Barges break free in wind, wreak havoc in Duck Bay

No one knows how the anchor lines snapped on a pair of barges sitting at Challenge's Fletcher Crofton pulp mill.

But by the time Sunday morning's strong winds finished with them, the barges had cut a destructive swath through Salt Spring's Duck Bay and crushed at least two docks.

The 90-foot (41-metre) barges slipped their moorings sometime around 8

Jane Winter was one of the first to see them bearing down on Duck Point in "very, very rough seas" at about 8:30 a.m.

"We could see them drifting hard when we got up. The (Howe Sound Queen) went right over to them to check it out and a tug was trying to attach a line," Winter said from her Mountain Park Drive home. "I thought it would

be easy to round them up but then the tug lost control."

The vessels were empty and easily pushed by west-erly winds reportedly as strong as 70 to 80 kilometres per hour blowing across Stuart Channel.

"They just kept coming closer and closer. The first one drifted past into the bay and the second one gently crunched up on the rocks below us," Winter

Protest helps shift Texada conflict into clearer focus

Texada Land Corporation and Salt Spring groups opposed to clear-cutting are beginning to find common ground following a loggingtruck blockade early January 5 that could have turned ugly.

Close to 100 protesters gathered at the corner of Burgoyne Bay and Fulford-Ganges roads to block a laden Texada truck on its way to Burgoyne Bay's marine unloading site.

Under the eye of the RCMP the event stayed peaceful after Texada oper-

ations manager Brent Kapler refused to ask Salt Spring RCMP Sgt. Paul Darbyshire to break up the protest.

"I'm not into confrontation. They can stand in front of the truck all day if they want," Kapler said in the morning chill.

The event would have finished there had not one protester vandalized the

Kapler and company forester Julian Dunster spent the hour before the truck's arrival answering questions about the extent of Texada's cutting. While

confrontational, the episode created a focus lacking in previous meetings.


"This isn't about logging, this is about our opposition to clear-cutting. We have to tell them we'll continue doing this if that's what it takes to stop it," said Robert Osborne, a Direct Action Committee organizer.

The committee feels that Texada's rate of cutting (estimated at three-to-five acres a day) has pushed it into the clear-cutting arena. Dunster said it was well within managed forestry guidelines.

Weekend storm blows out power and keeps service crews hopping

The first wind storm of the year to hit the Gulf Islands had wide-ranging effects over the weekend and kept service crews busy bouncing from runaway barges to downed electrical lines.

Gusting to 80 kilometres per hour, the wind knocked out power on most of the islands.

"It's nothing like we had last year but it kept us hopping," said B.C. Hydro's field manager Murray Smith.

There were two major power outages Sunday when wind knocked trees through feeder lines near Beddis Road and on Sunset Drive.

The breaks happened in the early afternoon and lasted about 90 minutes. There were also minor outages around Salt Spring as well as on Saturna, Mayne and Pender islands.

Ganges Coast Guard had a strange incident helping tugboats from the Fletcher Challenge mill round up two drifting barges and were also busy with pleasure craft that broke from their moorages.

At least one car accident was indirectly caused by weather conditions, and snowfall on Sunday and Monday mornings gave several drivers some bad moments.

it was just someone piling wood," said resort owner Pearl Gray.

By the time firefighters arrived the roof was totally engulfed. Six trucks were needed to battle the blaze.

"The one side was completely out of control and by the time we finished the other side had burns along the ceiling and heavy water damage," said deputy fire chief Dan Akerman.

The cause of the fire is under investigation although Akerman said it is

not considered suspicious.

Gray said she was comforted by the department's quick response because the day's strong winds could easily have spread the fire to neighbouring buildings.

The unit will probably take two months to repair but should be ready for the start of the resort's high season in April.

said. "I could see that the first just missed a moored sailboat and then took out Jack Morrel's dock.'

Morrel, also on Mountain Park Drive, first caught sight of the barges just after 9 a.m. as they rounded the point "like two-storey houses."

"I was watching one go up on the rocks and then I saw the other coming very quickly," he said. "It just brushed past our neighbour's dock and sort of swung out before the wind pushed it back in and took out our dock. It tore off our ramp, bashed the floats onto the shore and continued on down the bay."

According to Ian Kyle, of the Ganges Coast Guard, the second barge destroyed all the docks on the east side of the bay.

"By the time we got there the damage was done and a commercial vessel was helping two recovery tugs secure the barges," he said. "It took some good handling to get them out of a very tight spot."

The commercial craft was Ross Walker's Rush, which was on the scene before Fletcher Challenge could get its tugboats - the CT Titan and the Harkin 9 — into the bay.

The barge on the rocks below Winter's home was relatively easy to secure by Walker and the tugs, but the other was deeply wedged into Duck Bay's

"There was only the width of a barge to tow it out without hitting anything else, and the Harkin 9 did a good job getting it back out the way it came in," Kyle said.

By 10:30 a.m. both barges were on their way back to the mill and Duck Bay's waterfront residents were left wondering who was responsible for

Fletcher Challenge did not comment on the event.



But for the first time both sides had found a single issue to disagree on.

Two previous months of community-based opposition had bounced around everything from fears of condominiums lining Burgoyne Bay to the encroachment of evil corporations.

