Early-morning action is anti-loggers' first blast

The standoff between Texada Land Corporation and Salt Spring anti-logging activists is about to reach its first flash point.

Faced with a Direct Action Committee blockade of its south-end logging operations early this morning (Wednesday), Texada officials said they would be surprised if extensive civil disobedience actually happened.

"I would be absolutely stunned if they did some thing so short-sighted. But if that's the course they choose to take, then we are prepared for it," director Derek Trethewey said Monday. "They cannot stop the logging so it would only be a temporary hassle."

On-island operations manager Brent Kapler said he had no plan to deal with a possible blockade because "I can't see it happening. But if it does, we'll have to play it by ear.'

The goal of the committee's protest is simply to make a point, not break the law, said organizer Robert Osborne.

"We plan on blocking one truck for the time it takes for an official, probably a policeman, to ask us to message to (Texada's) owners and the provincial government that we could stop the clear-cutting."

Local RCMP sergeant Paul Darbyshire said he plans to attend the 8 a.m.

protest but will have a lowkey presence.

"We will just stand by and keep the peace,' Darbyshire said.

Most citizens groups facing off with Texada have never questioned the right of the company to log their land. Their biggest concerns are about the rate of harvest and the timing.

"We just want them to slow, or delay, so we have time to prioritize and appraisal parcels that could be purchased," said Gary Holman, director of the South and Conservation Partnership.

Holman said he believed that local fundraising has reached close to \$10,000 in cash and pledges. A large



In the leaves for Salt Spring

Tanya Lester and I are at Treasured Spirit talking about predictions for the new year.

Susan Cassidy and Catherine Lily-Hooper are busy preparing for the shop's Millennium Eve Seers' Gala, making festive party hats and testing out the warm cranberry juice they hope to serve at the shop's two-day, year-end

Everyone's vision is beamed on the future as Lester tells me about astrologer Bryan Gray's reading for Salt Spring. (See related

Suddenly she says, "Should I do a teacup reading for Salt Spring?"

Why not, we agree.

She fixes herself another cup of tea, and when it's finished she inverts the cup onto the saucer, turns it the requisite three times and, with her left hand on the cup, meditates on our island home for about a minute.

With characteristic openness, Lester speculates she might be going out on a limb here: this is her first reading of a place rather than a person.

But when she peers at the leaves, there's no doubt that what she sees relates to Salt Spring.

Lester describes new or changed buildings, a healthy year for established businesses and continuing conflict surrounding the Texada Land Corporation.

The first thing Lester sees is a new castle-like structure — or at least a stone building — "that almost has a feeling of a monastery." It appears to be set in the Mount Maxwell area.

The image is "as positive as the stone it's built out of," she says.

Her focus then shifts to downtown Ganges, where she sees some cosmetic changes to Thrifty's and the nearby area, including some different landscaping, and a new car dealer or car rental outlet.

She also sees more changes to the Ganges Village Market centre and that end of town.

A seniors housing complex will get the green light, Lester says, although it might not be constructed on the property first imagined.

A new dock - or maybe an old one that falls apart and needs rebuilding — gleams from the water. It could be a private or a public structure. She also feels that if structural problems with a dock are suspected by anyone, the owners would be advised to get on with fixing them.

Lester sees only one specific tragedy: a workplace injury or possible work-related death.

Salt Spring Islanders "who know how to do things the right way" in running a business will make a fair bit of money this year,

she predicts. "For established businesses on this island, it will be a good year."

Some of that money could be made from involvement in foreign or off-island ventures. People thinking of investing in new projects should look to Vancouver Island north of Victoria, not the province's capital city or Vancouver.

I'm interested in how the Texada lands saga might unfold, so she looks for the answer in the cup.

"For the next six months, it will

be like spinning wheels as far as what the environmentalists want," she says. "They will feel like there is nobody listening.'

After the first six months, Texada may try to develop some of the lands, but will run into hassles with bylaws and regulations.

Overall, Lester has a solid sense of "people in groups" on Salt Spring being active and involved their community. She also sees joining groups as providing a measure of security for people in an uncertain time.





donation is expected to be announced Thursday evening during a regular opposition-group meeting at Fulford Hall.

Company officials insist they are sticking to a public code of principles developed in conjunction with local environmental groups and are therefore taking "the most responsible path available for a harvesting operation."

In early December the company hired Salt Spring forester Terry Gordon in response to community demand for tighter monitoring of logging on Mount Tuam.

