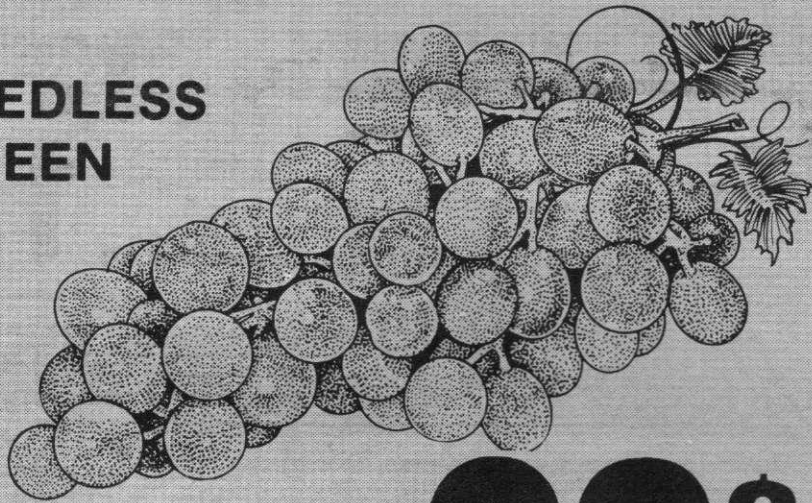

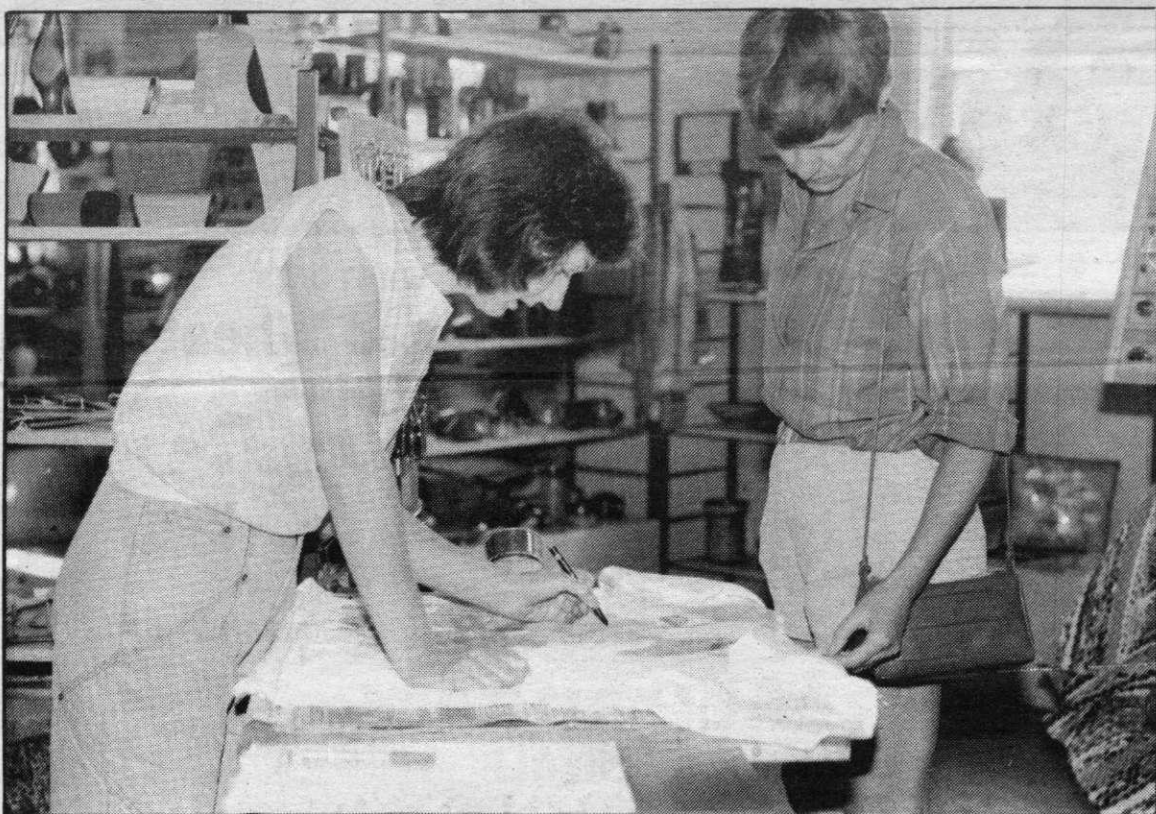

## Old newspapers provide flashback

Nothing is new. The ancients discovered the truth of that statement and the moderns find it depressingly accurate. Not even Expo and its wonders are new to the world.

A few weeks ago Mrs. E.F. Odum of Mobrae left me a collection of pieces from early copies of the *Illustrated London News*. Dating back 70 years to the Great War, they brought to mind the vast change in the presentation of news since the early years of the century. They also served as a reminder that what is new to us is not necessarily new.

A report from France, in the *News* of May 16, 1914, describes the new Bachelet system of levitation and propulsion of a magnetic train. By coincidence I had seen and tried out the Japanese magnetic train only a few weeks before finding this magazine.

I am not seeking to put down those who are still experimenting, and successfully, with the system of moving a vehicle on magnetic repulsion and propelling it by solenoids.

The *Illustrated London News* described it as the levitated or flying train invented by Emile Bachelet. The design is intended for a train travelling at speeds up to 300 mph, read the report.

It was explained, with illustrations, that the vehicle consisted of a 45-pound vehicle travelling a track of 35 feet in the original working model. The train was lifted by a series of coils, or "bobbins" which, when energized, exerted a repellent force on the vehicle.

A second series of solenoids

formed bridges around the track and attracted the car towards them. As soon as the car reached these magnetic solenoids, the power was cut, automatically. The car moved past them, drawn by the next solenoid in the system.

And this was in 1914.

