and the site is managed by the Saturna Island Community Club, which raises funds through community events to cover the costs of operations.

On Galiano, garbage is dumped unsorted at a site on MacMillan Bloedel land off Porlier Pass Road. The lease is secure, but there are concerns about the fire hazard. Garbage is burned periodically to reduce the bulk. Fumes from the combustion of plastic, composting material, paper, etc. have not been a problem because the site is not close to residential areas. The site is managed by the

Galiano Club. Funding comes from donations and B.C. Ferries and the Provincial Parks Branch, who both use the facility.

Both Mayne and Pender haul their garbage off-island. Mayne takes it either to the Hartland Avenue dump or to Galiano or Salt Spring. Pender garbage goes to the Hartland fill site or to Salt Spring.

On Mayne, the collection is handled by a private contractor who takes it to the site on Salt Spring.

On Pender, collection is han-

The CRD is considering redesigning the financing structure of waste management so the expenses are covered by taxes.

McDonnell says people are less likely to dump their garbage just anywhere if they aren't paying for disposal of each individual bag.

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

Keith McHattie at work on boat

Long-term salvage project moving closer to conclusion

An unusual boat is included in the number of local vessels now undergoing normal summer'send maintenance.

While most of those ships are being hauled out of the water, Keith McHattie's boat is waiting for the day when it will once again feel waves beneath its bow.

It's been about five years since McHattie - a well-known shipwright in island boatyards hauled the boat up from the bottom of Newcastle Bay, near Nanaimo, where it had sank two months earlier.

Today, propped up on shore in front of Ross and Ganges Marine, the boat is still little more than the 48-foot hull that McHattie brought to the surface.

'That's all it was hull," McHattie says, leaning against the boat. "There was no deck or cabin, the ribs were rotten, and there was two and a half tons of ballast and concrete to take out. But the hull was fine.'

The pure lines of the hull were what prompted McHattie to make the boat a reclamation project despite its age, which he reckons is between 80 and 100 years. He knows little about the ship's history, other than its name was Georgina.

Septic Tank Effluent Dump

In addition to reading last week's Driftwood regarding septic tank effluent disposal, I received a letter from Susan Blagborne. I am answering her letter in this way because it seems to be of general interest. I hope she will excuse me. She also enclosed a petition from some of her neighbours, although as far as I can see, she is the only one who is close enough to be seriously affected.

I visited Susan about two months ago and, apart from the odour when the wind was blowing from the site towards the house, the operation seemed quite reasonable. Susan had deplored the heavy traffic to the site, but since the sewer went into operation the frequent trips had been reduced to what seemed to be a reasonable number.

After I saw her, I first checked with the Waste Management Branch, which didn't feel the dump constituted a hazard, and had inspected it only two months before. I checked with Mrs. Cunningham who had another dump site on her property, but while she didn't mind it being used occasionally, she didn't want to take over the operation.

I then discussed the matter with the CRD Engineering department, although I gather it isn't their direct concern. The CRD has allocated a sum of money to

investigate solid waste disposal in the Capital Region for the next 50 years or so. A consulting firm has been hired to look for land fill sites in the whole region, including Salt Spring Island.

I asked if they could, at the same time, see if there is a site suitable for septic tank effluent. I agree with Susan that it should be possible to find an even more remote spot - not on watershed, of course. If anyone has a site in mind, I would appreciate a call. It would be nice if the petition asking to remove it had been able to make a few suggestions. Such a dump, in the right place, cannot be considered a health hazard.

The question of sludge disposal from the treatment plant was raised. When the plant was first planned it had been thought that the sludge would be transported to Victoria to be put in the ocean at McCauley Point. This plan was changed for reasons of economy.

An experiment is taking place now in Saanich using sludge as a soil conditioner. Next summer this will probably be used on a larger scale, using sludge from the Central Saanich treatment plant. I have asked the CRD engineers to think about a plan for using our sludge on hay fields where grazing does not take place; there are a few such sites.

We could store the sludge over the winter and then rent the machine from Saanich to instill the sludge into the ground in the spring. It apparently works

At any rate we are not neglecting the problem. One thing I overlooked was the mention of disposing of septic tank effluent into the sewer. Along with others,

it would appear, I had assumed that septic tank effluent would be dumped down a manhole into the collecting system. Apparently the relatively anaerobic septic effluent inhibits the bacteriological action of the RBC (rotating biological contactor), our treatment method. In the meantime, the dumping of sludge in modest quantities is not considered a health hazard. I would only remind readers not

to relate, as Susan appears to have done, that the disposal of septic tank effluent is any part of the sewer operation. Every small rural community handles the effluent in the same way, and probably always will. The treatment plant sludge is being dumped there as an inexpensive and expedient alternative to trucking, at least until we are able to develop an agricultural use for it.