Gordon works with Texada's forestry consultant Julian Dunster.

"I was hired to delineate sensitive ecosystems, such as wildlife trees and old-growth, and to help maintain visual esthetics so that (Texada) could stay within their code of principles," he said.

"As far as I can see they are doing everything they said they would."

Gordon is bound by a non-disclosure clause as part of his contract, which means that he must vet all sensitive information with company executives before releasing it to the public.

"I have to walk my own line of ethics, and it's a bit of a balancing act, obviously. But it was (director) Derek Trethewey who called me and asked what could be done to help solve local concerns," Gordon said. "In all the work I've done so far, none has been overruled."

Cutting was set to resume Tuesday after a holiday break from December 22, according to Dunster. Kapler said he thought the daily take was between three and five acres, up slightly from the amount logged when the operation commenced in early November.

Logging restarted on Mount Tuam but not Mount Maxwell as many feared.

"There was talk of going to Maxwell, but I'm pretty sure it has been deferred until we talk with the watershed people," Dunster said.

Company officials have recently held talks with North Salt Spring Waterworks about the effects of logging on the north side of Burgoyne Bay.

"We've done some surveying of things like creeks but basically we talked to them about their concerns for the area, so we're doing some more investigation," said Kapler.

The company is also paying for a computer model of what the area's viewscapes will look like after logging is complete, a plan which came out of earlier meetings with the Islands Trust.

While the most polarized opposition to Texada expresses a zero tolerance to logging, forester Gordon believes that situation could be much worse than it is now.

"I managed the land for the previous owners, who were German aristocrats, in the early 1990s and it is ironic that most people don't know that they were looking seriously at developing the area since 1990." he said.

"It's not like this type of thing wasn't ever going to happen but at least (Texada) has given the public

all sorts of access that the Germans didn't.

"These new owners have made a substantial investment and they know if they harvest too much that'll hurt the value of the land. If they aren't allowed a reasonable return they could be pushed into the type of land auction that (continues to) screw up Galiano."

Land formerly owned by Macmillan-Bloedel on Galiano has been extensively clear-cut during the past 10 years as owners try to realize a return from properties denied development potential.

Regulations for logging on private land will not be introduced until April but will need a one-year phase-in before they have any teeth, Gordon explained.

one of the judges for swim prize categories. One hundred bodies may have made contact with Vesuvius Bay waters on Saturday, but most of them weren't in there long. They seemed to pop and disappear like bubbles on the shore.

I literally caught James Williams and Willy Egeland for winners of the swimmers aged 13-17 category just before they were gone from my sight forever.

Costume judge Tony Richards combed the beach after the swim looking for young Elizabeth Woods, one of her family's Texada Tick species who won third place. Woods' mom Joan Buchanan won best costume prize; while Angela Moseley was second and Tracy Gillender third.

Other children's costume winners were Katy Haydon (first) and Justine Watkins in second place.

Doug and Diana Mitchell awarded Sarah Proctor and Sam Rowlandson-O'Hara the best under-12 swimmer awards, with five-year-old Rowlandson-O'Hara also registering as the youngest swimmer.

Swimmer of most advanced years was Nancy Holcroft, who at 76 was taking her third swim. We laughed as she described arriving half an hour late to her first swim several years ago because (as she recalls) the Driftwood published the incorrect time.

It was up to Diane Tremblay to determine who would be the first to completely submerge his or her body. Since Joe Akerman couldn't even wait for the official countdown to finish before making a swim-racer's dive, that one was

easy. Possibly more difficult was finding the first person out — that's the toughest competition of the day!

For me the real heart of this event is its pure sense of jubilance; the wall-to-wall smiles I see on the beach; the combination of determination, spontaneity and silliness; and the overwhelming support the landlubbers give to screaming plungers.

Some people might remember (but probably not since it wasn't an error) how five years ago I wrote this story from the point of view of a nervous first-time participant, only to discover it was a not-so-cold thrill I highly recommend.



Y2K Bug passes into history books, or has it?

The digital camera at the Driftwood recorded New Year's pictures with a date of January 1, 1904, and weekly horoscopes came in slugged 1959.

These types of software-application errors were about as bad as it got on Salt Spring as the feared Y2K computer scenario passed into history with a wink and a nod.

Salt Spring's essential services reported not even one glitch through the holiday weekend.

"We had lots of contingency plans because I like to be prepared but everything worked just fine," said fire chief Dave Enfield.