"I think (community groups) have been able to agree that the most vital issue to deal with is the extent of Texada's logging and how it can be controlled through various methods," Osborne said Sunday.

"This message is not just for the Gulf Islands but for the whole country."

He also noted that individual groups started daily monitoring and/or blockading actions Monday at the south-end site.

Salt Spring Islander David Shebib was taken into custody at the end of the January 5 rally after he unhooked the air lines to the logging truck's brakes.

As of Monday RCMP had not

charged him and refused to release his name, although Shebib called the Driftwood Friday saying he wanted the RCMP to arrest all the protesters because it was not possible to select only one individual

Immediately following the arrest, the remaining protesters took up a collection for the driver and thrust \$104 into the truck's

In an equally unexpected move, Kapler retrieved the money and returned it to Osborne as a donation to a newly formed land-acqui-sition fund (Island Savings account #1361260).

"We've always said we are working with the community, toward what the community wants," Kapler said. "We're not in a position to stop (logging) but there are so many other options available to everyone involved."

Texada planner Michael Rosen met Thursday with Islands Trust planner Linda Adams to discuss alternatives.

"We've always maintained that there is no intention to rezone or subdivide, unless the community asks for it," Rosen said. "The meeting with Adams was to explore some potential changes to

"They might be complete nonstarters because we have a tendency right now to stick to the status quo. But we will take any options back to (Texada's directors).

"Whatever happens, if there are some alternatives, of course they will be presented to the community before anything else is done."

Rosen refused to speculate on what these alternatives might be, although Adams did explain potential rezoning options on Texada's land to a Fulford Hall audience last Thursday evening.

'Positive' Saturday rally kicks-off cross campaign

Clear-cutting protesters will hold a street party and community sustainability rally Saturday afternoon to keep attention focussed on efforts to control Texada's logging in the south end of the island.

"We want to keep it as positive as possible and in the community's minds," said organizer Robert Osborne.

The rally will start at 2 p.m. in the Burgoyne triangle, bordered by Burgoyne Bay and Fulford-Ganges roads. Having an upbeat focus, the event will include music, dancing, live theatre and food.


The event will also mark the start of a cross-planting campaign to mark the increasing loss of trees.

One hundred wooden crosses, made from recycled wood, each denoting a truckload of felled trees, will be planted along the road in a ceremony starting at 1 p.m. sharp.

The ceremony will also give people the opportunity to take time to reflect on and grieve the loss of the trees, said organizer Devon Guest.

"It will acknowledge what we are feeling and our desire to protect our trees for the future," she said.

1999 sets new weather record for rainfall

Looking back at 1999, weatherwise, it would seem reasonable to describe it as a "blah" year best soon forgotten.

January followed right on with the pattern set by the year-end of 1998 - mild, very wet and with a continuation of fairly regular wind storms, seven in all, that went on right into June.

Spring was and for no obvious reason - such as hard or particularly late frosts - some four to five weeks late. Summer was almost equally late and, unfortunately, this was not compensated for by an equally late ending as might well have been expected. However, September and the first three weeks of October proved to be very pleasant and helped us to forget the "summer that wasn't."

The closing months of the year, precipitation-wise, were very average except only for the fact that there was no snow to record. Thus, our total snowfall for the year was only the 0.3" (7.6 mm)

Sad to relate, the heavy showers that began shortly after midnight tipped our year's total to still another record of 51.38" (130.51 cm), breaking the previous record of 51.28" (130.25 cm), set as recently as 1996, by a mere 0.1" (2.5 mm)!

(This record could be said to have been made on a technicality, since small weather stations are required to close month-end and year-end readings at 8 a.m. of the following morning.)

- · January: 11.98" (304.3 mm) a new record; snow: 0.3" (7.6 mm).
- February: 10.94" (277.9 mm) a new record.
- · March: 4.24": (107.7 mm).
- April: 0.8" (20.3 mm).
- · May: 1.08" (27.4 mm). • June: 1.51" (38.4 mm).

The last frost of spring 1999 was on the night of April 4-5 (Easter) at 0.0 C, though we had a heavy ground frost of 0.5 C on the night of May 9-10, which is quite late. The first frost of winter 1999 was overnight on November 4-5 at

Some readers may remember

that in mid-year I made reference to a forecast by Environment Canada that Vancouver and area would this year experience a new record total precipitation.

I gave as my opinion, based only on my 34 years of recording, that this would not be the case

In any event, we were both wrong. Vancouver did not go "over the top" but we did, even though, in our case, by such a small amount and that on the very last day of the year when we received 0.69" (17.5 mm), more than half of which fell immediately after midnight.

The moral here for me is to stay with recording!

It seems to me that the current climate change which began in 1994, bringing ever increasing annual precipitation, less snow, (1996 being a huge exception snow-wise) and generally more moderate temperatures, may be with us for a while yet.

This is a suggestion, not a fore-

Friday conservancy meeting explores how fish feed the forests

New reserch showing how bears and salmon feed the west coast forests will be revealed in a presentation by Dr. Tom Reimchen on Friday night.

Reimchen, a professor in the biology department at the University of Victoria, will explain at a Salt Spring Conservancy meeting how chum salmon and bears are crucial species in the maintenance of biodiversity of coastal forests.