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

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Banff art school influences absorbed by local student

"The act of drawing is a constant activity for me. It allows a way for me to encounter the most direct expression of mind and body. With each mark produced on a sheet of paper, a void becomes selfdiscovery of a mirage of images and feelings."

"Drawing on clay has its own vitality. I personally enjoy the physical act of drawing on such a soft and malleable surface; it's a crisp and open surface, but it's also accepting and forgiving. You can erase, pushing the steel over it. The lines close and the surface is as innocent as before.'

The above quotes are from artists Thom Bohnert and Rudy Autio, respectively. Their words indicate the sentiment and inspiration to be found at the Banff School of Fine Arts.

Salt Spring artist Bonnie Kreye recently completed the summer session in ceramics at Banff. As I thumb through the stack of literature she has assembled for me, I am overwhelmed by the intensity of creative thought and activity she has sampled.

The calendar of programs states: "If you want to work, this is the place. All artists are selected on the basis of audition or portfolio review and are professional artists or exceptionally talented emerging art seen

artists. The faculty are themselves practicing artists ... community of artists living and working together in an environment which challenges and stimulates everyone involved.'

The table of contents lists the following departments, among others: music, theatre arts, theatre production and design, visual arts, writing and publishing.

The visual arts department includes studios in art, ceramics, photography and fibre art. Some have winter programs which generally go from September to April.

Throughout the summer, Bonnie was exposed to ceramic artists of international repute. Names that may ring in the ears of potters would be Annemarie Schmid Esler, Carlo Zauli from Italy, Glenys Barton from Britain, Rudy Autio and Dorothy Hafner from the U.S.A.

A favourite of mine is Rudy Autio, who is known for his large (many over two feet) ceramic vessels on which he draws nudes, horses and other animate subjects.

Dorothy Hafner has become famous as a ceramic artist and designer for Rosenthal china, Tiffany and Company, and

The ceramics studio is but a small part of the total picture.

The weekly newsletter testifies to the volume of extracurricular activities available: from Robertson Davies lecturing on writing, to John Abercrombia on jazz guitar and a production of Tchaikovsky's opera, Eugene Onegin. There is something going on all the time.

This show will incorporate some work destined for a November exhibition in Vancouver. At the same place, same evening, at 8:30 pm, Adrien Town will host a weekly poetry and music evening christened Mixed Media.

Adrien, although she has been on the island just one year, is already making a contribution to our cultural awakening through her magazine Moonsee.

Off Centre Stage season opens with display of Filkow paintings

Off Centre Stage begins its second year of performing and visual arts next Tuesday, October 14, with a dual event.

At 7:30 pm, a gallery show opens featuring new and old works by Sharada Filkow entries at Showcase 86 drew praise from adjudicators and the public alike.

Sharada graduated with a bachelor of fine arts from the University of Manitoba, where she studied art under the guidance of Ivan Eyre and Ken Lockhead. Early influences on her work included Marc Chagall, Gusto Klimpt and Van Gogh.

The influence of Chagall is most obvious in Sharada's floating images, from The Bride to The Hummingbird is Missing.

Also reminiscent of Chagall is the consistent iconography from painting to painting, but her repeated use of crows, stars and fish are patterened more in the manner of Klimpt than Chagall.


Her relationship with the elements is akin to Van Gogh — but where Van Gogh worked from outside in, translating nature through a tortured psyche, Sharada's inwardness, tempered by yoga, vegetarianism and meditation, translates into a quiet and stillness that reflects peace in the viewer.

Sharada has only recently started to feel at ease with the artist label. She began exhibiting her work publicly in 1984 and has since held showings at the Lower Mainland's Jewish Community Centre, the Warehouse Show, Robson Square Media Centre, Paperworks Gallery, the Jewish Vision show at Beth Israel Synagogue and the Pitt International Gallery. Locally, her efforts have been shown at the Salt Spring Centre, Salt Spring Gallery, Off Centre Stage and Showcase 86.

That same evening — Tuesday,


October 14 — will see the 7:30 pm gallery opening merge into a mixed media event beginning at 8:30 pm. The event will be a weekly feature to be hosted every Tuesday evening by Adrien Town, who is currently showing her work at the Salt Spring Gallery.

