New amendment

Trustees to take over by January of 1979 explains Trust Chairman

Changes in the Islands Trust Act are unlikely to be fully implemented until January, 1979. Chairman of the Islands Trust, Marc Holmes, of Isabella Point Road, Fulford, told Driftwood this week that he expects the general terms of Bill 25 to be put into effect next January.

This would bring land-use regulation into the range of the Islands Trust, rather than the regional districts. A number of other, minor administrative matters would be transferred at the same time.

Change in the method of naming trustees to the Islands Trust would probably come into effect in January, 1979, he suggested.

This would mean that the appointed general trustees would hold office for another year, while the necessary machinery was set up to permit of the new routine whereby general trustees will be

named by and from the local, elected trustees.

Bill 25, the Islands Trust Amendment Act, will "unquestionably" go through, the chairman told Driftwood.

REGIONAL DISTRICT

By 1979 the Islands will have something resembling an Islands regional district, he suggested.

Among newer changes to the act are a provision whereby the Islands Trust will be able to hold land in perpetuity for public use.

A number of property owners have offered land to the Trust in past years, said Holmes, but there was no provision whereby the Trust could accept it. New amendment gives it that authority.

What protection is afforded the donor, he was asked.

It could be covenanted, he suggested, the government is able

to accept land with a protective covenant attached.

"The elected trustee job is going to be an extremely important and a very busy one," forecast the chairman of the Islands Trust.

He has never supported the idea of appointing three general trustees, recalled the chairman. He had recommended the election of at least one general trustee to two governments, he told Driftwood.

There is some advantage to having at least one appointed trustee, he added. An appointed member would be there to look after the provincial interests.

He offers reason for two

It was pointed out in a recent issue of Driftwood that the Anti-Inflation Board wastes a lot of paper by sending out duplicate news releases. Every few days Driftwood receives information from the Board: two copies of the same release in different envelopes.

Cameron Hay, of Mayne Island, wrote to Driftwood last week suggesting that Driftwood gets two copies of a release for the same reason that Mr. Hay gets two copies of Driftwood every week.

The circulation department has seen to it that Mr. Hay will, in future, receive only one copy of Driftwood every week. And the government is slower to change.

There is little time remaining for islanders to view the work of local artists and craftsmen at Artcraft '77 in Mahon Hall.

The show, which has been running since the beginning of July, will close its doors on Labour Day, September 5, until next year.

Jill Cobanli of the Community Arts Council, said on Monday that there are a number of new displays in the hall. With only a few days left, she urged that people get to the hall before the showing is over.

Salt Spring sailor Sutcliffe sets sail in sailing race

A Salt Spring Island man has departed on the first leg of a journey that will take him around the world on a 77-foot yacht.

Charles Sutcliffe, 61, is a crew member of the sailboat GB II, which left Portsmouth, England on Friday. The GB II is one of 15 boats competing in the Whitbread Round the World Race, a race which is held every two years.

Mr. Sutcliffe was looking through a British Columbia boating magazine last year when he saw an advertisement looking for someone to crew on the GB II. He applied for the position last December and was subsequently invited to join the crew.

The first part of the race is a 40-day sail that will take the boat to Cape Town, South Africa. From there they will go to Auckland, New Zealand, where they'll spend Christmas and following that will go around Cape Horn to Rio de Janeiro. They will return to Portsmouth by next April.

Mrs. Sutcliffe, who is remaining on Salt Spring, told Driftwood on Monday that her husband describes himself as a novice sailor and that he is very keen.

"Ever since he read Chichester's book he's been enthusiastic about sailing around the world," she said.

Mr. and Mrs. Sutcliffe spent 13 years in Hong Kong, where he was Commissioner of Police, before moving to Salt Spring three years ago.

Legg, who played second in the regular season, have knuckleballer Don Perkins and spinball pitcher Pat Slingsby.

Marty Legg plays third with expertise; David Woodley fields well at shortstop, with Malcolm Legg cut off the hits to second base

and Jay Bourdin snagging the balls at first.