At Lady Minto Hospital there were "absolutely no problems," according to administrative assistant Diane Hayes.

Not even B.C. Ferries had one malfunction that could be traced to the Millennium Bug.

Computer experts at Imagen and Tribal Drum called it a non-event.

'We had a whole bunch of paranoid people call in December 30 worried about what might happen, but once New Years passed there wasn't anything related to Y2K," said Imagen's Lee Beauvais.

"The only problems were in the outside world."

And there were precious few of those: a few electrical shutoffs in the U.S. and South Korea, some elevators that wouldn't work in India and some misguided computerized maps in Japanese taxis.

The most consistent glitch appeared to be incorrect dates on legal notices.

But experts are warning that only about one-fifth of anticipated problems would have occurred as computer digits rolled over to 00 from 99.

Expectations are that the world's supply chain could suffer as integrated circuits in developing countries suffer minor breakdowns.

But there is almost no chance that daily life will be disrupted, according to Canada's federal information service.

The new word is - watch out for February 29, the leap-year day, or October 10, the year's first

Abused dog 'Rambo' may land on Salt Spring

A Salt Spring family and at least 14 Vancouver Island families are lining up to adopt Rambo, a five-month-old puppy that was beaten and buried alive before being rescued Sunday by RCMP.

The injured Husky-German Shepherd cross was discovered just before noon when the manager of a trailer park in Langford watched a resident

Rambo is recuperating at Victoria's Juan de Fuca Veterinary Clinic and it will be several weeks before any adoption will be completed by the local SPCA

"We've had a dozen or so inquiries in our file, and one from Salt Spring I heard, but we're waiting until the doctor tells us the dog will survive before we start processing them," said the SPCA's Doug Blayney.

Adoption applications are being accepted by both the vet clinic (478-0422) and the SPCA (385-6521).

BC Hydro - Transmission & Distribution - Vancouver Island is currently renewing a woodpole test and treat pesticide use permit which is an integral part of prolonging the service life of existing woodpoles. Pesticide Use Permit No. 105-953-2000/2002 is to use the following wood preservatives by bandage application and drill and inject for woodpole preservation: Pole-Fume (metam sodium) or equivalent to a maximum of 22,604 poles, applied to the drill holes of the tested woodpoles which are securely sealed with plugs following treatment; use either Pol-Nu CuRap 20 (copper naphthenate and borax) to a maximum of 11,302 poles, or CobraWrap (copper naphthenate) applied as a bandage to the exterior of the pole below groundline; and Impel Rods (boron) to a maximum of 5,651 poles, applied to drill holes of the tested woodpoles and securely sealed with plugs.

Work will be conducted on woodpoles in the surrounding areas of Galiano Island, Pender Island, Saltspring Island, Duncan, Nanaimo, Parksville, Port Alberni, Denman Island, Hornby Island, Courtenay and Campbell River, from approximately April 1, 2000 to December 31, 2002. Property assessments mailed out this week

Gulf Islands property owners will see a slight change in valuations when they receive notices from B.C. Assessment within the next 10 days.

Some values have increased slightly for the area's 12,000 single-family dwellings, while some have dropped, depending on the market valuation last July 1.

On Salt Spring, average waterfront values have remained steady at \$428,000 while non-waterfront ones have dropped from \$182,400 to \$179,200.

Assessments are used to determine property taxes.

The biggest increase is in waterfront properties on North and South Pender islands, which has grown from \$254,700 to \$294,000.

Anyone not agreeing with their assessments must appeal to B.C. Assessment before January 31.

But predictions of all types are big at this time of year.


The beginning of a new year offers us a clean slate of possibility - anything could happen and the temptation to guess the year's coming events is too strong to resist.


cally engineered food every-



Law-abiding

We note with interest and concern from reading your newspaper that Robert Osborne and his Direct Action Committee are planning a training camp during the third week of January in a secret location so that well-organized, civil disobedience tactics may presumably be employed against our property, our employees and their equipment.

Direct Action has publicly voted to pursue civil disobedience. Civil disobedience typically means that people are breaking the law.

We at Texada have told people what we are and are not doing, and have offered tours of our property and operations. We have tried to be accessible and remain so for civil dialogue. We have publicly published our plan and our principles and are trying to work with the community and the Capital Regional District in a constructive manner which will hopefully result in more park land for Salt Spring Island.

We do not think that civil disobedience and breaking the law are positive steps toward building positive relationships on Salt Spring Island.