The collection of sheets included one from the *News* issue of March 28, 1914, when the contestants in the current year's Oxford and Cambridge boat race were lined up.

Weighing in at 13 stone, 7 lbs., — or 159 lbs. — and No. 3 in the Cambridge crew is P.C. Livingston, Vancouver and Jesus College, at Cambridge.

Graduating in medicine shortly afterwards, Livingston was destined to devote his life to military medicine and to complete his association with the Royal Air Force as senior medical officer in the rank of Air Vice-Marshal. Sixty years later, knighted, he would conduct his practice as an eye specialist from his Fulford home.

The collection of excerpts from the *Illustrated London News* is of general interest for the pattern of change it shows in pictorial news presentation. Part of the picture material is photographic and part is pen and ink drawing by artists. So new is the photography that the magazine was still featuring a column, *The Camera as Correspondent*, a series of battlefield pictures supplementing the copious artists' drawings of war.

Even the procedure in sketches was interesting. Many of the pictures were drawn in London by an artist compiling the finished work from sketches by artists in

the field.

The publication shows all the emotion of the moment in its presentation of war. The enemy is abominable and the friendly nations are "our brave allies".

Mrs. Odum and her daughter share a regret over their collection of wartime magazines. The grandchildren have little interest in

the Great War and the books lie unread and abandoned.

They are looking for a museum or university which might value such letters.

In the meantime, they still have a library of books left by Edwin Faraday which they are determined to keep.

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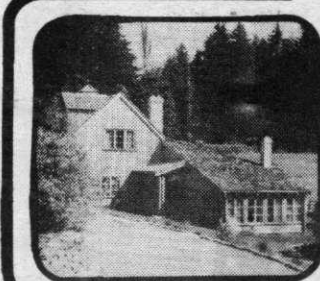
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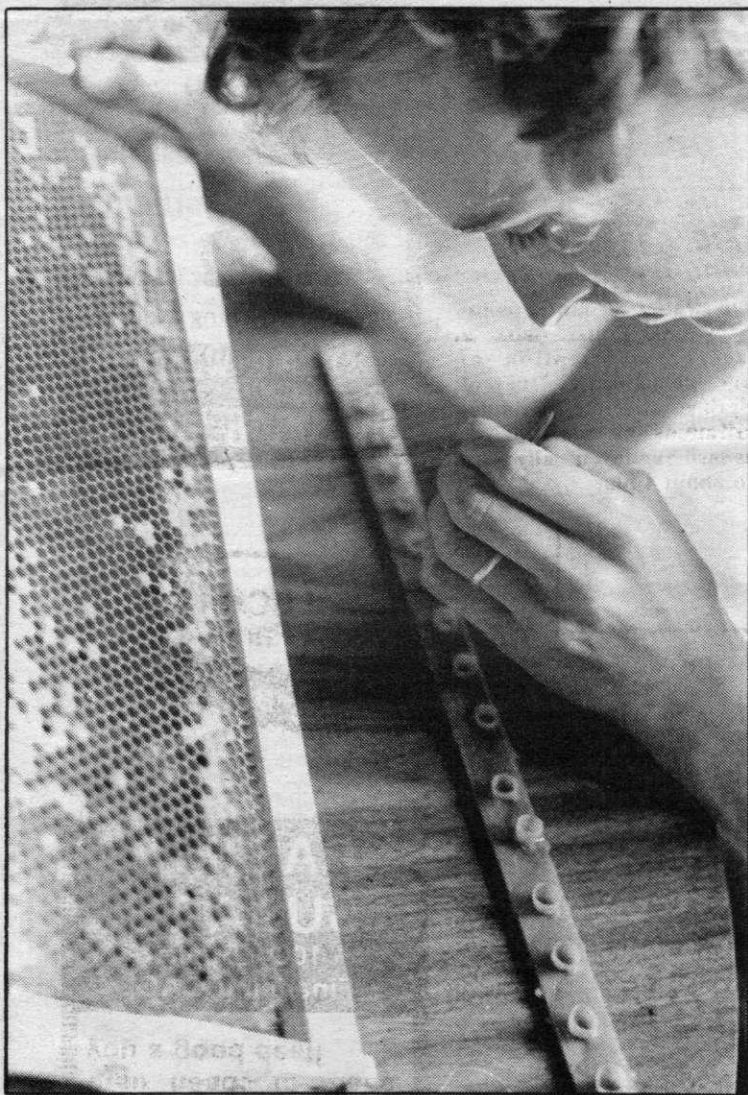


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Blair Tarvis transplants larvae into cell cups as first step in production of queen bees.

## Beehives produce queens, not honey

A fascination with the inner workings of beehives has led many enthusiasts to reap the sweet harvest of the wonderful honey-bee over the years.

Now a more lucrative aspect to honey production is being mined from Canadian beehives, much of it here on the west coast. Queen bee raising is becoming increasingly popular to beekeepers for a variety of reasons.

South Pender Island residents Blair and Cheryl Tarves are newcomers to the business of raising queen bees. On warm days between May and August their front yard will be alive with the hum and activity found on any beekeeper's property.

But instead of honey gathering, the main thrust of attention is the mid-air mating ritual of the queens, and the process of hatching larvae to increase the overall queen population.

"Raising queens is much more fun than producing honey," said Tarves. "There's more variety to your work and there is more skill required."

In addition, he said, a certain amount of genetic control allows him to breed bees particularly suited for beekeepers.

Capacity for honey production, gentleness and over-winterability are all characteristics he looked for in selecting his breeder stock.

According to Tarves, Canadian beekeepers have traditionally gone to California to re-stock their hives in the spring with queen bees. Recently, threats of Africanized bee strains and Acarine Mites in American stock has raised fears about the heavy reliance of Canadian keepers on imported queen bees.

"Bee diseases are coming into the U.S. from South America and

Mexico. Acarine Mites are the main problem. They have been found in the southeastern U.S. where the queen bee industry has been damaged," Tarves said.

"Restrictions have been imposed on moving bees from state to state, and California is making every effort to protect its industry."