Ron Hatch, Chris Lake, Don Funk and Wayne Reynolds are utility players capable of playing anywhere when called upon. Wayne Taylor is catching with support from Ron Hutch and Malcolm Legg.

Gary Hartwig, Randy Howard and Fin Ronne ramble the fields. Gary and Randy have the best on base batting average on the team.

Barry Walker and John Pickering are the pitching battery for G.A.S. If these guys are on, G.A.S. is capable of beating any team. The infield features acrobatic Wayne De Vane at short with Brent Vickers, Dan Davis and Kevin Bell round out the cast in the infield. The outfield lineup is Bruce Marley, John Helm, Don Byrum and Finbar McMillan.

Spinballer Albert Kaye, coach Ace Mainwaring, and Ray Stelter are the pitchers for the Police. Gumper Kaye catches. Cablevision has probably the best infield on the island with Toby Seward at first, Pat Lockert at second, Bob Storey at short stop and Elmer Bichel at third. Brian Logan, Gordon Speed and Jeff Cochrane are the fielders. Gordon is one of the best defensive outfielders in the League. Hopefully Chuck Farina will be off the injury list. Mike Alexander will add some needed experience where ever the need be.

all year deserve special recognition for persistency, Mark Lowe, Rene Valcourt, Pierre Valcourt, Jim Walsh, and Paul Smith. Wayne Penny is the captain and pitcher with Julian Valcourt supporting. Julian also adds strength in outfield along with Paul Smith, Mike Valcourt and Leo Toutant. Joey

Toutant works hard at shortstop and Greg Coles hustles at second.

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Prison term for driving and drinking

Judge D.K. McAdam sentenced Michael Baldwin to 28 days in jail for two driving charges laid under the Criminal Code, when he appeared in Ganges Provincial Court last Wednesday.

Baldwin pleaded guilty to operating a vehicle while his license was under suspension and a second charge of driving while impaired.

On July 23, near the Otter Bay Marina at Pender Island, RCMP investigated when they saw a vehicle moving back and forwards on the road. Baldwin was operating the vehicle and was subsequently taken to Ganges for a breathalyzer test. Readings of 0.11 and 0.10 were obtained.

A whale of a time

Everything connected with the killer whale show at Sealand, Victoria's oceanarium, looks so effortless.

The trainer stands by the edge of the pool with a bucket of herring in one hand and a shiny whistle in the other. He shifts his weight from side to side, waves a hand in the air, points, and makes a fist.

Directly in front of him a 4.5 ton killer whale with teeth like ivory knives is going through his paces. Haida might do a back stroke, belly flop, dive, jump, sing, accelerate through the water, or even spit.

At three gallons of seawater per mouthful, that's a substantial shower, and his scurrying, giggling public couldn't be more delighted. And Haida's so-called rude behavior is rewarded with a handful of herring.

VAUDEVILLE ACT

The trainer's name is Cees Schrage, and he and Haida almost look like partners in a vaudeville act. Sometimes it might even appear that Haida is the real boss of the show, but Cees has control of both the whistle and the herring.

For example, Haida's grand finale is to leap high out of the water and touch a ball on a string. As soon as he touches it the whistle blows, signifying approval. If he misses, the whistle won't blow. No whistle, no herring.

But getting Haida to leap on cue is a slow and patient process.

"The basic training in building up each of his 30 behaviors takes about three weeks," says Cees. "In this case I start out by pushing the ball right on his nose, giving him herring and blowing the whistle all at the same time."

"Then one day I hold the ball slightly over his nose. As soon as he comes out of the water to touch the ball, I give him the herring and blow the whistle."

From then on it is just a matter of degree, of taking the ball up higher and higher.

But Cees points out that he has to be careful about how quickly he teaches Haida any trick. If he demands too much from the whale at one time, the animal will refuse to perform at all.

BASICALLY SATISFIED

Withholding his services is Haida's way of expressing his displeasure with things, Cees says, but it rarely ever happens. As a result, Cees believes Haida is basically satisfied with his life at Sealand.

"In the open ocean killer whales hunt in packs and cover great distances because they are in search of food," Cees says. "But I wonder if they would move around at all if the food they needed was available for them in one spot?"