His conclusions came from studies in Haida Gwaii, the midcoast of B.C. and Clayoquot Sound, where evidence of salmon nutrient uptake was found in the stable nitrogen isotopes from the wood of trees.

"Uneaten remnants of salmon accumulate in the forests and provide an important source of nutrients for a diversity of birds, mammals, invertebrates and vegetation," states Reimchen.

The meeting takes place at Lions Club Hall on Bonnet Road beginning at 7:30 p.m.



Emergency-response programs now entrenched on Salt Spring

Norm Slater can sit back and relax, for now.

After six months of planning, the Salt Spring Island Emergency Program co-ordinator has the two documents that will help the island deal with any natural or technological disaster.

Slater's job is now to keep the information and programs sharp while Salt Spring waits for the contents of those documents to be used in an actual disaster scenario.

The project was completed in December, using a 50 per cent federal grant to hire Victoria's RiskWorks Consulting and its emergency-preparation expertise.

Slater chaired a series of planning sessions during the last half of 1999 with the Emergency Management Operations committee to help develop an effective response plan for Salt Spring.

The result was the two documents now available for public viewing at Mary Hawkins Library.

The first — Emergency Management Program Guide — covers the objectives of the entire program, an element required of all local authorities by the B.C. Emergency Program Act. The guide spells out what Salt Spring should do during the next few years to prevent and better prepare for emergencies.

The second — Emergency Response and Recovery Plan presents the procedures for use during emergencies, such as earthquakes or fire. These help the various response agencies and volunteers work together in a structured organization that applies provincial standards, such as the Incident Command System, to local respon-

The overall project used wideranging input from throughout the community, from the Emergency Operations Centre, such first responders as the fire department, RCMP and coast guard, to volunteers from the island's amateur radio operators and social services.

The entire program is run as a local service under the jurisdiction of the Capital Regional District.



Wanted: public participation

This year will be an important one for the future of government on Salt Spring Island.

This is the year in which we shall decide whether we change the method we use to govern ourselves. But the decision will only be effective with community involvement in the process of examining the issues revolving around municipal incorporation.

This is not to say that incorporation is going to be the result of the government restructure study now under way. The matter might not even go to the public for a vote.

No, the outcome of the study will be largely determined by the effort individual citizens make to inform themselves of the issues and participate in the debate.

There is already a wealth of information available and it's as close as your computer (or the library if you haven't yet joined the Internet revolution).

The restructure committee has posted many pages of documents to its Internet website, enabling islanders to become fully aware with no effort beyond reading — of the key issues.

Among the documents are questions already posed by members of the public, and the committee's responses. There is valuable information here that ought to serve as a starting point for anyone who has not already considered the implications of restructuring local government.

The chief implication is the effect incorporation would have on taxation. Road maintenance and policing are two-big ticket items for which the taxpayers would become directly responsible. At present we pay for those services through the provincial rural tax. Our liability for these costs under incorporation is yet to be determined by the restructure study.

Once such costs are determined, a careful analysis will be required of what additional services we'd like to see and, perhaps more importantly, what local control is worth.

Should taxes rise under incorporation, which would seem likely, islanders will have to decide how much they would value the less tangible benefits of municipal government. We would probably enjoy greater influence over the provincial government and therefore its agencies, such as B.C. Assessment and B.C. Ferries.

Should the community decide it wants to lobby for the implementation of regulations on logging private land, which recent events suggest it would, the municipality of Salt Spring might be in a stronger position to do so than it is now.

Two other potential benefits come to mind. A local council could provide some much-needed leadership on local affairs (though leaders at the provincial and national levels seem woefully scarce).

Another benefit would be transparency in how local affairs are conducted. Land use issues are currently addressed at infrequent meetings of the Trust committee, with little or no debate. Placing those issues on the agenda of a municipal council meeting would ensure public debate and a higher level of visibility than is now the

There are other pros and cons to incorporation. But only through participation in the process will we be able to understand them all.

Protesting in Salt Spring style

Fighly-principled, idealistic and action-oriented are three terms That could be used to describe Salt Spring Islanders. It's not that we all fit the same mold but when it's time to man the barricades against a perceived foe, many islanders will rally together in defence of values and beliefs.

History shows this with the protests against the Ganges sewer, provincial mismanagement of education, nuclear weapons, ferry fare hikes and, of course, logging,

But only on Salt Spring could a protest turn into a love-in of sorts. Last week's logging protest reminded us of an incident a couple of years ago in which two local parties were having it out in a civil action at the Ganges courthouse.

When the proceedings adjourned, the protagonists met on the courthouse steps and embraced in a long and loving Salt Spring hug.

The same kind of thing happened at Burgoyne Bay on Wednesday when protesters passed the hat for money to reimburse a logging truck driver.

Texada Land Corporation's response was to donate the \$104 amount to the fundraising campaign that seeks to purchase land from Texada to protect it from logging.

It's all so very civilized, and a form of protest that is far preferable to civil disobedience.

Salt Spring Hours currency addresses off-island dollar flow

Why does Salt Spring need a new form of money? Isn't the Canadian dollar sufficient? The short answer is "no."

