## Workshop helps with cop

If you tend to be a perfectionist, are driven, have an overcrowded calendar, need to be needed and have dysfunctional and unsatisfying relationships, a workshop called Emerging from Codependence could be made for you.

Psychotherapist Linda Popov will facilitate the workshop on Saturday, November 17 from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. at the Community Centre.

Popov says she is "an expert on codependence because I'm an expert codependent."

She has also worked extensively in the psychotherapy, social work and hospice care fields. Her focus now lies in offering women's empowerment retreats and marriage enrichment workshops. She is also a director of WellSpring International Educational Foundation, which publishes spiritual educational materials.

She says confusion surrounds the term "codependence," with volumes of material and self-help books written on the subject.

Popov has developed a definition which she uses in her work.

"Codependence is a way of living in which people are so focused on caretaking or controlling others that they are out of touch with their own needs and feelings," she says. "They have difficulty setting boundaries and trusting others to care for their own needs and to live with the consequences of their own mistakes. They are compulsive fixers and hel-

## Codependents habitually seek out relationships with needy people

She says "it's important to understand the origin of the term comes from people who live with people who have chemical dependence." Codependents "habitually seek out relationships with needy people such as alcoholics or severely dysfunctional people" and are themselves 'addicted to being needed," she says.

She emphasizes that if trying to control people does not form a major part of your life, then you are likely not a codependent.

There is room for humour in discussing this subject. A hard core codependent would probably attend the workshop because he or she believes they could use the information to help a loved one. Popov says to these people, "If you think you are doing this workshop for someone else, guess what?" It is essential to look at yourself, if you are to recover from codependency, she says.

Defining codependence, assessing the extent of codependent patterns in relationships and how to get on the road to recovery will be covered in the six-hour workshop.

The key to recovering from codependency is to shift the focus from "other" to "self," she explains.

Admission to Emerging from Codependence is by donation, and the suggested amount being \$25. Persons interested in participating should call the Community Centre at 537-9971 and leave their name and phone number with staff.

## High school students to remember Clemo

Fred Clemo was one of Henry Bullock's boys. He came to Salt Spring from an orphanage in Victoria about 1935.

On November 11, he will be remembered.

Byron Frederick John Clemo was born on September 7, 1922. He gained a Grade 8 education before becoming one of Bullock's boys. He joined the Royal Canadian Navy in 1939. Clemo was serving on H.M.C.S. Ottawa on North Atlantic convoy duty when he celebrated his 20th birthday.

The ship was sunk days later. Students' Council at Gulf Islands Secondary School, will participate in the Remembrance Day ceremony by laying a wreath in Clemo's memory.

The wreath-laying will mark the third occasion a Salt Spring resident has been honoured through a student remembrance.

The parade will arrive at the Cenotaph in Centennial Park at 10:45 a.m.. Close to the hour, a bugler will play Last Post with one note to mark the beginning and end of a two minute silence at 11 a.m.

As the parade moves off from the Cenotaph, two veterans of Dunkirk Ron Holcroft and John Carr will take

Holcroft was a corporal in the Royal Intelligence Corps at that Belgium fishing village which marked an early defeat of Allied forces in Europe in May of 1940. Carr was serving as corporal with the Royal Army Service Corps.

In addition to the ceremonies in Ganges, other forms of remembrance will be unveiled in B.C. The province released a list of names of 23 servicemen who died in the Second World War who have been honoured by having their names given to geographic features around the

Since 1950, B.C. has named more than 700 such features in memory of servicemen who died in war.

Canadians have served their country in battles since 1665. There were Canadian troops involved in the Boer War, the First and Second World Wars as well as the Korean Conflict. Canada has lost 114,000 individuals in various wars.

# War presents mixture

It was a war of pain and suffering and death. It was a war of routine duties and boredom. It was a war of heroism. But it was also a war of excitement, challenge, comradeship and humour. With some, it was a mixture so closely woven that there was no way of separating the threads.

It was that kind of war for a serving member of the Royal Air Force. A rebel and a man of his own strong views, he was ever in trouble until his crime sheet looked like an ancient sheet of blotting paper bearing line after line after line of offences and punishments.