He added that rumours have been circulating that the Canadian border may be closed to bee importers to prevent disease and Africanized strains from entering this country.

In fact, Eastern Canada has already banned imports from the U.S., according to the spring report from the agriculture ministry. Bees and queens produced in western Canada are also excluded from the eastern market.

Tarves, 25, is heeding the call to help build a more self-reliant industry in the west with his 100 hives on South Pender.

And why the Gulf Islands?

"This is one of the few places in Canada to raise queens commercially," said Tarves, noting studies that cite the islands and the lower mainland as "Canada's Mediterranean".

Last year, he said, there were very few queen bee raisers in B.C., but now there are about two dozen producers.

"The potential is huge," he said, noting the large number of beekeepers in B.C. capable of producing queens.

Perhaps the news from the U.S. will encourage others to follow the Tarves initiative. Instead of going to California every spring, northern beekeepers could keep Canadian dollars within the country.

"There is a phenomenal amount of money that flows down

## Fire communication system scheduled for improvement

With the help of a \$20,000 Lottery Fund grant, the Mayne Island Fire Department is going ahead with plans for a repeater station on Mt. Parke to improve the fire communication system on the island.

From the outset, the project's goal has been to cover weak areas and offer an uninterrupted UHF paging system to all of the Outer Gulf Islands.

Harry Lane, assistant fire chief on Mayne as of July 1, said the community must raise \$24,000 in taxes to supplement the Lottery Fund grant.

"We require a repeater for any kind of communication on this island, and repeaters are not available on VHF (frequencies)," he said in explaining the push to proceed with the project.

Lane also explained that the Mayne Island Fire District does not operate under the Capital Regional District, and as such,

has more local autonomy in decision-making than the other Outer Islands.

While Mayne and Saturna are committed to putting in the repeater station, Galiano and North Pender operate independently. According to Doug Stevenson at the North Pender Fire Department, a decision on whether to opt into Mayne's central alarm system hasn't been reached.

"We are looking into various modernized ways of communication. Nothing has been decided as yet," said Stevenson.

Meanwhile, Galiano has recently upgraded their paging system with new Motorola voice pagers. Michael Sharp, volunteer fireman for South Galiano, estimated that \$6,000 was invested to provide the new VHF pagers to 10 firemen.

Opting into Mayne's fire system would have meant initial costs that Galiano found prohibitive, according to Steve Parlee. Parlee sits on the board of directors for Galiano's fire department, and he said Mayne was discussing figures between \$30,000 and \$40,000.

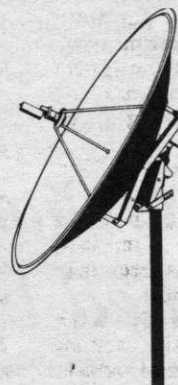
"We couldn't entertain that sort of figure," Parlee said.

Furthermore, Galiano is happy with the system they have. Sharp explained that fire reporting operates through a fire phone system which links the private lines of eight firemen in an emergency

call. In addition, one button sets off alarms at both fire halls and on all the pagers.

The only problem Sharp cited was some difficulty in transmitting to firemen who live at the extreme north end of their district. Hydro lines cutting across the island at Montague Provincial Park appear to be causing some interference. He explained that while the firemen hear the alarm,

follow-up communication is poor.

According to Sharp, however, the fire department can still offer full protection. In areas where communication isn't as strong, Sharp said the back-up phone system provides assured coverage.

Sharp conceded that a potential problem exists because they are using VHF shared frequencies. If others are using the system during an emergency call, they can't guarantee they won't be interrupted.

"Chances of that are very rare,

but it is a problem that could occur," Sharp said.

Another aspect of Mayne's proposal which Galiano did not favor was that fire calls would be answered at the 24-hour manned station on Mayne. Sharp said they felt uneasy about not taking their

own calls, and cited confusion which could result in instances where road names are duplicated on some of the islands.

But it appears the bottom line for Galiano was economics.

"The system we have is adequate, and the increased cost (of joining Mayne) wouldn't have been worth it," said Sharp.

to California every year," he said.

The Tarves operation is at the fledgling state, having just moved here from the Okanagan last November. In voicing hope that he can achieve a modest goal of raising 1,000 queens this summer (queens fetch an average of \$8 each), Tarves said he needs appropriate weather conditions, just as farmers need the right combination of sun and rain.

"Raising queens is potentially very lucrative, but it's entirely dependent on the weather," he said.

Because it was not a good spring, some of his stock lost its potential for fertility. Warm temperatures and windless days are crucial elements for mating.

A minimum 18 degrees Celsius on a calm day is needed before the queens will mate in mid-air. If the fertile bees do not mate within 18 days of hatching, their prime potential is wasted.

An understanding of the hierarchy and mating practices of bees is essential to success. Tarves explained that raising queens involves manipulating the hives to artificially induce virgin queens into queenless hives.

After the virgin queens are introduced into the nucleus — or queenless — hives, they mate and begin laying eggs.

And why is the queen so important to the beekeeper?

"All the bees in the hive are produced from eggs laid by the queen. She fulfills other roles within the hive, mostly of a chemical nature which makes her presence indispensable," said Tarves.

The first step in the production of queen bees is called grafting.

This is the transference of one-day old larvae from the honeycomb to tiny wax cups.

The grafting of larvae is one of the trickier aspects of the trade, and watching Tarves at work gives one some appreciation of the knowledge and skill involved.

"This is the most critical part of the process because it has to be done quickly," said Tarves as he transplanted tiny larvae with a fine paintbrush from the hive into a series of cell cups attached to a wooden bar. (Speed is important because the larvae need food and moisture from the hive.)

Once completed, Tarves puts the cell bar in a frame. Over the next 10 days, he moves the frame into a series of hives as the development of the queen progresses.

As the young queens emerge as adults, they replace the older queens that have already been mated. The mated queens are then sold to other beekeepers.