In fact, a killer whale is not really a whale at all, but the largest member of the dolphin family. Although it has a reputation the world over for being an aggressive, even merciless killer, surprisingly little accurate information has been gathered on this massive, warm-blooded mammal.

One way Sealand is attempting to add to the knowledge of killer whales is by taking blood samples from Haida on a regular basis. That may seem a bit elementary until you consider what's involved.

TRUST

Cees has trained Haida to stand on his head and offer up his soft tail to the needle. For this to occur a strong bond of trust must exist between man and animal, as Haida's every instinct is to fight off that sharp, jabbing point.

"Most exotic of Canada's species"

Arbutus: a broad leaved evergreen

The shape of the arbutus tree is pleasingly reminiscent of an Oriental painting and some would claim this tree is the most exotic of Canada's native species.

Many are intrigued by the sinuous trunks and branches, also by the colour contrast they lend to the landscape. Bark of the tree is sometimes reddish or orange, sometimes partly green, sometimes mottled, varying with the season of the year, the age of the

tree and where it is located.

Observe the bark of an arbutus closely beginning mid-August and you will be able to follow an unusual cycle of colour change. There are differences in individual trees, but very generally speaking, if you are looking at an old tree you will find that the red bark on the upper trunk and limbs is beginning to pull off in thin papery strips, exposing a silky yellow green underneath.

In a young arbutus this shedding will probably occur throughout the tree. Foresters call the process "exfoliating" and in a hot weather period you may actually hear the bark rustle as "exfoliation" occurs. **GREEN TO RED**

Gradually with the advance of the season, you will notice the newly revealed green turn red. On old trunks the first reddening bark will thicken, breaking into many small flakes and you may see that in some trees, much of the flaking falls off, leaving the trunk with that smooth texture, so fascinating to the eye and touch.

The leaf cycle too is of interest. Although it is always stated that arbutus is the only broad leaved evergreen native to Canada, it does, of course shed leaves. Unlike most of our other trees, new leaves push out mid summer and this is when the old foliage begins to turn brown, hanging on branches for a time, then finally dropping off.

Watch for bird life. Arbutus produces clusters of creamy/white bell shaped flowers in May that are followed in late summer by orange/red berries. For humans these are edible but not palatable. However, birds eat them avidly as late winter food.

We have not had extensive scientific studies of the arbutus. Why not carry out your own research? It will be enjoyable and you will learn a great deal about this tree.

Very approximately, here is what to look for at different times of the year:

Late March, leaf bud swelling begins; May, flower bud swelling begins; May, flowering begins; June, full bloom; June-July, second year leaves fall; June-September, bark exfoliates; October, fruits mature.

HOW BIG?

On good sites, arbutus may grow a foot a year, but height growth tapers off rapidly as the crown forms. Largest arbutus in Canada are about 90 feet tall with a trunk diameter of three feet. Speaking generally, when the tree reaches maturity on good sites it is usually about 80 feet. On medium good sites, 30-60 feet; on poor sites, only 15-25 feet. The largest specimen reported in the U.S. had a circumference of 27 feet, eight inches at a height of 4.5 feet from the ground.

Arbutus and madrona are one and the same. In the U.S., the name "Madrona" was given to this tree by the first white man who ever saw it: Father Juan Crespi, chronicler of the Portola expedition which was exploring California in 1769. The word "madrona" referred to the strawberry tree (arbutus unedo) native to the Mediterranean and related to our species. Most people in the U.S. refer to the arbutus as "madrona".

RANGE

The arbutus or Pacific madrona has the northern limits of its range at about latitude 50° N, in the vicinity of Seymour Narrows on the eastern coast and locally on the western coast of Vancouver Island.

From this point, arbutus occurs fairly commonly west of the Cascade Range in Washington and Oregon. It grows on the west slope of the Sierra south to central California and extends farther south in the coastal mountain ranges of Southern California.

