SALT SPRING ISLAND.

Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Crofton left for England on April 18th.

A wide vein of coal is reported to have been struck at Vesuvius Bay.

The Victoria Chemical Works have had their agent round among the farmers offering fertilizers for sale.

William Lundy has been appointed sexton to St. Mark's Church, in the place of George Booth, resigned.

The wagon road is completed out to Maxwell's Lake and Mr. and Mrs. Dumain have gone in as the first settlers there.

The little afflicted daughter of Mr. Cotsford had the misfortune to break her leg April 5th. The child is doing as well as could be expected.

A bright little service is held the second Sunday morning in each month at Mr. Cooke's school, on the Divide. The people about there are mostly members of the Church, and the singing and responding are well joined in.

The churchwardens' accounts for St. Mark's Church during the past year showed: Total offertory, \$172.77; paid clergyman's stipend, \$141.95; Mission Fund, \$6.17; Foreign Missions, \$6.15; Widows and Orphans' Fund, \$9.85; general purposes, \$6.65. Also Lenten offerings to Mission Fund, \$33.93; and special collection for painting and repairing the church, \$47.00.