The basic reason is that there is not a sufficient amount of money

in circulation to give all persons on the island enough income, especially in the winter. The problem is that the money which comes to the island from tourism and pensions, which are our main sources of income, only circulates a few times and then goes off island to pay for taxes, bank interest, food, fuel, cars, computers and so on. We constantly lose money from our island economy. There is no way to stop the flow of money since Canadian money is accepted across the nation.

The Salt Spring Hours Barter Network is copied from the Ithaca Hours system of New York State

that was started in 1991 due to the closure of many local factories and high unemployment. During the depression of the 1930s there were over 400 "scrip" systems, including the Province of Alberta, which issued "prosperity certifi-cates" in 1936. Paul Glover, the inventor, and many others decided to print Ithaca Hours that were only good in Ithaca and the surrounding Thompson County. The population base is about 100,000, or 10 times that of Salt Spring. They now have several thousand

members and over 350 local businesses.

This system prints the currency, which features various local animals, birds, history and scenery. The notes are denominated in "Hours." Why hours and not dollars? The reason is that we want the system to be differentiated from the overall economy and we want to make people think in terms of time rather than dollars. We do not want a simple equiv-

We have de facto increased the minimum wage from \$7.15 to \$12, which is the equivalent value of one Hour. You cannot live on the island at the minimum wage

The experience in Ithaca is that the minimum wage has increased and the maximum wage has

declined. So there is more equality between people. Each person is VIEW totally free to set his/her own fees and the percentage of dollars or Hours accepted. Most of our members have opted to be "negotiable" and will negotiate with

each person depending on the situation of each.

The system is an open system, meaning that anyone can use the Hour currency who is willing to accept it for payment. This allows the entire community to participate without the need to formally join. This is one major difference between Hours and the LETS system that has been tried here at least twice before. Of course, there is an advantage to joining. First, you receive the equivalent of \$36 in SS Hour notes for your membership fee of only \$12. You also get one free listing in the Hour Island Directory of all member's goods and services that

are available

However, the real advantage is not the money at all. It is the networking and community that is built and the friends and relationships that are created. We hold monthly potlucks and we have fun, meet and do some bartering too. The networking of people and the building of community will make the system work.

The last thing that is of great importance is that the island can become more self-sufficient, produce more on the island, import

less, create more employment and provide the small luxuries that many cannot afford at all. There is also more security, knowing that if the global financial system melts down, which it must eventually, we will have our own money to fall back on!

It could save our butt some day!





First, the Direct Action Committee is not "his." Singling out Robert Osborne exposes him to the very risks that you would not wish upon your employees.

The Direct Action Committee is a group of islanders loosely organized around the desire to see community values and options retained over 10 per cent of Salt Spring through peaceful, non-violent protest. Robert has acted as spokesman for this committee on occasion.

The committee is not secretive. In fact, all their activities and meetings are publicized on the website (URL: www.savesaltspring.com) and advertised in the newspapers. All are welcome to attend.

You are kept up to date by phone by members of this committee and you even agreed to cooperate with their rally last week.

The Direct Action Committee is honouring its principles, which it has made public. These include:

· not in any way to put peoples' lives or safety at risk, and;

'Greedy, ignorant' minority holding tight to old ideas

Bruce Smith (of Beaver Point Road), writing in the January 5 Driftwood, objects to the opposition to the massive and rapid clear-cuts that are occurring now on Mount Tuam and are planned to occur on Mount Maxwell.

The reasons he cites are that civil disobedience is "contrary to the principles of law," that private land ownership is sacrosanct, and that forests can be clear-cut over and over and still provide "marketable timber" for generations to

I need to remind Mr. Smith that human laws are not written in heaven, that many abusive and racist laws, etc. were changed mostly through civil disobedience, that outdated laws need to be challenged in a democratic DEPTH

society, and that certain values and practices, once common, now appear to us as abominable.

In the matter of land ownership, no one can really "own" the land any more than one may "own" one's mother.

The land was here before you were born and will be here after you die.

When you buy a piece of land, society grants you and your heirs permission to use it, but in a way that will not infringe on the com-

Similarly to a mother, the land will nourish and provide you with the necessities of life, but only if you take good care of it. Buying a piece of land and trashing it, while killing most of the community of other-than-human life that it sustains, and all for the sake of quick monetary profit is, in my opinion, similar to abusing your own mother.

Mr. Smith appears to be convinced that this kind of wholesale destruction of a forest is sustainable, but I beg to disagree. The evidence is all over Vancouver Island, and in the arid clear-cuts on the former MacBlo lands right here on Salt Spring Island.

The same pattern is everywhere. Just look at lands in the Middle East, once lushly forested, but now mostly deserts that

were created while using less industrialized and "efficient" logging methods.

It has been proven again and again that there are ways to extract timber from a forest, albeit on a long-term basis, and still leave the forest intact and teeming with life.

This may be news to Mr. Smith and to other like-minded people, but there is much more to a forest than the "market value" of its tim-

This type of quick-profit, greed-based destruction is occurring at an alarming rate all over the planet while many people in our industrial-growth society, who used to be "citizens," have now become "consumers" who are still in what Dr. Helen Coldicott calls "manic denial,"

while the very basis of life on earth is being eroded in the name of the almighty dollar to the exclusion of any other value.

Mr. Smith presumes to speak for the "silent majority."