All of Tarves' queens are mated now, and he is pleased with the overall progress. Of the 1,000 queens he hopes to raise this summer, he plans to overwinter about 400 of them.

Tarves was introduced to beekeeping as a youngster when he visited his grandfather's hives. About four years ago he pursued this early interest and took a course at Fairview College in Peace River country, which led him to apprentice with beekeepers there and in California.

He was attracted to beekeeping because of the options it offers.

"It is a job that is ecologically sound and valuable, and it's a very passive type of agriculture. Also, I can live in a rural area," he said.

## New Galiano venture launched by partners

Johanna Newmoon and Lony Rockafella, partners in Daystar Company, opened a new market at Porlier Pass Junction on Galiano on July 1. Newmoon said that if business goes well over the summer, the pair hopes to open a store in the fall.

Their first market opened in 1979 outside of Galiano Hall. Newmoon explained that, since then, they have taken their market to various places along the coast — i.e., fishing villages on Vancouver Island and communities on Hornby, Denman, Cortes and Quadra Islands — with a

unit. selling years they have been Charlotte Island, on the Queen said that operation. Newmoon they will maintain in only one this summer's six-day market on Galiano.

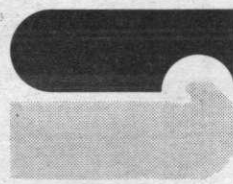

Newmoon plans to invite various craft vendors to set up booths during weekend market days. Last week she had Guatemalan cotton and Mexican jewelry and accessories for women.



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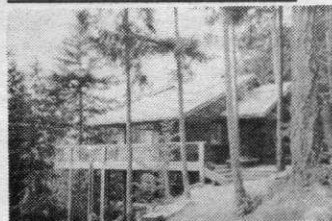
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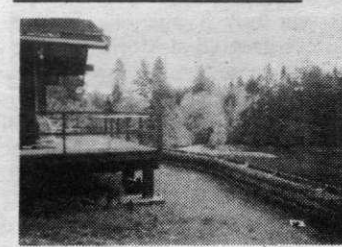


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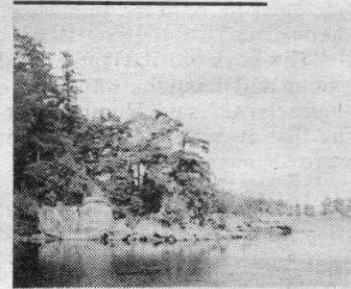
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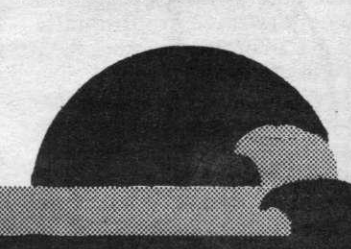
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## Award program

# Youths explore islands, history

Seven Sea Venturers from Victoria sailed through the Gulf Islands last week as part of their training toward The Duke of Edinburgh Silver Award.

The boys, aged 15 and 16 years, navigated two 27-foot Whalers on loan from the navy fleet in Victoria, and were followed by a safety boat. Stops at Sidney Spit, Portland Island, Galiano and South Pender Islands were included in the eight-day tour that returned to Victoria on July 12.

Jack Humble, a retired lieutenant-commander from the Royal Navy, was one of three adults accompanying the group of Eighth Fort Victoria Sea Venturers. While he sparked the boys' interest in the proposal, Humble was quick to credit the youngsters themselves.

"The boys are navigating and sailing and doing the whole thing themselves," said Humble, noting that everything is run as if it were a company.

The Sea Venturers are keeping written logs of the tour, which will be presented to Commander Peter Chance on their return. If Chance approves the material,

the boys will have passed the exploration phase of The Duke of Edinburgh Award.

Humble explained that the program was set up 30 years ago by The Duke of Edinburgh and incorporates four areas of training: physical fitness, community service, development of a skill or art, and exploration.

In addition to keeping track of all the fun events they encounter, Humble said the boys make note in their daily logs of such things as radio communications, water conditions, wind direction, and the speed of tides and currents.

To add fun and challenge to their exploration, the boys added a theme of stepping back 50 years in time. They have met local residents who lived on the Gulf Islands in the 1930s, and planned their meals to fit a diet typical of that era.

On July 8, the Sea Venturers were greeted at Mortimer Spit on South Pender by the local Sea Scout group and Troop Scouter Don Palmer. Palmer and his wife, Sophie, fed the boys a tasty meat stew, homemade buns and Apple Betty for dessert.

Doreen York, president of the Pender Island Museum Society,

was invited to tell the teenagers what it was like to grow up on the islands 50 years ago.

She told of how residents managed without electricity, running water and plumbing, and described the arduous work involved in doing laundry on a scrub board and ironing with gas irons.

Chicken, rabbit, fresh vegetables and fruit, and dairy products

were diet staples, and York said all produce was kept well into the winter in underground root cellars. While she talked, the boys had a turn at making butter in an old butter churner she brought along.

Transportation was difficult in those days, she said, explaining the ferry system residents relied

on when they couldn't row to their destination. York cited the incident when her cousin, Neptune Navy Grimmer, was born in a rowboat en route to Mayne Island, where the doctor lived.