We do not believe that jumping in front of logging trucks on public roads is very safe; we do not believe that trespassing on private property and damaging people's equipment is right; we do not like the prospect of people's lives or their limbs being put in danger because a chainsaw blade hit a spike in a tree.

Our polite suggestion to Robert Osborne and his Direct Action colleagues is this: invite a seasoned lawyer to your meeting and a member of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police. Ask questions about what is within the law and what is against the law. To the extent that you have protests, please make them peaceful as well as law-abiding. Please do not risk our employees' lives or their livelihood. Please do not risk destroying the goodwill that many honest people are trying to build.

Balance communities

On December 16 the community of Saturna Island met with the superintendent of School District 64 to discuss how to save Saturna Island School.

The meeting was chaired by Ray

Lindsay, who is heading up a committee called The Little School That Could, which was formed to try and save our school.

To start with, a few people chastised the superintendent for allowing some Saturna Island children eligible for Saturna school to go to other schools in the district via the school water taxi.

The superintendent informed us that was a decision of the board and that the Ministry of Education has a policy to encourage shutting down satellite schools and bus students to larger central schools.

Parents of children going to other schools felt it was a hard decision to let their children go to a different school as our school needed every child, but they had to put the social well-being of their child first.

Presentations from other people soon made it clear that the real problem was that there was just not enough young people with families living in the community due to the lack of jobs and high cost of housing.

Some of the discussion involved improving the situation through zoning and creating commercial areas to attract small businesses. To create affordable housing, less negativity should be shown when someone applied for some form of development. People also thought there is a

need for the provincial government to help end the recession.

Everyone agreed that to lose our school would be devastating to the community and it would make it almost impossible to attract families to our community.

It was felt that as we had a significant tax base compared to the number of students, that the Ministry of Education and School District 64 had an obligation to give us the support of time and keep our school open while we work as a community to attract more young families. Without a local school our job will become near impossible.

Listening to everyone confirmed for me my belief that each and every community in the Gulf Islands is a unique entity and we have to work at keeping them healthy. When people become so entrenched in their own beliefs that they lose tolerance for the neighbours' beliefs, lines are drawn and communities become war zones. When this happens, clear thinking and good management go out the window.

When making our land decisions we have to balance the human community with the natural community or we will see the death of our balanced community as we know it.

Arts council bylaws: secretive and undemocratic

The ongoing conflict between the directors of the Gulf Islands Community Arts Council (GICAC) and the Salt Spring membership centres around the undemocratic and secretive process whereby the directors have passed new bylaws.

These new bylaws should never have been passed without membership involvement. They leave a legacy that will change the future of the Gulf Islands arts community forever.

For example: voting members must have attended one previous meeting and have been a member for a month. Sounds simple! It would be if notice were ever published of meetings and if meetings were held other than on the Queen of Nanaimo or on Galiano Island. In addition, it is difficult to become a member in January of each year when notices are not sent out until April, the GICAC office is not manned, calls are not returned and cheques mailed are



not cashed. The new bylaws allow for three members present at a meeting to constitute a quorum. Ten per cent of the membership is now required to requisition a meeting. Sounds simple! It would be if there was a valid membership list.

The last membership list was provided by a director on November 25, 1999, and indicated 248 members. On two occasions the members have requisitioned a special meeting. The first requisition had 40 signatures on it and the second had 31 signatures, and still the directors refuse to give us the requisitioned meeting.

The new bylaws dramatically enhance the powers of the directors, extending their terms to three years instead of two and

allowing them to combine positions so that Lawrie Neish can be president, treasurer and acting secretary. In fact, Lawrie Neish has been president for 10 consecutive years, Lois King, Margot Brady and Keith Holmes have been directors for seven years, Caroline McDonald for six years and Mary Koroscil and Robert Taylor for five years.

A detailed search of the minutes revealed no attempt has been made to strike a nominating committee for the past seven years. The first public notice of vacancies on the board was revealed at the information meeting called by the Concerned Members Committee on May 18, 1999. According to the Registrar of Societies the same directors have been registered for the GICAC as for the newly registered Trincomali Arts Council which

will serve the Outer Islands.

financial statements filed with the Registrar of Societies. For example, the \$80,000 claimed by the directors to have been donated to ArtSpring shows on both ArtSpring's records and GICAC records as \$50,000. The minutes state that, because of its population, Salt Spring should receive double the grant money the Outer Islands receive. A breakdown of total grant monies received by all the islands for 1996, 1997 and 1998 indicates only 27 per cent of the money was received by Salt Spring and a whopping 73 per cent went to the Outer Islands. Even if you deducted the onetime \$25,000 granted to Pender Island in 1996, the numbers still reveal that Salt Spring received less than 50 per cent of the

At a mediation meeting arranged by the Concerned Members, the two directors present initialled their agreement to having the requested voting meeting on Salt Spring. Last week, GICAC members received a letter

from GICAC president, Mr. Neish, informing them a vote on the dissolution of their society would be held January 11, 2000 on Galiano Island.