Let me suggest that he speaks for a greedy, insatiably hungry, value-challenged and profoundly ignorant minority that stubbornly clings to ideas and ways of doing things whose time has passed.

Most Salt Spring Islanders I believe, cherish this island for reasons other than the quick cash value of its marketable timber. If this community does not rally and act quickly, this island will be utterly transformed, and not in ways that will "preserve and protect" its very special nature.

Smoking ban almost harrassment

VICTORIA - As yet another brave new social engineering project rang in the year 2000, a Vancouver pub equipped its waiters and waitresses with gas masks.

At the stroke of midnight, Dec. 31, 1999, the province-wide smoking ban imposed on British Columbia by the Workers' Compensation Board doing the bidding for the NDP, the party

committed to protecting the ignorant citizenry from cradle to grave, went into effect.

The stated intent of the ban is to protect workers from

second-hand smoke, and by God, protect them the government will, whether they like it or not.

The management of the pub in question wasn't keen on the new restrictions which outlaw smoking in restaurants, bars and

Nor were the employees, neither those who smoked themselves nor those who didn't.

Staff members who smoked resented the ban for obvious reasons. Management and staff, smokers and non-smokers alike, feared loss of revenue, jobs and tips.

So they all made it clear that smoking was fine with them, donning gas masks, challenging the WCB to prove that employees thus equipped were being harmed by second-hand smoke.

If anything demonstrates the lunacy of trying to force a sizable segment of the population to abandon the practice of using a legal substance on the sale of which the government earns millions of dollars in taxes a year, the gas-mask caper does.

Another example of the quicksand of draconian laws in an otherwise civilized and tolerant society was served up by Bob Mills, the Reform Party's health critic, who ended the year with an urgent call for tax increases on Canadians who smoke and drink.

Such a measure, said Mills, would benefit the health of Canadians and reduce Medicare expenditures.

Before Mills could say butt out, all hell broke loose in his riding of Red Deer, Alberta.

His call for better health and lower health care costs didn't sit too well with the cowboys and oil patch workers.

When local reporters asked him whether he would entertain a fat tax as well, the rather portly Mills walked right into the trap, calling for a tax on fatty foods as well.

It's easy to see where this is going. Put a surtax on skiers because they run a disproportionately higher risk of injury. Ditto for mountain climbers. And what about those couch potatoes who don't get enough exercise?

Like most supporters of tough anti-smoking legislation who cite mushrooming health care costs, Mills forgot that the taxes on the products smokers and drinkers indulge in more than offset the cost they may impose on the health care system.

That leaves us with the WCB's ostensible reason for banning smoking just about everywhere, which is to protect workers from second-hand smoke.

Studies on the effects of second-hand smoke have at best been inconclusive and at worst falsified to suit the agenda of the antismoking lobby.

If the health of workers was at the heart of the WCB's concerns, it would have made allowances for alternatives such as proper ventilation or, say, separate rooms for smokers in restaurants, bars and pubs where patrons are served only by staff who smoke themselves.

A democratic society worth the name tailors its laws to suit the majority, without discriminating against minorities.

Smokers are clearly a minority, between 25 and 30 per cent of the adult population.

But rather than being accommodated, they are being harassed. If what governments as handmaidens of a tyrannical and puritanical anti-smoking lobby are doing to smokers were done to any other minority, there would be hell to pay.

And if governments go to these lengths to eradicate smoking, can a ban on drinking be far behind? Are smoking and drinking destined to become criminal offences in the not too distant future?

The way we're going, I wouldn't rule it out.

In a letter to the January 5 priftwood, Bruce Smith voices his logging of the Texada Lands (limited, he suggests, to those on the Action Committee). Peeling back the layers to discover the character of Irene Ruddock will be an intimate experience.

First, there will be the setting.

Only 30 people a night will fit into producer Lynda Jensen's The Studio where Active PASS is presenting A Lady of Letters on January 27-29.

Then there is the physical closeness the audience will have with "Irene" as actor Deb Toole performs the one-character play almost within touching distance.

And following the performance, director, producer and actor will have the opportunity to interact with the audience in a coffeehouse-style atmosphere.

The three women presenting the show say Irene is worth getting to know.

"She appears a normal person, but it turns out she isn't quite," says director Margaret Jardine, who discovered Irene and A Lady of Letters among a series of monologues written by Alan Bennett.

"I've become quite fond of her," says Toole, "(Revealing her character) is like peeling an onion."

Toole is a familiar presence on Salt Spring stages but usually in roles which take advantage of her vivacious real-life character. Her more recent works include the glitzey "Madame" in Casting Call, the fairy in Sleeping Beauty and the Eight Dwarves, as well as Doris in Cemetery Club,

"This is totally different for Deb," says Jardine. "She has no opportunity to be the comedian."

"It would cheapen the piece," adds Toole. "I have to be subtle."

But the part is perfect for Toole, and Jardine envisioned her in the role when she first read Bennett's monologue.

"It is an absolutely wonderful piece of work," she says. "It could be a black piece, but it isn't - it's terribly funny in parts, as well as quite moving and sad. It's a real mix of emotions."