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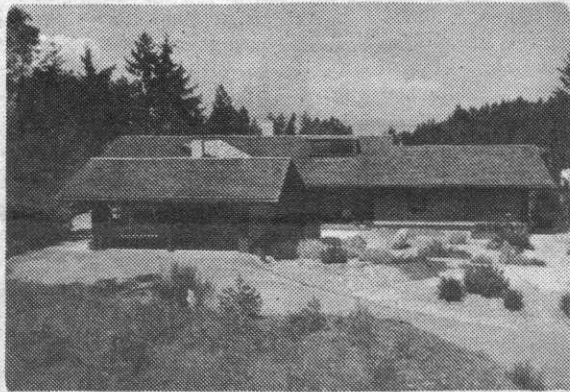

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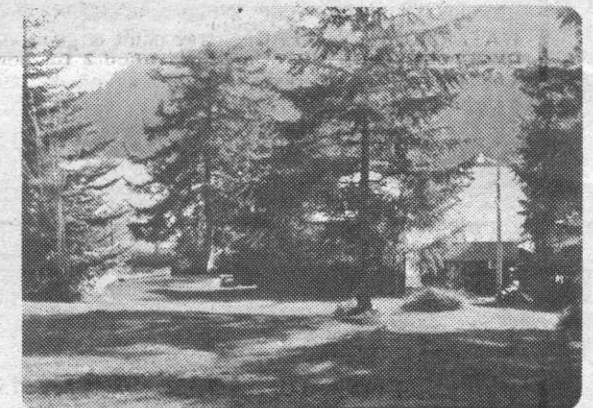
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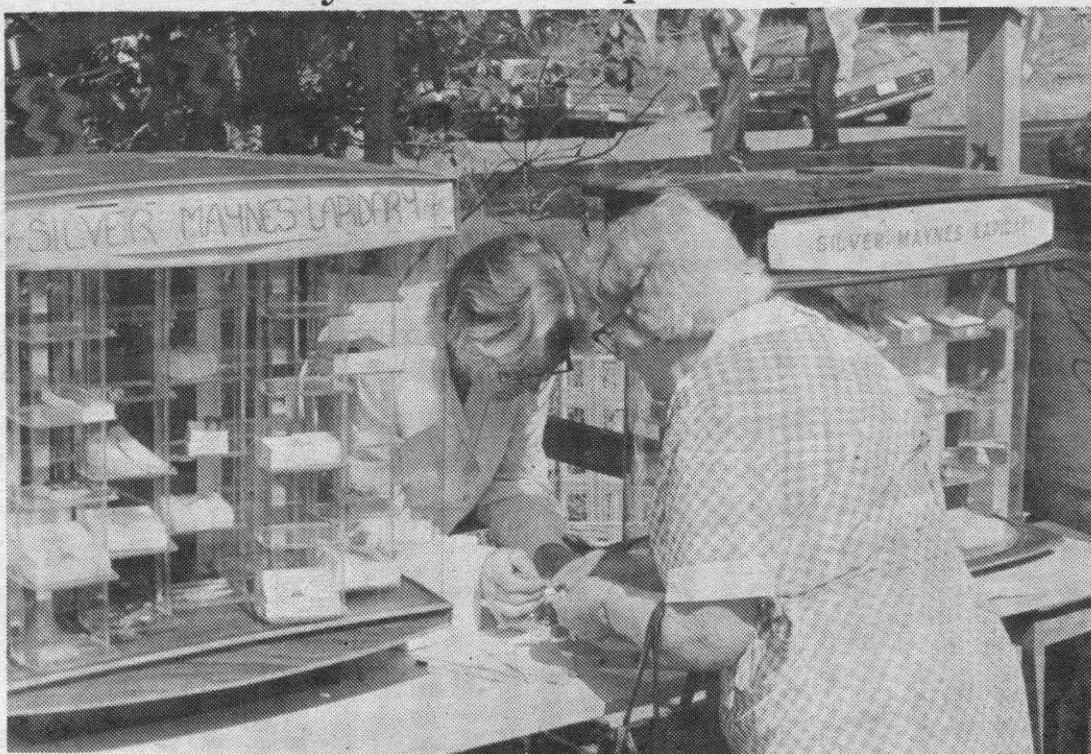