I remember him in the dining room one day shortly after his enlistment. One of his fellow recruits had engaged in bullying a diminutive newcomer who rarely stood up for himself. The bully and the rebel sat at the table and a low conversation took all their attention. The rebel told his victim just what he thought of him and there was no response. He then switched to parentage.

"I suppose you never knew who your father was," he observed sadly. The bully jumped up and was knocked down for his pains. That cost him 14 days for fighting in the dining

His service was a long list of infractions, petty and insignificant, but

The station warrant officer was missing one morning so the rebel found the warrant officer's coat and took the parade. His rank was AC2, the lowest rank in the Royal Air Force. He got 14 days for that. It sometimes seemed that he was confined to camp more often than he was allowed out.

Guard duty cost him dear. "Halt! Who goes there?" he called

out in the time-honoured terms. It was his commanding officer who went there.

That's no way to challenge someone approaching his post! Say it loudly "as if he meant it!"

Leaning forward, he bawled out the challenge in his pub-trained bulllike voice against the other man's ear. But stay! That wasn't the way to hold a rifle! The officer grabbed hold of the sentry's weapon and demonstrated the proper manner to hold it as "if he meant it".

The officer was left to the post.

"You do it so much better than me, you might as well carry on," commented the affronted sentry.

He went to a detention barracks for 28 days as a reward for that effort.

Then came the day when the rebel had enough. He decided that the only way to excitement was to fly and

applied for a remustering to aircrew.

"Too many people with that idea!" growled the air officer commanding. "We need rebels. We want men who can think for themselves and act for themselves."

Within days he was posted to an observer's school.

"With your record you'll never get anywhere," said the commanding officer heavily.

But alas! He never made it. physema. Within weeks he had a medical check

which showed that he was suffering from tuberculosis and he was out of the air force like a shot.

He never really recovered and nearly four years ago he died of em-





I've nettled the king full sore". - Guy Fawkes, just before he was sauteed.

A reader has asked me to write again about nettles and I thought at once of Guy Fawkes.

In my childhood nettles were damned for their stings, just as Guy Fawkes was damned by James 1 for trying to sting him. For generations the Guy has been ritualistically burned every November 5 on bonfires of rubbish, while children riot amid explosions and colours of fireworks. The Houses of Parliament, meanwhile, in the kingdom of Margaret and Brian, continue to rule venally and to throw the opinions of dissenters into the

Most people have given as much thought to nettles as to Guy Fawkes, and yet experience should alter this childlike perception. Picked with respect and carefully cooked, nettles discover a surprising benevolence. They combine three great virtues:

nettles are salubrious, savory and free.

To the uninitiated, who do not believe these plants should be eaten by Canadians in the first place, nettles are a culinary non sequitur. Let them celebrate the ghosts of Hallowe'en, not the plots of Guy Fawkes, as they stand at the edges of dark fields in Fulford and Ottawa, kicking the nettles to pieces while rockets zoom and splatter into the night.

But apply the same illogic (a nonce-word) to some prickly sea urchins, or to a spiny codfish, or even to a heap of cold, clammy, uncooked potatoes...and nettles are suddenly legitimate, or, at least, have found companions with whom they may be damned.

## Prisoners of metaphors

Nettles and the Guy are prisoners of their own metaphors. Like eels, or the unmentionable but perfectly edible parts of domestic male quadrupeds, or the expensive soup made, minutely, from the nests of certain xenophobic (and who can blame them?) Chinese sparrows.

Consider, further, the romantic literature which surrounds oysters, whose armament is much greater than the feeble stings of nettles. Lies! It's all lies! A shucked oyster has as much to do with love as a steamed nettle does with pain. In fact, I think oysters are the more wicked of the two.

I shall elucidate, to quote a high school English teacher who

Last August I was upcoast shucking a few molluscs on the stern of a schooner, after a successful, lickerish raid on an oyster lease off Redonda. I was enjoying a marvellous daydream. This one featured a tough aerobic workout with Jane Fonda to the music of Chariots of Fire followed by a tete-a-tete over Oysters Rockefeller. Sigh!

Suddenly the knife skipped across the shell and described a deep arc through a middle finger before it stopped halfway down the nail. Much language in the air and crimson on the

After repairs I glared reproachfully at the knife with its cocky coat of arms in blue and white. I was angry enough to throw it into the water, there to rust pollutingly until retrieved and analyzed by a puzzled archaeology graduate student in the middle of the 21st century.