Since then the Concerned Members committee has received a letter stating the directors are refusing to grant the members the meeting requisitioned on November 30, 1999.

If the directors are allowed to have their way, the 30-year-old GICAC will be dissolved, membership will be fractured into two new geographically determined councils, assets will be divided in a highly questionable way, thus imposing an enormous debt on one group, and a covenant will be placed on the assets designating the Capital Regional District as eventual title owner in case of payment default. The Gulf Islands Community Arts Council will be

forever changed.

Silent majority

Recent concerns and comments published in the media and expressed at public meetings by the "direct action committee" regarding the logging of Texada lands require some clarification.

First, that organization does not speak for all the people of Salt Spring and certainly not for all Salt Spring land owners. To suggest that legal activities on private lands should come under control of government is a serious infringement of the long-established principle of private land ownership, which must not be undermined. To suggest that legal activities on private lands should and could be stopped by civil disobedience is contrary to the principles of law.

Further, logging has been a major economic activity in Salt Spring's past history and the fact that there presently are substantial stands of marketable timber is proof of the ability of Salt Spring's lands to regrow its forests.

Most of the Texada lands being logged are excellent forest lands and are within the Forest Land Reserve and should remain so for further growth and reharvesting.

I believe in the Forest Land Reserve and also the Agriculture Land Reserve and both these provincially designated property categories must remain in place for the purpose for which they were established so that future generations will have available land on which to harvest timber and grow crops and livestock.

While I believe in free expression and applaud anyone's concern for Salt Spring's future, I feel the silent majority must also express its point of view.

Deja vu

Lawrie Neish has been a tireless worker for a number of Salt Spring organizations. Those of us who have worked with him in the past are awed by his zealous application of energy and intelligence to causes that others have long since abandoned in frustration or exhaustion. There is much to be honoured in Lawrie Neish

All the foregoing is true, but if you are experiencing a sense of deja vu at this point, you are correct. In the past 10 years, I have been involved with three organizations which have struggled to find ways to thank Lawrie while telling him the membership wishes to reclaim control.

The Gulf Islands Community Arts Council is a legal entity governed by the statutes and internal bylaws which direct the organization and protect the members. If the directors of a society conduct themselves in a manner that does not represent the consensus of the membership, then that membership is empowered to hold the directors accountable. This they can do by 10 per cent of the membership requisitioning a special meeting with the specific controversial issues on the agenda. Twice now, greater than 10 per cent have requisitioned special meetings (once on November 30, 1999, and again on January 14, 2000). Twice the directors have avoided concurring with the requisitioned meetings.

The first time the directors arranged an information meeting on Galiano Island on November 30 which would conflict with the requisitioned meeting.

The second time the directors advised the membership the January 14 requisitioned meeting on Salt Spring was cancelled and a January 11 meeting to vote on the dissolution of the GICAC would be held on Galiano Island.

The Registrar of Societies stated in a letter dated November 22, 1999, "I strongly suggest that the directors call the meeting, requested by the requisitionists, making certain that all or at least the majority of members receive proper notice.

Until such time as I am assured the requisitioned meeting has been properly called and held, I will not approve the dissolution of the soci-

Since our formation last April, the Concerned Members committee has sought to become more involved in the GICAC and to encourage the membership and the public to be informed.

We have been faced with many obstacles but, to a certain extent, our goal has been accomplished. Much of what had taken place behind closed doors has been revealed. Our one greatest wish was to arrange a voting meeting on Salt Spring Island where 86 per cent of the membership resides. The directors have denied us this

They intend to have the definitive voting meeting on Galiano Island January 11 at 6:30 p.m.

As part of the Concerned Members committee, I urge you to attend this meeting. You may well say "I don't want to be involved." You are involved. For almost 30 years this has been your arts council and it is on the brink of being

dissolved. If you choose not to attend, then all our work will have been for nothing.

On bystander apathy

Salt Spring Island's response to the Texada Lands development reminds me of the idea of bystander apathy from a college course on social psychology.