She talked about various other aspects of growing up in the 1930s, such as the social life at

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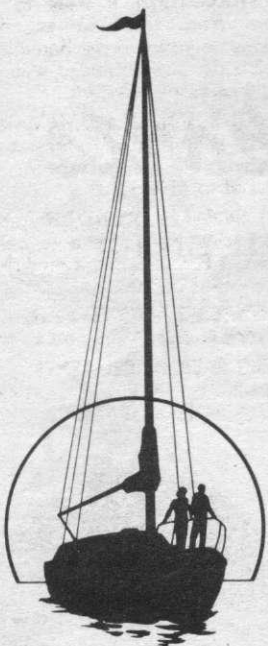
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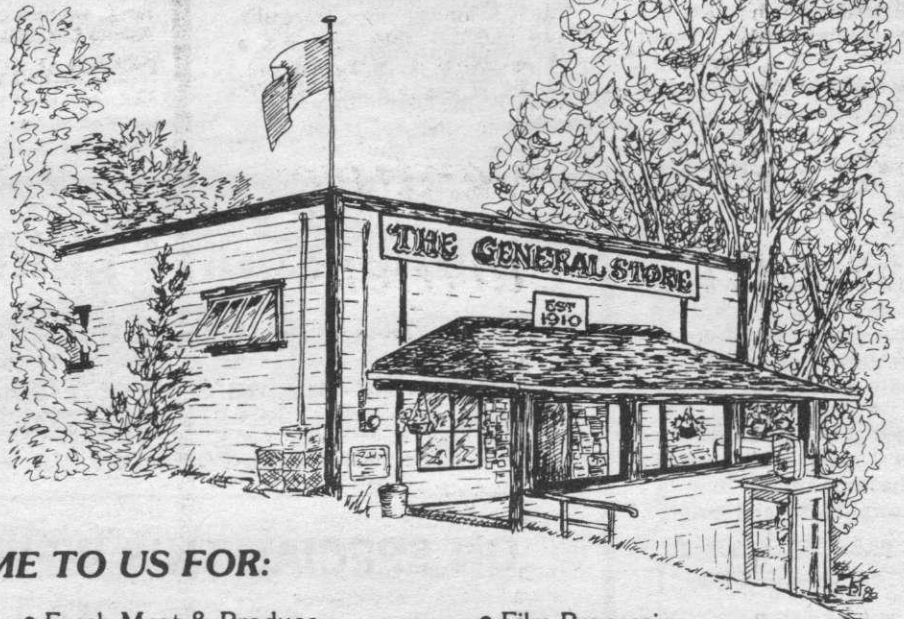

## Wildlife protection status extended

A provincial government order-in-council has bestowed protective status on several species of bats and reptiles — including a rare snake that has been sighted in the Gulf Islands.

The order applies to four species of bats, one salamander, one toad, one frog, a lizard and six snakes:

- the bats named are the pallid bat, spotted bat, Keen's myotis and the big freetailed bat;
- the three amphibians listed are the Pacific giant salamander, Great Basin spadefoot toad and the tailed frog;
- the lizard is the short-horned lizard; and
- the six snakes are the sharp-tail snake, rubber boa, western rattlesnake, gopher snake, racer and night snake.

The first snake listed above — the sharp-tail — was the object of a recent search conducted on Pender Island by a zoologist and his biologist partner. Six sightings of the snake have been reported on Pender in the last 40 years, and others have been seen on Galiano, Salt Spring and southern Vancouver Island.

The team searching for a sharp-tail snake on Pender had hoped to capture a live specimen for display purposes but left the island empty-handed.

The sharp-tail snake is described as having a distinctive spur at the end of the tail, a reddish-brown back, and bright

black and white crossbar lines on the belly. Its skin is smooth and without scales, average length is 11 inches, and the body is about the thickness of a pencil.

(The team searching for a specimen on Pender has requested that anyone spotting the snake contact the provincial environment ministry or the B.C. Provincial Museum.)

In announcing protective status for the bat and reptile species, the provincial environment ministry said some of the animals are rare and B.C. is the only area of Canada in which they are found. Other animals, it was noted, are decreasing in numbers "as a result of direct interference by man."

A prepared statement from the ministry added: "The reptiles, particularly, are sought by people collecting for the pet trade and

the exotic garment trade. In most of the United States where these species occur, state governments have been forced to give them strict protection because of rapidly depleting populations. In consequence, the commercial trade has begun to turn to B.C. as a source of uncontrolled supply."

By giving the animals protective status, the ministry said, "we can give complete protection to the species that need it, making it illegal to take them, and we can regulate the harvest of any of the others that can tolerate some removal."

The ministry statement noted that all of the species listed are beneficial to people. They feed on insects and slugs or small mammals like mice and voles.

The only animal on the list that is a potential source of harm to people or property is the rattlesnake. However, a protective designation will not prohibit rattlesnakes being controlled, "where necessary around human habitations."

## setting it straight

In the July 9 issue of *Driftwood*, a report on efforts by the Gulf Islands Television Society (GITV) to bring Knowledge Network to the Gulf Islands was misleading when it said only the Outer Islands households would receive half of the signals half of the time if they had a 10-metre antenna.

Bob Clark, president of the television society, said determining what residents can expect to receive on their televisions will be influenced by a number of vari-

ables. Until the transmitter is in operation, he said, no one can predict what the coverage will be.

He explained that a study currently being conducted will be submitted to the department of communications for approval. The study offers some guidelines of the reception people can expect, but it is not definitive.

"We are endeavoring to give as complete coverage as possible, and we are looking at supplementary means of accomplishing that," he said.

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# Boat-building program serves dual purpose

The Mayne Island Sailing Club received a \$37,000 federal grant in the early spring to train unemployed people in boat-building and repair. While Ottawa's objective was to retrain workers and leave them with a marketable skill, the sailing club's goal was to acquire sabots for teaching purposes.

Instructor Ron Willock says the program had its beginnings last summer, when Mayne resident George Whitten taught some children how to sail in his sabot. Willock said the response was so good that Whitten didn't have the time or resources to accommodate everyone who was interested.

The Mayne Island Sailing Club decided to do something about getting boats for teaching purposes, and the 16-week course that ended two weeks ago was the result.

The four trainees — Michelle Heal, Glenda Goodman, Jake Howeson and Owen Heavenor — built eight eight-foot fibreglass sabots that the sailing club will use for lessons over the summer.

Instructor Willock, who also taught his students boat repairs, noted that there is more demand for repair work than for boat-building.

He said 30 per cent of his time was spent teaching theoretical aspects of the trade, and that instruction in using tools and machinery was also necessary.