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Multi-media techniques used to promote health information

Slide projectors, posters, diagrams and colourful displays were combined Saturday to provide Salt Spring Islanders with information on a variety of health disorders and disease prevention methods.

The five-hour-long fair, cosponsored by the Community Centre Society and the Ganges branch of the Registered Nurses Association of B.C., was held in

the high school gymnasium.

The fair featured information on numerous disease types, ranging from cancer to arthritis. Pamphlets and displays also dealt with cystic fibrosis, psoriasis, multiple sclerosis and schizophrenia.

Greenwoods provided information on elderly care and the Greenwoods facility; nurses from Lady Minto Hospital tested blood pressures and answered questions in a number of health areas.

One part of the Lady Minto display dealt with poison control and medicine storage precautions to take if children are in the house. An information sheet available at the table noted that household chemicals and all drugs should be properly marked and labelled, and kept in their original containers. It also said drugs should never be referred to as candy or used to bribe children.

Every household with small children should have a bottle of Ipecac Syrup, Karen Davies said at the booth. A dose will induce vomiting within minutes and can "probably cure any child from an overdose," she explained.

Other displays dealing with children included a section on child sexual abuse (which featured books on the subject for children to read), and an 'ident-akid' finger printing booth set up by the 808 Wing of the Canadian Air Force. The group has visited various Vancouver Island locales to provide sets of children's fingerprints for parents to use if a child is kidnapped or wanders from home.

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

In the last six years I have known Dora, that life has included writing on the big desk with the typewriter always out; the CBC radio; her family; and special friends Hazel, Polly, Gerri and Gloria, who have looked after her needs steadily.

Her outlook has included a constant noticing of all that goes - the kindness of friends, the rain, the crows, the bouncing water in Boot Cove, the warmth and cheer of her fireplace, the obstinance of dogs in general (and the companionship of Travis, her own, in particular), soil and the growth habits and desires of parsley, children and what they see

and do with that seeing, and on and on!

Her creativity has been constantly expressed in sharing through writing and conversation.

Each time I visited Dora, I did something I've never done before. Always, I arranged the flowers I had brought while we discussed the colours and the shapes and then I once decorated a tiny perfect balsam fir with her handmade and cherished family Christmas decorations; once carved a Table Queen winter squash into a flapper girl with the little knife Jim, her husband, gave her for her birthday because the needed "tools"; once sorted her "fixit" drawer and we laughed about travelling light and the paradox of being prepared for anything; one blowing fall day we counted ducks on the bay and identified all the species.

Pender sculptor captures moments of drama, history

Ralph Sketch poses with work

By JANE HAMILTON

Absorbed in shaping the three-foot high model of a charging horse and rider in front of him, Ralph Sketch doesn't hear the padding of feet in the hall, and starts when people enter his Pender Island studio.

Sketch is a large man, dominating a room crowded with his sculpted renditions of history: General Brock strains forward in his saddle; John A. MacDonald lopes along on his, campaigning in Kingston, Ontario.

Also in front of Sketch is the sculpture of an Indian guide pointing the way to the two Verendrye brothers, the first white men to see the Rockies. "That one there is the smart one," says Sketch, indicating one of the brothers. "He's always thinking, what is this place; what will we do here? The older one over here, he's just saying, whoo, look at this!"

Sketch says he tries to put as much expression as possible in the faces found on his sculptures, and he speaks fondly of the expressiveness of horse's ears. "You always know what they're thinking," he said. "Not like men's ears. They're just fiddly things that don't do anything.'

Sketch develops the faces through extensive research. Brock's square jaw, long sideburns and intent eyes staring at the fight to come in the distance were sculpted mainly from a description in Bruce Hutchison's book, The Struggle for the Bor-

The Brock figure is an important one for Sketch, for it was Hutchison's description of the general that first inspired him to do studies of Canadian historical figures. Sitting in his study facing the ocean, Sketch takes out the

book and reads reverently of the decisive battle between 10,000 Americans and 1,000 Canadians at Queenston in 1812.

'Then came a tiny speck of red riding along the crest of the hill,' he reads. "Now that's history! That's really what got me started.'

When Driftwood spoke to him, Sketch was on his way to Niagara on the Lake, to the museum at Fort George, to see a gate there. It's the same one Brock charged from, and Sketch wants a good

He explained that all sculpture needs three points of support. His charging Brock had only two. "I want them to be really galloping,

I always came to visit the woman and wound up with the pleasure of her company and the gift of the delight of ranging into new realms of thought and experience. I didn't just help her, we went together to look at something. And I will miss her: there was a quality of talk and an ease and enjoyment of sharing, and for me that was special.