The peculiar concept of "bystander apathy" was coined following the tragic murder of Kitty Genovese, a young woman stabbed to death in New York City in the 1960s.

While murder in New York City was not especially novel, what brought this case to the attention of social psychologists was the fact that the murder of Kitty Genovese was witnessed by no less than 38 of her neighbours. The neighbours came to their windows at 3 a.m. in response to her screams of terror and remained at their windows watching in helpless fascination for the 30 minutes it took the attacker to complete his grisly deed. No one came to her assistance or so much as lifted the phone to call the police.

Psychologists speculated that the very number of people witnessing this tragedy prevented people from acting. Because in social situations people take cues for action from others, they watched in horror because, paradoxically, they saw no one else taking action.

Since November 1, many people in this community have responded tirelessly to the Texada development.

But I believe that there are many more who care about preserving Salt Spring Island. If people here don't care about where they live, things are worse off than I thought.

If you do care, don't wait for others to speak for you.

For instance, the artistic and music community for which Salt Spring is famous — I know you care about the physical environment that nurtures you.

The hundreds of B&Bs and the rest of the business community that depends on tourism — do you folks think tourists come here just because it is an island?

The homeowners, who, like myself, have invested much of our personal wealth to live here — are you not concerned as I am about the future value of your property?

The people who live directly below the logging — hasn't the thought of mudslides occurred to you?

The young people hanging around Centennial Park — do you guys think you will ever encounter a challenge more real than preventing the destruction of the truly unique place you grew up in?

We are at a critical juncture that will determine the future of this island for the rest of time. Don't let bystander apathy prevent you from taking a stand.



Virtues Project moves into homes in Vision TV series

Thirteen virtues will be explored over the next three months as Vision TV features lessons from the locally created Virtues Project.

The television series, entitled Virtues: A Family Affair, begins tomorrow (Thursday) at 8:30 p.m. It offers parents and families "practical tools to bring simple spirituality and character education into their children's lives."

Co-written and co-produced by Salt Spring's Linda Kavelin Popov, the series is based on the Virtues Project, created nine years ago by Kavelin Popov, her husband Dan Popov and her brother John Kavelin.

"Too many of our children are technical wizards and moral illiterates," notes Kavelin Popov in a press package. "But there is hope. If we can awaken the virtues within their characters, our children can be the excellent, compassionate people they are meant to be."

The Family Virtues Guide was self-published in 1991 and has since been picked up by Penguin Books, translated into six languages and used as a guide in 85 countries around the world.

During the International Year of the Family, the Virtues Project was honoured by the United Nations Secretariat as a model global program for families of all cultures.

Kavelin Popov is co-producing the television series with Hilary Jones-Farrow, president of the Victoria-based The May Street Group Film, Video and Animation Ltd., who is also a mother of five children.

Farrow says, "Parents want to know how to teach their children right from wrong, to have confidence in themselves, to be thoughtful, respectful. Many parents, for many reasons, no longer know how to pass these practices on to their children." The first installment of Virtues: A Family Affair focuses on "idealism." It introduces the Virtues Project and its five strategies to help parents bring out the best in their children.

January 13 takes on the virtue of "kindness," looking at ways to avoid shaming children and instead, naming the virtues one can encourage in them.

can encourage in them.

"Joyfulness" runs January 20, showing life as an opportunity for learning; and "justice" — creating clear boundaries — is the subject of the January 27 program.

Virtues: A Family Affair runs every Thursday until March 30.

Salt Spring cablevision show features Scrooge performance, swim footage

Community TV programming returns to Salt Spring Cablevision beginning Friday night with a two-hour show featuring the talents and passions of islanders.

Peter Prince, who has 20 years of experience in the film industry, was recently hired as community programmer for the local cable company.

For the January 7 program, which airs at 7 p.m., Prince has combined short documentaries created in the past year or so with Christmas With Scrooge and January 1 Vesuvius Beach Polar Bear Swim footage.

It will also run at 7 p.m. for the next three Mondays — January 10, 17 and 24.

Prince put the show together at his Island VideoWorks studio.

The first hour captures "the songs, dances, spirit and spectacle" of the Newmans' Christmas With Scrooge which ran at ArtSpring December 17-20.

Opening the second hour is Riparian Discovery, a short educational program produced with support from the Waterbird Watch Collective. In it, youngsters Emma Rimmer and Laura Stewart explore island streams, identifying features that make these lush ecosystems so important for a variety of indigenous plants and creatures.