It would be the foundation for her doctoral thesis: 'The Influence Of The Swiss Army Knife On West Coast Mariculture In The Period 1990-1995'. Imagine the Canada Council funding!

But a painful sentence impaled itself on my brain: Swiss alpine guides don't spend much time prying oysters off the north face of the Eiger.

This autumn the rains are punctual but the frosts are late. Some precocious nettles have started growing again on Isabella Point, just in time for Guy Fawkes" Night. Its a treat to eat them, however, unseasonable they may be on this excellent

## Sauteed stinging nettles

A pair of gloves bought at Mouat's for 99 cents (a bargain, hey?)

A brown bag half full of nettles

1 C sliced mushrooms, but not the kind James Barber sits marvellously on

2 or 3 cloves of garlic, chopped finely

9 or 10 coriander seeds, crushed

2T roasted pine nuts, almonds will do if you must

Good olive oil

Salt and pepper.

Put on the gloves and hunt in the salal for some very early, or extremely late, nettles. They will be huddled low to the ground, brooding and nasty and unwilling to be picked.

Steam them, until they give up their stings. Now press most of the water out and cut them into squares. Throw these into a frying pan. Add pine nuts and mushrooms and season with garlic, coriander seeds, salt and pepper. At this time of year the coriander will be dry and won't have that splendid, pungent, provocative smell of lemon, but do not lament. Saute. Top each serving with a pile of white cheddar shavings (I almost said cedar). Serve sauteed stinging nettles instead of pedestrian spinach or some other commonplace greens which you will

## Appeal courts set in motion

Machinery was set in motion last week for the two courts of appeal within the Gulf Islands School District 64. On Thursday afternoon, November 1, three members of each court were sworn in by Government Agent Virginia Bobroske. The ceremony took place in the banquet room of the Ganges hotel.

Salt Spring Island court, sitting at the Harbour House location, will hear appeals against assessments of Salt Spring properties.

Outer Islands courts of revision will be held in two locations, on North Pender Island and in Sidney.

Chairman of the Outer Islands court of revision No. 1 is Elma Moebes, who will sit with Paul Scoones, of Galiano, and Gordon Wallace, of North Pender Island.

Frank Richards is chairman of the Salt Spring Island No.2 court along with Bill Garrick and Jack Albhouse.

Brian Wilkinson, area assessor, explained the number of appeals this year is higher than has been the case in recent years. The increase is attributed to a general increase in valuation this year.

Property owners who have appealed the assessed value of their properties are advised when to appear. Each appellant has the opportunity to detail his reasons for believing that his assessment is excessive. The assessor then submits his reasons for having reached that figure. The members of the court will then decide whether to uphold the appeal or to reject it.

Every appellant has recourse to a further hearing. The appeal against the court of revision is then heard during 1991 by the Board of Appeal.

The revision courts will complete their hearings by December 15.

## Coho closing boundary extended

Enthusiasm of fly fishermen prompted an extension of the boundary closing coho fishing at Fulford Harbour.

Originally, federal fisheries closed the harbour to coho salmon fishing inside a line running from the wharf across to the old log dump. Fishermen were permitted to take cutthroat trout and were limited to use of a single-point hook.

But with an increase in the number of fly fishermen cruising harbour waters, fisheries folk extended the line further out.

From now until December 31, the line runs from the north shore at the fishing boundary sign near the navigation light near Jackson Rock south to the fishing boundary sign on the south shore.

Boundary markers are large square, white signs.

Fishing for cutthroat trout with a single-point hook is permitted inside the line but coho cannot be taken there.

# Island seniors learn to be safer drivers

Salt Spring Island boasts 48 safer senior drivers after presentation of two driving courses on the island in October.

Sponsored by the Vancouver Island Safety Council and the local Seniors for Seniors group, the 55 Alive program is a refresher driving course for people over 55 years of age. It was created to address the high accident rate for older drivers in British Columbia. Only teen-age drivers are involved in more vehicle mishaps in the province.

Victoria instructor Bill Bradstock kept his students both interested and laughing in last week's six hour course held Monday and Tuesday at Mahon Hall. "It's better to be 10 minutes later now than 30 years earlier in the next world," he joked when explaining the importance of driving slowly through a busy residential

55 Alive covers several aspects of driving especially pertinent to

A discussion of the frustrations course participants have experienced while driving is held on the first day. From that, Bradstock explains how physical changes affect one's driving with age. Decreased vision, depth perception, hearing and reaction speed all hamper the older driver, he says. The effects of medication must also be considered, he adds.