When they finished the course, the students had experience in woodworking, lofting (drawing up boat plans from designer blueprints), making fibreglass molds for the hull and component parts, and various techniques in boat repair.

In addition to making the hulls for the sabots, each of the trainees made cedar oars, mahogany plywood dagger boards, and masts and booms out of fir.

Willock said the community supported the project.

"You never really know how people are going to respond, but anyone who has been by and seen how much work has been done has found it difficult to discredit," he said.

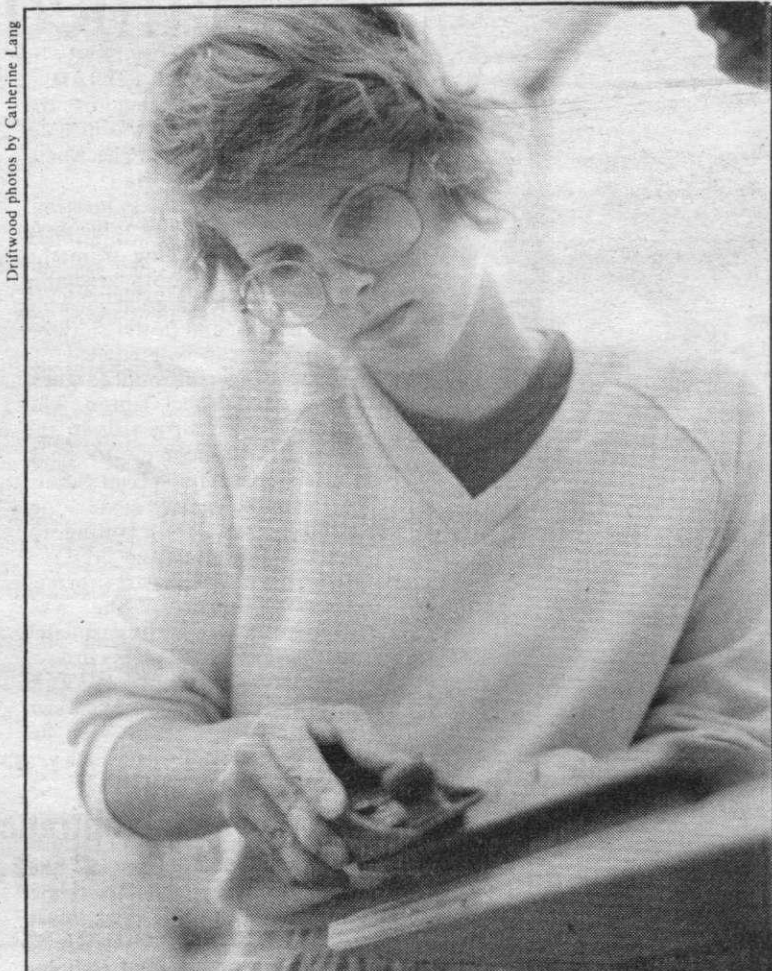
Willock noted that the sabots are made from a Canadian design that took components from American and British sabots known for their handling ease and good upwind capability. Extra effort was made to keep the boats light; according to Willock, they need very little wind to sail.

"We went out of our way to make them light so that if no muscle men were around, it would be easy to pack them down to the beach," he said.

The sabots were built for maximum speeds of 10 to 12 knots, but Willock said the craft have been out in winds strong enough to tip them at such an angle that water was skimming along the gunnels. And he said they won't sink because they have so much flotation built into the hull.

"Everybody who sees them gets quite enthused about going out in them," said Willock, adding that he feels like a proud father to see them out on the water.

Repairs undertaken varied from extensive re-building of a 14-foot fibreglass canoe to repairing a hole in the keel of an 11-foot power boat. Two other jobs involved repairing a smashed transom in an older sabot and fibreglassing seams in an older plywood sabot that had deteriorated.

The trainees are uncertain about their future as boat builders. Both of the women said they preferred woodworking to fibreglassing, and felt the skills they have acquired will help them in other endeavours.

Jake Howeson and Owen Heavenor would like to set up a boat repair shop on Mayne Island, but they need funds for tools and materials. They also need money to rent a shop.

"We're thinking of doing boat repairs and selling things out of fibreglass but we need a climate-controlled shop in the winter, so it would be hard to get started," said Howeson.

Howeson and Heavenor are both working on the west coast of Vancouver Island this summer. Depending on the savings they bring home in the fall, the two men may yet start a boat repair business in the Gulf Islands.

The beneficiaries of the project will be the 20 people who have signed up for sailing lessons

# Galiano preparing to welcome historical, cultural conference

Next week, from July 22 to July 27, the Galiano Historical and Cultural Society will host a joint conference of the Canadian Nautical Research Society and the Underwater Archaeology Society of British Columbia.

*Passport* is the title given to this annual Galiano event, whose theme varies and is currently focusing on *Seamanship, Trade and the Flag*. Lecturers from the above two societies will be represented.

Organizer Edrie Holloway says "passport" denotes "an opportunity to share; a passport to knowledge." Academics, professionals, and all interested citizens — especially those from the Gulf Islands — are invited to participate in this enlightening conference.

The program, mailed to every household on Galiano, can be seen as having a dual theme. Most activities during the week, and some into the weekend, are primarily concerned with Galiano history and culture.

On Tuesday, cultural history dating from 10,000 years ago to the 19th century is investigated by archaeologist John Dewhirst. (Quiz: Where on Galiano will participants find archaeological sites?) Simultaneously, Margaret Robson will take a lucky few on a tour of Galiano homes and gardens.

Wednesday, a poetry and musical presentation will be performed by Dorothy Livesay and Brad Prevodoros. Wednesday and Thursday, excursions led by Wendy Roberts to two sheltered bays will focus on flora and fauna adapting to the intertidal environment.

The North End Community Hall hosts all activities Thursday, starting with a chili luncheon, a perfect accompaniment to Wendy's outdoor excursion. David Griffiths, president of the Underwater Archaeology Society of B.C., will give a talk on underwater artifacts.