I realize now that I had thought but never told her that I considered Dora courageous in her determination to live her life out at home and her ability to accept gracefully and cherish the love of those special islanders that made it possible; that I admired the way she made note of the changes in her physical self, that she described forthrightly the diminuation of her strength and abilities and expressed anger but not blame at what she could no longer do; and I learned from her the habit of reconsidering - she would tell me that at one time she thought one way, but since looking at it again or since seeing something else, she had changed that opinion.

Dora took me instantly into her life: we talked about such things as the best way to get firewood into her house and the manifestations of love between daughters and mothers as earnestly the first time as the last.

Dora Carney wrote all of her life, which began on September 12, 1903, and ended on September 18, 1986. She was born in Cape Town, South Africa, and moved to England in 1909, and to Canada in 1911. As a young woman she freelanced for Maclean's, Saturday Night, the Manchester Guardian and other periodicals.

In 1933 she married and went to Shanghai, China. She had four children with husband Jim

Upon returning to Canada, with no material wealth, Jim took a doctorate in veterinary medicine at Guelph. While living in the Fraser Valley, Dora returned to writing as women's editor and feature writer for the Abbotsford, Sumas and

Matsqui News. In 1980, she fulfilled a dream and published Foreign Devils Had Light Eyes, an account of the six years she and Jim spent in the International Community of Shanghai, China. After appearing on CBC radio's Morningside, she held a book signing party at the Saturna Pub.

Most recently, Dora was at work on another novel and regularly had a natural history column in the Victoria Times-Colonist, called Gulf Islands

At first, it seemed odd to me that Dora, who stayed more and more at her home, would write about natural history - but knowing her, it made perfect sense. Science is looking and watching and bout what you h and reading what others have noted and then sharing.

Dora's window on the world was of her own choosing — a window on the sea, facing west. The frame was also of her own choosing; limitless, and the window was open from first to last.

Dora gave me this poem a few



descriptive slot, he could only conclude that his parents had lived an adventurous and absorbing life. He described his father as toughminded and his mother as a romantic, and said that each remained true to themselves and appreciated the other.

He said that as he has grown, so has his appreciation for the legacy of his mother - her romantic nature. He grew up with her and saw it as her means of telling people what she thought, and sharing what excited her.

"First, and foremost, mother

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

Dylan Thomas show earns rave reviews

Five poets, members of the B.C. League of Canadian Poets, read selected current works at the Dandelion Gallery on September

Galiano's Dorothy Livesay read from her latest book, The Self-Completing Tree, which will be presented in England during a tour beginning October 7. The poems, written over the last six decades, include some yet-unpublished pieces which Dorothy said focus mainly on the theme of aging.

The two poems I heard struck a poignant note that elevated Dorothy's poems to a unique, universal and powerful distinction.

Other poets were Mona Fuertig, Carolyn Zonailo, Lala Heine-Koehn and Heather spears who presented humorous, dramatic and imaginative poems.

Tom Konyves, the B.C. representative for the League, accompanied the reading and meeting. There are over 50 members in B.C., and about 300 across Canada.

Dylan Thomas

The rave reviews which preceded Ray Jones' theatrical interpretation of Dylan Thomas to Galiano were mere understatements. The too-few who were privileged to see excellence in action two Friday nights ago at the Community Hall were indeed

During the enacting of Dylan's childhood, solo actor Ray Jones was hypnotic, lively and devious. At intermission, Enid Gaylor recounted an interesting anecdote. In Townhill, Wales, when she was attending Delabeche Secondary School, young Dylan passed by at lunch hour making faces and gestures on his way to grammar school for boys.

From youth to death at 39, the character of Dylan grew and decayed with brilliant conviction. Writer Cyril Royston composed this concise biography, and Welshman Ray Jones portrayed the poet with a deep physical and emotional empathy.

This historical and cultural tidbit was one of the great gifts Galiano has experienced in theatre lately. Many thanks to Morriss Rees, Enid Gaylor, Diane LaFontaine, Marianne Bennetts, Christopher James and Ronaldo Norden who were responsible for the diversion in the duo's North American tour and for the hospitality they received.

Peace March

It's the Pits

Galiano Chamber of Commerce

and various construction companies involved in the gravel business co-operated in a recent dispute of regional district bylaws 1472 and 1473, apparently already "in the minister's hands." The bylaws regulate soil removal and deposit "in the electoral areas of Langford, View Royal, Salt Spring Island and the Outer Gulf Islands.'