Jardine was first introduced to Bennett's monologues (compiled

in a collection called Talking Heads) when she viewed a television performance of one piece Bed of Lentils - and then saw it

She found the script, read each monologue and immediately matched Toole with Irene in Lady of Letters.

"Talking Heads is a marvelous piece of writing," says Jardine, who hopes at some point to stage others of the monologues. "The characters are all totally different, but each is alienated from society, and most have an obsession."

Irene Ruddock's letter writing is a symptom of her obsession, Toole says. And while aspects of her are unlikeable, the audience should eventually sympathize with her.

The idea to introduce Toole's character in an intimate setting grew from a series of classes held at The Studio last year.

Participants performed in front and discussed the pieces and theatre and life," recalls Jensen, describing it as a "wonderful" exercise that would suit a theatre experience.

"I know (the performance) is going to stir this delicious connectedness," she says, "People will walk out of here richer than when they walked in.'

Following the 8 p.m. performance, audience members will be invited to stay, enjoy coffee or tea, talk about the work, and interact with Toole, Jardine and Jensen.

Although Toole is excited about the performance, she admits it has been an overwhelming process at times as she discovers Ruddock's personality and speech patterns, learns an entire script without the aid of cues or on-stage action, and prepares herself for audience-actor closeness.

Those looking to fill A Lady of Letters' very limited seating are advised to purchase tickets early.







All activities are free except the Friday night Afghani feast, organized by the Salt Spring Voice of Women and the GISS cafeteria program students. Proceeds support impoverished and oppressed women in Afghanistan.







Artist's paint brush strokes colour into island buildings

"Her art is her anchor," I thought to myself when I turned away from ordering a latte in Barb's Buns last week and went to check out Susan Pratt's acrylic paintings hanging on the wall above the high stools and

On an island filled with breathtakingly natural scenic panoramas and people who add all kinds of wonderfully crazy hues to the scenery, I quickly got over my surprise in response to Pratt's documentation of Salt Spring buildings.

Pratt uses acrylic blending in a way that brings out the exotic in these buildings (like I remember them a couple of years ago when I was only an island tourist) but her brush strokes seem to definitely root them in Salt Spring Island's

Yet the physical structure of these buildings is about the only aspect of them that has remained constant. As Pratt pointed out when we got together for coffee, the painting titled "108 Hereford Ave." is now the site of Piccolo House Restaurant, but many islanders remember it as the Glad's Ice Cream and Candy locale.

"People's memories attached to the buildings are different," said Pratt, who has lived here for seven years and knows well the musical chairs game that Salt Spring businesses play when it comes to loca-

Growing up in float camps on B.C's west coast, Pratt was raised on the idea that change is good while the family's home literally floated from one of her father's logging work locales to another.

They taught me that the world changed but you could also change the world," said Pratt.

The anchor in her life was her parents' recognition that she was the artist in the family. She was the one "commissioned" to make the cards when birthdays and other special occasions were celebrated.

"I can't remember a time when I

didn't think that (art) was a good thing to do," she said.

Enjoying change has led to a variety of jobs for Pratt. These include a nursing career, massage therapy, ranching, truck driving, horse packing and being a pilot.

Art has remained the constant in Pratt's life, from her early pen and ink drawings inspired by animals she observed while living on the Chilcotin Plateau to the last two decades when she has worked mostly in watercolours, oils and acrylics.

Ironically, Pratt and her partner Colin Rankin decided to sell their house around St. Mary Lake so she could work on her art fulltime. She is now painting houses and other buildings in their rental home near Fulford with one of her goals being to earn enough money to once again purchase a house.

But, of course, Pratt's motivation as an artist is much more than this.

Her Fulford paintings Downtown Fulford, Jambalaya and Blue Kayak (at the government dock) - among those hanging at Barb's Buns, came into being because of her love for the southend village.

"I love Fulford Harbour," she said. "I like the combination of people that just hang out there. I think the setting is absolutely beautiful. We tend to take it for granted. It's quite spectacular."

Pratt continues to teach art to students from kindergarten to Grade 2 at Fulford Elementary School where her seven-year-old son Mack attends. Work with these children has strengthened Pratt's belief that we all have the potential to be creative in visual art.

This year, Pratt will be teaching brush work to the students in the style of Vincent Van Gogh, which will culminate in impressionistic murals. Last year the students' Mona Lisa interpretations and selfportraits were quite a hit with art lovers and others on Salt Spring.

This is exactly what Pratt wants. It is her goal to facilitate opinions on art from everyone while promoting the idea that there are no right or wrong ways to view art.

"We don't have to be nervous about 'what if we're wrong'," she said. "We can't be wrong. I'd like to see art become even more accessible to all people. You can ask almost anyone what they think about music and they are happy to give you their opinion. You don't need to be an expert to know what you enjoy listening to. I believe people can feel that way about visual art. Just keep on looking and decide what you like."

When it comes to her philosophy, Pratt is putting her money where her mouth is.

Late in 1999, while her acrylics were hanging at the bakery cafe, she bought a cake from Barb's Buns to raffle off to customers. The catch was: in order to enter each person had to answer a survey about Pratt's art and to suggest what other buildings and areas should be documented in this

Pratt intends to follow up on some of the "fabulous ideas" she gleaned from the raffle entries by, for example, including some Vesuvius sites in the series which she believes will total a dozen paintings by this summer when she aims to mount the entire show somewhere on Salt Spring.