Bean Discovery follows Phoenix Elementary School students on their organic farm adventure at Dan Jason's Salt Spring Seeds.

"It's just such a fascinating place that Dan has there," said Prince.

Second Chance is a short documentary about Jeff Lederman and the Island Wildlife Natural Care Centre which has previously aired on the Knowledge Network. Produced by Prince's Vision Quest Films and featuring his soundtrack and editing, Second Chance shows Lederman caring for sick, injured and orphaned wild animals.

Prince isn't sure how many people have watched local cable programming in the past — and there hasn't been any for awhile — but he hopes his work and that of others submitted in the future will create a regular audience.

"I want to up the standard so that people will want to watch it," he explained.

Prince is also interested in getting feedback from people about the January program, plus ideas for what they would like to see on Channel 12.


For the past two months Prince has been filming meetings and rallies and individuals involved in the Texada lands issue.


Later this month that footage will be transformed into the Tex-Files.


Prince is a musician and filmmaker who has done work with the CBC, National Film Board and several other agencies, and whose films have been viewed both nationally and internationally.

Rapid eye movement to me was something experienced on the grad trip to that beach in the south of France or at a tennis game where you were unlucky enough to get seats at centre court.


This preceded vertigo and grand mal seizure in both cases.

RLS is not to be confused with a myoclonic jerk, a normal occurrence that can happen just as you are falling off to sleep.




Another time we will either explore the exciting sleep disorder insomnia or we'll discuss the relationship between irritable bowel syndrome, the NDP and phlegm.

Scorpion boys shock older touring Oz squad

Showing the control of a mucholder team, Gulf Islands Secondary School (GISS) senior boys basketball Scorpions traded the Southern Cross Sharks bucket for bucket before a late spurt sent them to a 68-61 victory December 28.

The Sharks, a touring club team from Australia, used the inside finesse of its 20-year-olds to run up an early lead on the young hosts. They also started a fast-break run that had the Scorpion forwards moving back before they could set up an offence.

But GISS suffered only a few minutes of doubt, clawing back mid-way through the first quarter with four straight inside hoops to hold a one-point lead — 16-15 — at the end of the period.

"It was a nice disciplined game for us," said Scorpions' co-coach John Callas. "Basically it was anyone's game until the last couple of minutes."

The visitors moved up by one at the half before GISS rallied for a 47-43 margin after three-quarters.

The final score was only decided after GISS watched Southern Cross phenomenon Ashley Owen foul out midway through the final quarter with 28 points.

Owen was unstoppable whenever he got his hands on the ball, and only the last vestiges of jet-lag kept his scoring total as low as it was.

The Sharks were playing their first of eight exhibition games against high school teams in B.C., Washington and Oregon.

They arrived in Canada on Boxing Day and were made up of players from throughout the southern part of Australia.

Sponsored by equipment manufacturer ProBall, Southern Cross is a club team.

While Australian schools do have teams, most players join club squads, similar to youth soccer style on Salt Spring. Players range from 17 to 20 years and can compete up to the national championship level.

"We start our club system under-10 and sports like basketball can have a nine-to-10-month season," said David Casey, coach of both the Sharks' senior and junior teams and on his eighth tour of North America.

Australian basketball has grown tremendously in the past 20 years as many top prospects landed on American university teams and in professional leagues around the world. The emphasis is on speed, especially because, unlike the two-and-a-half steps allowed in North America, Australians get only one-and-a-half before travelling is called

"That's the difference, that first step," Casey said. "Speed is everything at home."

The Scorpions discovered that quickly as the Sharks simply ran past them for most of the game's early stages. But under the calming influence of captain Chris Langdon they slowed the game down and waited patiently for their own chances.

They started to come during the second half when high-scoring Brian Crowe rediscovered his outside shooting, contributing 20 second-half points for a game total of 27.

But it was an inside bucket that broke the Sharks' back.

Leading 65-61, GISS was hanging on with just over a minute left until Jesse McEachern found Crowe deep in the paint.

The lanky forward was stymied on his first shot but battled to get the rebound and a put-back that boosted the margin to seven and secured the win.

"I think it was the rebounding of Sam (Hannah) and Alex (Lemay) that was the real difference in the game. (The Sharks') forwards could get up so well and it was up to our guys to just stand in and battle," Callas said.

The Scorpions next travel to Nanaimo's John Barsby Secondary School for a tournament Thursday to Saturday.

