McCausland, for the window (reduced from \$125), \$100; freight, \$3.50; cost of erection, \$3. Total expended, \$106.50, leaving balance in hand \$20. Of this balance, Rev. E. F. Wilson and C. Abbot agree to transfer their subscriptions (\$5 each) to St. Mary's, Fulford, for painting and improvements; and Mr. G. Borradaile transfers his second donation of \$5 to St. Mark's general purposes fund. This leaves \$5 in the surer's hands, which will be applied to St. CHIDD RAIN