Janet Fireman will present a play enacting the Anglo-Spanish rivalry in northwestern North America during the 1700s, among other periodical literature and political cartoons. Barry M. Gough will speak on the legendary Lemalchi pirates, and arch-enemy Chief Acheewun, who terrorized the Gulf Islands in the 1860s.

Pivotal to the decor of the event is a stained glass triptych by Kirt Ziwicki created especially for *Passport '86*.

# Virtues of salal explained to club

The regular meeting of the Galiano Garden Club was held on Wednesday, July 9, at the North Galiano Community Hall.

After a short business meeting, exhibits from the show table were discussed and, judging from the high standard of both vegetable and floral entries, a good showing for the harvest and flower show on September 6 can be predicted.

Kathy Bengert introduced guest speaker Mrs. Isobel Tipton, who was making a return visit to the club and this time chose to speak on special plants for special places. Mrs. Tipton gave advice on mulching and close planting to prevent evaporation and preserve water in dry places and areas prone to water shortage. She was persuasive in her enthusiasm for creative use of native plants in dry, damp or shady places and encouraged her audience to appreciate hardy plants such as salal and skunk cabbage, which we take for granted.

Mrs. Tipton gave lists of plants which could be adapted to various conditions and spoke of the arrangement of plants to create mini-climates, noting that most soils on the coast of B.C. need lime in varying amounts and that by judicious arrangements of plants and the use of mulch, most areas could be made productive. She spoke of a highly successful garden grown on bare rock in a deep mulch of spoiled hay, seaweed and bracken, and added that tomatoes grown with a mulch of bracken had a high rate of production.

Mrs. Tipton recommended books already in the club library as offering more detailed information

on plant adaptation. She was thanked for her interesting talk by Audrey Cook, who then adjourned the meeting at 3:45 pm. The next meeting will be held on August 13, when Arni Haksi will talk about, and demonstrate, flower arranging.

fact, he was twice blown off the road by passing trucks. Edmund credits the quality of his German-engineered and manufactured bike for the safe transportation.

Edmund is exuberant about the trip and seems eager to share the highlights with listeners. His biggest message to people of all ages is to stay active, which is his idea of the best preventative medicine.

Cathy and Basil Benger were hosts recently to three visiting scientists from mainland China. Meng Gaotou, Hu Lindong and Ke Mingzhe are part of a global knowledge-acquiring campaign by their country to swing itself into the 20th century since the post-Mao liberation.

The Bengers spent six months in China teaching English and, after their return home about a year ago, were invited by many interested Galiano citizens to speak of their experience. As a follow-up, I asked the Chinese visitors for their observations.

Meng said his first impressions was of the young age of our country itself, and the lack of pollution. China's civilization dates back 5,000 years and has naturally accumulated many more historical sites. While this year, Vancouver celebrates its 100th birthday as a city (a historical site, to us, is where we received our first traffic ticket), China is busy with its industrial revolution, and hasn't dealt with its pollution problems yet. This pattern has evolved in the western world already.

## Bateman Lecture

The mystical lore of Robert Bateman was partially unravelled before an adoring audience on Saturday night at Galiano's Community Hall. No one seemed to mind at first glance that his originals were not displayed gallery style. No prints either? Just chairs, projector, screen and the master himself — and soon enough, no chairs, no aisle room and no foyer room.

From start to finish, Bateman kept us riveted with a lecture which turned out somewhat like his popular painting style: smooth, precise, analytical, polished and awesome. It followed a logical sequence through the years, starting with an elk drawn at age 12. Bateman told us that he was a closet bird watcher (roar of laughter) and has always been a naturalist.

His outward interests grew with the style of the 1950s, studying geography and geology to ensure free trips to the wilderness and a 'real' teaching position. In art, he explored the popular 'isms, including fauvism and cubism.

"The turning point was 1962 when Andrew Wyath exhibited in Buffalo, New York," Bateman said, and the world lauded his natural subjects for the first time in the 20th century. The naturalist reborn, Bateman's art career blossomed.

Bateman analyzed his present style in light of his formative training and appreciation of abstract art. We heard of the three primary colours he uses almost religiously to create all colours. Bateman's dislikes in his work include the cutesy look, stability, the coleslaw, cookie cutter and fried egg look (you had to be there). He likes light into dark, demonstrated by his two white mountain goats and sliver of waterfall on a sheer dark cliff. Also, dramatic support (example: a confronted, alarmed moose with cutesy antlers cut off; two broken branches to subliminally suggest intent to destroy; and mid-canvas malocchio.)

Bateman's tone was slightly defensive throughout the lecture, perhaps because of his adamant stance as an impressionist artist despite occasional public criticism of him being a 'mere' illustrator. He did, I must say, present a convincing argument.

Asked about his motives for lecturing, he answered that he "loves analysis, teaching and finds it fun." The audience certainly seemed to find the whole evening fun and, I'm sure, benefited from the lecture.

Galiano was honoured to have Robert Bateman's visit. Special thanks to Tony Kingscote and Christa Weiss who made the evening possible.

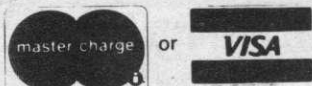

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# Windsurfing instruction makes water sport easier to pick up



Reporter Dicker takes turn on board

Splashes of coloured sails, full in the wind, glide and tack across St. Mary Lake. To spectators on shore, the windsurfer probably looks like an extension of the sail and board: the same as the relationship between jockey and horse.

But it's not as easy as looks.

First, you have to get your balance (imagine walking a tight-rope in the wind); then untangle your feet and legs. Next, straighten your back and, if you're taking lessons from Larry Roy at *Flipper's*, listen to the voice behind you as it gives instructions on how and where to move the boom being clutched with all your strength.

Unless they first practice the manoeuvres—pulling up the sail and standing on the board, steering and turning around — on land, novices can probably expect to swallow at least half the lake on their first nose-dive into the waves.