Awareness of hazards in different driving environments forms another part of the course. Tips for driving at night, in inclement weather or on freeways are given by Bradstock.

He also notes the change in the kind of traffic on the roads these days. "There's a tremendous mix of vehicles," he say, and bicycles or motorcycles are less likely to be seen by someone with vision impairment. 55 Alive emphasizes the need to look for pedestrians and all types of

Seniors for Seniors initiated the holding of the course on Salt Spring.

Bradstock says he loves teaching the 55 Alive course to seniors. "They have so much knowledge and so much enthusiasm," he says. "I leave those classes on a real high."

Due to high demand, the second course was offered last week after 28 people were accommodated on October 16 and 17.

A final test is not part of the 55 Alive class. As Bradstock says, "the test is how well your driving improves - and it does."



## Three seeking outer islands seat for CRD

How the Capital Regional District can best serve the Outer Gulf Islands marks the campaign for director for those islands.

With three candidates, one from each of Saturna, Pender and Galiano Island, the election draws on a variety of experience, interest and backgrounds.

#### **Gordon Barnes**

A resident of Pender Island, Gordon Barnes has a concern about representation from the islands. "It has to be capable and knowledgeable about the uniqueness of these islands." he said.

Barnes served a term on the Advisory Planning Commission, is a warden for St. Peter's Anglican Church and sits on the executive of the Lions Club. He is involved with Crime Stoppers and volunteers for duty at the fall fair and the garbage cleanup detail.

"My effort would be to pull all the islands together in family fashion," he said, "for their own good."

He would take a non-biased approach to problems to create a positive attitude for residents. Barnes has lived on the islands for 12 years, first on Galiano and later on Pender.

As an "independent", he would bring a fresh start to CRD efforts on the islands and work to eliminate

"undue influence of any particular group."

## **Jacques Campbell**

Pronouncing her name "Jackie", Jacques Campbell ignores references to her well-known father Jim Campbell.

"I can't live my life in a shadow," she said of the matter. "Some people will support me, some won't. In the end it's no big thing.'

For 10 years she has been active in the Saturna Community Club and has held various positions on various committees. Her interests centre on recycling because, she noted, "I've seen the difference recycling has made."

That interest has lead to a frustration for her. Residents have beer ignored by the CRD in their efforts to create waste management on the is-

"The CRD board thinks all the islands are the same," she protested. "I don't think we're the same. Each community is different."

Campbell would also seek more opportunity for residents and try to limit the number of restrictions they

Although she is from Saturna, the smallest of the islands, she said "I'd represent everyone from the Gulf Islands fairly and would listen to all."

Her work with the community club also has an affect. "I'm very receptive to community groups, "she explained," "groups which speak about what the community wants to

#### Don MacDonald

Saying he understands the limitations of the Outer Islands director who has one vote out of 60 votes on the CRD board is Don MacDonald.

"It's not a power trip," he said of the position.

Macdonald is a director of the Galiano Chamber of Commerce and the Galiano Club and has served the island for two terms on the Islands

While he sees no real issues facing the islands, he can discern a problem

in the relationship between the CRD and Island Trust. The reasons, he explained, go back to when the Trust was formed. Land use authority was taken away from the CRd and invested in the Trust.

"Why would the CRD still be concerned about something that happened so many years ago?" he asked.

He gave as example some bylaws passed by the CRD which make life difficult for the Trust, bylaws such as those which covers gravel pits or the meat inspection bylaw.

Macdonald does see a potential issue arising around solid waste. "The Outer Islands seem to be left out

of any plans," he said. "Galiano has a good dump now



"Children will have a chance on November 14 to show their parents how strongly they feel about energy conservation," says Gulf Island Hydro manager John Langston.

Hydro estimates a saving of up to 1,000,000 kilowatt hours of electrical energy during the one hour that evening. The savings would be the equivalent of meeting the needs of 100 homes for a year.

For the television commercial, Hydro draws on the fact children watch T.V. and see many commercials which means they are familiar with the structure of the advertise-