Sherrin disc takes top island spot

Glen Whitlock, from Gibson's Landing, finished with a 36-hole total of 82 to top the open event at the second annual Boxing Day Classic at the Hart Memorial Disc Golf Park in Mouat Park.

Islander Mitchell Sherrin posted a 91 over the two rounds to take the advanced event as well as the best local score.

Two other Salt Springers walked away from the competi-

tion with trophies, including Seth Burton, whose 94 brought the amateur event title, and Joanne O'Connor, who took the 18-hole women's event with a 63.

The competition, organized by Sherrin and Dean Crouse, is now part of the Duck Golf Series and attracted more regional players in its second year.

Vancouver's Larry Strohan

carded an 89 to finish in second place in the open event, while Mike Graf, also of Vancouver, finished third with a 101.

Victoria's Rae Henderson and Todd Martin each finished three strokes behind Sherrin in the advanced division while Crouse and Victoria's George White and Clayton Beddington ended five strokes behind Burton in the

The junior boys Scorpions discovered one thing about Australian basketball December 28 when they dropped a 76-42 decision to the junior Southern Cross Sharks at home: speed is the key to any successful team.







Galiano bird counters spot 6,000 feathered friends

A thick blanket of fog provided a challenge in finding birds normally seen at a distance during Galiano's 13th annual Christmas Bird Count held December 27.

Nevertheless, approximately 6,000 birds belonging to 75 species were counted.

Only 39 bald eagles were seen, which is down somewhat from previous years, but this is likely due to the heavy fog keeping most of the birds grounded. Where the fog thinned and at higher elevations, other species were seen in unusually high numbers including mew gulls (153), ruby-crowned kinglets (61), pine siskins (804) and red crossbills (230). Counts for most species were within the normal range.

Several species that have only occasionally been seen at past Christmas bird counts were also found this year, including wood ducks, oldsquaw ducks, ring-necked ducks, merlin, ring-billed gulls, rhinoceros auklets, Steller's Jays and Hutton's vireos. One species was observed for the first time: an American kestrel.

New century

Galiano saluted the dawning of the year 2000 much as in other areas. There were many house parties and a special dinner and entertainment at the pub. At least one bed and break-

fast facility provided special new year fare for its clientele. A very successful venture was held at Galiano Hall. Here food, dancing and entertainment kept the revellers happy until the clock struck 12 and the 20th century ended.

On New Year's Day a tradition was revived when close to 50 island residents had a picnic lunch at Dionisio Point Park. Some hiked into the park, others drove in, having permission from a nearby forest lot

Pup tents were set up at Dionisio. Divers in wet suits relaxed in the sunshine, but no "polar swimmers" took to the waters. At nearby maple tree beach, however, a lone swimmer was spotted.

Last century

This North Galiano history is continued from last week's column.

Perhaps the most settled area on North Galiano in 1900 was at Retreat Cove. The land around the cove was designated in the land survey of 1888 as District Lot 61. Before that time, William Weston had registered his claim but later (1890) abandoned it to James Warnock. (Warnock was the gentleman mentioned here last week as a settler at Spotlight Cove.)

Warnock gave up his claim later that year to Walter Beall who in 1894 in turn abandoned it in favour of Edward McCroskrie. A widower, McCroskrie remarried and brought his three children and his new wife to the island, living temporarily in a rude cottage with a dirt floor. Early in 1895 the family moved into their newly built squared-log cottage. The building still exists, now relocated and its rotted timbers replaced. It has been given a new roof and permanent footings. A nearby creek provided water here as at most early set-tlements

No school existed on North Galiano at this time, so McCroskrie hired a governess-teacher named Ethel Johnson for his growing family (there were to be three more children). Bill McCroskrie, son of the first marriage, lived on the property until about 1975. The Bealls stayed at the cove for many years, a daughter marrying into the Oulette family who occupied land at east-side Cable Bay.

A school was established for the growing number of young folk in 1905. Long gone, it was located on McClure Road. Still in existence just south of the cove is Weston's cottage, dating from about 1883. It was enlarged by its owner in the 1960s.

Burns supper

Plans are now under way for North Galiano's annual Burns Supper. It will be held in the North Hall on Saturday, February 5, a week and a bit after the bard's official birthday on January 25.

The traditional Scots supper is scheduled for 7 p.m., gathering time 6:30. Traditional dress is encour-

aged, but not required. After the supper with its "piping o' the haggis," there will be toasts and speeches. Musical entertainment is usually on the program as well.