Fees, high security bonds and specification, most of which are irrelevant and unnecessary to the Outer Gulf Islands, are outlined in these bylaws.

The proposed bylaws raised many questions. Why weren't the first and second readings clearly published? Only the third and final reading by chance caught the attention of some concerned Galiano citizens.

Why were the Outer Gulf Islands included in a bylaw which, according to businesses involved, were inappropriate here? (Further studies may reveal more relevant requirements.)

This issue was brought to the attention of Kelly Scott, the Capital Regional District representative for the Gulf Islands, and on Monday, September 29, he studied the problem with the engineer involved in this area. They concurred with the objections raised and Mr. Scott promised a revision of the bylaw.

On Thursday, October 2, Scott said the Outer Gulf Islands would be eliminated from the bylaw. The matter will be laid to rest following a written confirmation.

Galiano Club

Interesting developments have materialized from the Galiano Club this past week. The Galiano Club owns and manages the South End Community Hall, the Solid Waste Disposal Area (affectionately known as "the dump") and Bluff Park. A recent newsletter was issued excusing their hike in hall rental fees due to a shortfall of income, and simultaneously announcing the proposed purchase of a computer to handle financial affairs.

Two concerned non-executive club members independently researched the need for a new computer following the newsletter. They attended the Monday, September 29 meeting to present findings which strongly opposed the \$1,500 purchase.

Following discussion, a previous quick vote to go ahead and purchase the computer was defeated due to the availability in the community of computers for the club's uses, and the probable introduction of a comptroller to aid the treasurer with financial affairs. Also, the annual financial range of the club does not, according to one consultant, justify the need, and a simple ledger system would suffice.

On the topic of Hall rate hikes dump and Bluff Park), the new charges were due to an annual deficit. In approximate figures, the hall makes \$1,500 and spends \$3,000 annually.

Michael Sharp, club secretary, stated that "a motion was passed that the Hall board would try to find ways through grants and donations to reduce rental fees." Private or commercial users will still have a different fee schedule from non-profit organizations, but action is being taken to partially alleviate the costs, which may discourage rental.

The Hall is also planning to build a basement with cement walls which will make it more

At the dump, a volunteer work party is in the process of building a 36-foot X 16-foot shed to organize recyclable materials. 
Pender Island Elementary School is losing its principal this

swivelled the work on its pedestal so the angle was obvious. "Once the piece is bronzed it will weigh over 200 pounds. People will lean against these things, or sometimes kids will vandalize them. If it falls over, it can do some damage.'

Some of Sketch's other sculptures include: Generale de Montcalm; Alfred, Isaac Brock's grey charger; William Lyon MacKenzie; Judge Begbie; and an RCMP outrider for the RCMP headquarters in Winnipeg.

Sketch prefers people and moments in history that have not already been explored. One is Lieutenant Colonel Joseph Morrison who, Sketch writes, is "Canada's unsung hero." Morrison helped prevent the capture of Montreal by winning the second decisive battle following Chateau-

The figure of Washington Grimmer sitting tiredly on his horse is a familiar sight to Pender Island golfers who pass the small figure on the course every day. Sketch says the spot was chosen because it was where Grimmer came out of the woods after clearing stumps off his land all day and rounded a big cedar tree before turning into his gate.

Sketch decided to do a study of Washington Grimmer after a long period of concentrating on major

Louis Riel, William Lyon MacKenzie, and numbers of explorers and soldiers.

Stopping and considering for awhile, he decided it was the pioneers who built this country. "He sits sideways because he is too tired to lift his leg over," explained Sketch of the Grimmer sculpture.

Sketch uses plasticine instead of clay to model his sculptures because it doesn't dry out quite so quickly. He discovered that a hairdryer worked well to soften it for molding when he confiscated it from his son, telling him "that's too feminine."

Most of his large pieces have pal halls, paid for by government bodies. In between these large investments of time and money (not all are commissioned) he supports his sculpting habit by creating smaller "mantle pieces," as he calls them. One, in the studio, is of a horse and carriage.

Other of his pieces can also be seen in the general region. The Last of the Horse Soldiers, for example, is at the entrance to Stanley Point on Pender. Three in Victoria are Alexander MacKenzie at the Pacific, at the Provincial Museum; Governor James Douglas, at City Hall; and Edgar Dewdney, at the head office of the Department of Highways.