"You're paranoid until you fall in," Roy says. Once the humiliation of the first tumble from a board is over and done, he explains, surfers are in a position to really learn how to sail.

Windsurfing instruction at *Flipper's* costs between \$40 and \$70. Roy puts his trainee through at least an hour of dryland instruction before taking his charges onto the water, where he teaches from a kayak. Roy says that instructors at a windsurfing school he ran at Jericho Beach in Vancouver were expected to be on a board beside the beginner.

"But you spend more time showing off," he says, explaining that the antics can result in a loss of confidence by trainees. "I find it better to be in a position where I can be mobile and move around."

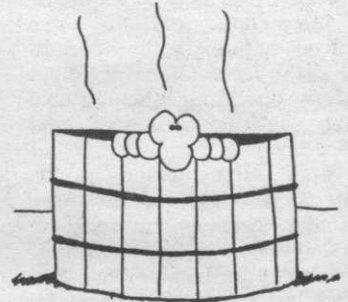

# Windsurfing not quite as easy as it might look

Roy's close attention to training tactics stems from a desire to have his trainees interested in the sport.

He recalls once teaching a woman who weighed about 250 pounds. Because it was such an ordeal for her to get onto the board, he says, she was determined to sail as soon as she was on. Friends watching from shore had bets she couldn't do it — but, according to Roy, his pupil was sailing within 15 minutes.

"She won them all," he says of the bets.

The maximum ratio for training is four pupils to one teacher. "You shouldn't go over that," Roy says, explaining that pupils must absorb a number of details. "For the first hour, you need to be spoon fed, and for the first 20, you need to be told what winds you can handle and what size board to use."

Roy, a 10-year Salt Spring resident who teaches physical education at Gulf Islands Secondary School, has windsurfed since boards and sails first arrived in North America 14 years ago, and has taught for the same number of years.

"It's how I put myself through university," he says of windsurfing instruction. Roy was also involved enough in the sport to race at the international level.

After operating the Jericho Beach windsurfing school, and before opening *Flipper's* next to the Blue Gables Resort on St. Mary Lake, Roy spent three summers teaching the sport at Maracaibo Estates on Salt Spring.

It was at Maracaibo that Roy closed one summer season by staging a race for his windsurfing students, who had endured hardcore training sessions involving 12 hours of solid instruction.

The day began with a sailboat race. The winds were perfect; the race went well. Then, as the time approached for the windsurfers to display their skills, the winds began to pick up.

"When the race started," Roy says, "everyone I'd taught went backwards. These were people with big egos. I couldn't live that down for weeks."

Roy started *Flipper's* for two

reasons: after teaching privately, he felt he would like to deal with the public again; secondly, the experience of financing his university education by teaching the sport led Roy to believe he could create jobs for some of the high school students, in hopes that they could enjoy the same rewards.

"I'm training the kids for the specific task of teaching," he says. "I believe that, for anyone who wants to get into it, there'll be the jobs available."

(*Flipper's* rents windsurfing equipment, ocean kayaks, canoes and an aqua bike. Kayaks rent for \$20 a half day, \$40 for a full day; windsurfing equipment is \$20 and \$35, respectively; canoes are \$15 and \$30. Boards rent for \$12 the first hour, \$7 for every hour afterwards. GISS students can pick up a windsurfing season's pass for \$89, and islanders for \$119.)

Roy's lessons start on land, where the trainee moves through each windsurfing motion at least

three times, and then a further three times, facing the other direction.

It gets a little trickier on the water.

The idea is to keep the wind at your back, and steering is achieved through forward, backward and sideways movement of the boom.

Part way across the lake, it becomes apparent Roy is not going to let you cross to the other side and walk back. You have to turn around. This is done by

letting go of the boom and clutching the mast while you inch your feet around its base, trying to ignore the 180-degree turn the board seems to be doing of its own free will.

If you haven't fallen in by this time, you might be feeling pretty good. In fact, you might be thinking you're pretty good.

Then, from a more seasoned surfer, you might hear a comment such as: "Well anyone could stay afloat on that raft you're sailing on."

And it just may be true. Roy calls his beginners' windsurfer *Piggy*.

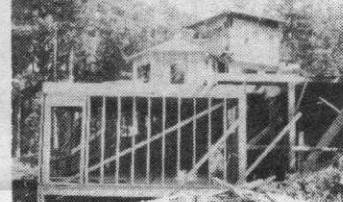

## Safety considerations

# Hydro advises 'Sunday loggers' to keep well clear of powerlines

B.C. Hydro is reminding "amateur or Sunday loggers" that they may be risking their lives when cutting down trees near power lines.

In a prepared statement, the Crown corporation said that for safety reasons, it is asking people not to cut down trees around power lines by themselves. It explains that "electrocution can occur even if a branch hanging on the line is touched."

Hydro safety co-ordinator Earle Pritchett explained that the wood in trees has a high moisture content and is a good conductor of electricity, even when the wood appears to be dry.

"Anyone felling trees should be aware that contact between a tree and a power line can result in electricity travelling down the tree and into the ground," Pritchett continued. "While the

charge on the ground is reduced as the distance from the tree increases, an individual venturing near the tree can still receive a shock through each foot, possibly resulting in injury."

Along with causing injuries to fallers, Hydro says past incidents involving trees dropped on power lines have forced power outages. On Salt Spring in mid-June, for instance, a tree felled onto lines cut power to Ganges for almost an hour.

The corporation has specific policies regarding trees either near power lines or the service wires between Hydro's poles and a customer's home:

- If a tree appears in danger of falling or being blown onto a power line, Hydro will take it down at no charge;
- If an owner wishes to take down

a healthy tree near a line, Hydro will provide a lineman to stand by — if reasonable notice is given. There is no charge during normal working hours but a charge will be made if the service is requested outside regular hours;

- If a tree is felled through a power line with no linemen standing by, full cost of repairs will be charged; and
- Disposal of felled trees is the responsibility of the owners.