She will also be making prints of some of her new works.

the Alliance of Salt Spring Artists (ASA), and slowing down doesn't appear to be on the agenda for the next 12 months

An organization where first-time exhibitors join with thoroughlyseasoned artists and everyone in between, the ASA broke the 100member barrier - at 104 - in

And now is the time to get involved in what looks like another active year for the ASA. The annual general meeting is set for next Thursday, January 20 at Lions Hall. A potluck runs from 5:30 to 7 p.m., with the meeting slotted for 7

Memberships (\$15) will be renewed, upcoming shows discussed and a new executive elect-

Co-director Ron Crawford says more people are urged to take on the various jobs required. People with organizational, publicity and communication skills are especially needed, although people are always needed to look after one specific task, such as arranging the exhibits at a single public venue.

Finding ways to affordably communicate with the ever-growing number of members is especially important for the ASA right now, said Crawford. One option being considered is to acquire a small downtown Ganges office space where information could be easily

But the ASA is not just after volunteers. As Crawford points out, members have access to an incredible pool of resources, get to meet other artists, benefit from the mentorship program, learn how to present their work and sell themselves

"We're an open group of artists of all levels and abilities," explained Crawford. "A lot of people who show with us have shown for the first time."

On the other hand, extremely well-known artists such as Ian Thomas and Robert Bateman have participated in ASA events.

Last year the ASA held its erotic show in March, Summer Showcase, the art exhibit for ArtSpring's grand opening, a scholarship art auction for postsecondary art school students, and added two new venues - Sweet Arts and Bristol Cutter - to its art-in-public-places program.

The scholarship auction raised \$3,000 benefitting three students, and the ASA also donated \$550 to ArtSpring for railings.

An erotic show is not in the works this year, said Crawford, unless one is demanded by the membership and someone volunteers to organize it. Summer Showcase will proceed at ArtSpring again, and a spring or autumn show, depending on what members want, will be held.

The ArtSpring lobby will be the newest ASA venue for public art displays, and expansion of the group's website, currently handled by Ron George, is also planned.

Crawford said more ASA artists are encouraged to exhibit their work in the regular public venues: Bristol Cutter, Sweet Arts, Roasting Co., Island Savings, Moby's and the ArtSpring lobby.

While four years ago there were few public places to view contemporary art, that is no longer the case, he said.

Cocker brings medals back from down under

There were no records for Tyler Cocker but several gold medals as the Gulf Islands track-and-field whiz returned with Vancouver Island teammates from a threeweek tour of Australia.

All three of the team's competitions were in Melbourne, and Cocker earned six golds and one silver in the international events.

"I guess the thing that really stood out was how international competition down there is really not all that far away from the level here at home," Cocker said from his Mayne Island home.

The team spent Christmas and New Years down under and also took in sidetrips to Canberra and

In the first competition, at Melbourne's Olympic Stadium, Cocker, 15, was pitted against athletes 20 years and older.

He ran the 300-metre steeplechase in the women's division and won in a time of 10 minutes 15

He also posted a three-metre,

50-centimetre mark in the pole vault but was down in placings.

The second meet was at Box Hill against athletes his own age and he won both the 2000-m steeplechase (seven minutes) and the 100-m hurdles (14.8 seconds). His pole-vault specialty was rained

The final event was the most competitive as Cocker took first in the 800-m (2:07), 100-m hurdles (14.6) and pole vault (3.4 metres). He also took second in the 200-m

"The whole (Vancouver Island) team did really well. It was hot but not that dry heat that wears you out," Cocker said.

"It was really a great experience and I couldn't have done it without financial support from people on Mayne and Saturna."

Cocker now turns his efforts to intensive training for a spot in the 2000-m steeplechase on the B.C. team that will compete in the Legion Camp, a national-level competition to be held in July.

The boys' next home game is against Chemainus January 19, while the girls' takes place the next day against Shawnigan Lake.


All home games start at 8 p.m. at SIMS.



On Thursday, January 6, the RCMP and the fire department responded to a second alarm from a home which had already been burglarized. A 911 call reported intruders had been heard trying to enter the home.

Firefighters were first on the scene and blocked all the road accesses to Winter Cove and checked all vehicles coming to and from the area. Several roadblocks were set up around Winter Cove. Police arrived shortly after and took over the search. No suspects were found.

This is the second rash of burglaries on the island in months. Following the Thanksgiving weekend in mid-October, 16 homes on the Cliffside Road area were hit by thieves. Outboard motors, chainsaws, and electronic equipment were reported stolen at that time.

In both instances thieves primarily broke into seasonal residences. Homes that were obviously vacant and were not readily visible from the road may have been hardest hit.

Many islanders complain that offislanders have been led to believe

this may attract thieves. However, although there is no permanent police office on the island, police officers from the Outer Gulf Islands detachment have a boat for quick access to Saturna.

A stronger police presence has been noticed on the island since the fall burglaries. Police are trying to support the neighbourhoods.

Ferry change

A temporary ferry schedule change to the Southern Gulf Islands has revised Saturna's schedule until February 6. The Queen of Cumberland has gone for refit and it is being replaced by the Bowen Queen. The Bowen Queen is being replaced by the Tachek, which cannot meet the old schedule.

Those who wish to travel as foot passengers on either vessel are eligible for reduced parking rates at Swartz Bay.

The family home, later owned by the Stewarts, overlooked Georgeson Bay. It was built on land granted to his great grandfather about the middle of the 19th century. Georgie's name appears on a register from the old North Galiano school. It dates from the period when his father was fish buyer at Lighthouse Bay during

George and his wife Rosemary had four children — Rosemary (now of Delta), Gordon (a logger), John (a tug boat captain) and Stewart (also a logger). The family's connection with Galiano is very strong, George and his grand-daughter Jeanine frequently attending Gulf Islands Historical Federation and Galiano Museum gatherings.

A long-time member of the Galiano Lions Club, George and his fellow member Ollie Garner were responsible for starting a Lions' Club tradition — the Seafood Dinner. Cooking everything outdoors, the two prepared enough delicious seafood for a sit-down dinner for about 100 people gathered in the South Hall. The seafood dinner continues as a very popular spring event.

George's contribution to island life was remembered at a celebration of his life held in the Lions Hall on January 10.

Word was received of the death on January 8 of George's friend and fellow cook, Ollie Garner. My report on Ollie's life and his contribution to Galiano's development will be submitted for next week's Driftwood.

Ollie's memorial service is set for Saturday, January 15 at 2 p.m. in Lions Hall.

in a mainland hospital early last week. She was 83.



From Monday, January 10, to approximately February 6, the Queen of Cumberland will be removed from the Swartz Bay-Southern Gulf Islands service for annual refit.

During this time, the Bowen Queen will replace the Queen of Cumberland and the Tachek will replace the Bowen Queen on our Swartz Bay-Southern Gulf Islands routes.

Because the *Tachek* is smaller and slower than the *Bowen Queen*, temporary schedule changes are required for all Swartz Bay-Southern Gulf Islands routes (except the Fulford Harbour service). Salt Spring Island's first new millennium baby, Alexandria Isobel Matthews, was given much more than a passing grade just shy of a week into her life.

"She's sleeping well and is doing well in all ways," said Bill Matthews, the first-time father. "She gets an A+ rating.

Alexandria weighed in at 7 lbs., 14 ounces upon her home birth last Tuesday.

According to Matthews, they never planned a pregnancy in order to register a first baby in the 21st centu-

"The thought never crossed our minds," he said. Matthews said midwives Julia Atkins and Maggie Ramsey have visited every day since they assisted

with the birth at 12:21 p.m. on January 4. Atkins received her official papers less than three hours before Alexandria was born, making the birth her first delivery as a legal midwife.

Matthews said the baby, who is also the first grandchild on both sides of the family, received her middle name in honour of her paternal grandmother.

In addition, Isobel is the Spanish version of Elizabeth, which is the first name of the baby's mother, although she usually goes by her middle name of

The Matthews moved to the island in October from Berkeley, California.

Bill previously owned a rare bookstore in Vancouver and he continues to work as a rare book dealer out of the couple's Salt Spring home. This means both parents have been with Alexandria most of the time since her birth.

Salt Spring helps feed the hungry

When a few hundred people gathered for a feast in Pigeon Park in Vancouver's Downtown East Side Sunday, Salt Spring food was among the bounty shared.

The monthly feast, organized by a group called Feed People Well, included chickens from a local farm, and foods gathered in the wild by experienced harvesters.

The group raised funds this year through sale of jams and products made from berries and other goods foraged on the island, which proved popular at craft fairs.

Salt Spring Seeds also donated many seeds to get food production started.

"There's been quite a bit of community involvement and interest from Salt Spring," said spokesman Simon Toole.

He said seven people from Salt Spring helped prepare the Sunday evening feast, and that the event received a lot of good feedback.

He said Feed People Well was also inspired by a film made by islanders David Shebib and Barb

It focussed on the Downtown East Side and the First Nations people there, after the elders had organized a fast to draw attention to their community's desperate pover-

From that, said Toole, the idea of holding a regular free "feast" for all in the Downtown East Side was

Now Feed People Well has two components: gathering and preparing the food for the feasts, and setting up camps which provide the base for wild food harvesting.

Louis and Sequoia Lesosky have been running a camp on Salt

Eventually, said Toole, the group

where Downtown East Side people can come to learn practical skills.

Toole said the Pigeon Park feasts typically feed between 400 and 500 people, with food prepared by volunteers in different houses. Traditional native bannock is also a feast staple.

"It's really good to see that people are trying to do things," he said. "They are really trying to make a change down there. The natives have a lot of strength in what they are doing . . .

Salt Spring is welcome to expand on its connections to Feed People Well. Those unable to harvest the fruit from their trees, and people willing to donate garden space or grow extra food for the project might want to contact Feed People





Love is Christmas denominator

Christmas is not a happy time for recovering alcoholics or those who have lost a loved one.

The nostalgia tends to overwhelm and escape becomes paramount, a kind of

defence mechanism to protect the ego. Carl Jung, the eminent psychiatrist, explained it as the body's retreat into numbness, a protection against pain. Sadness and reclusiveness are handled during this grieving period. This is nature's healing process and during this time we learn to adjust and re-enter the world.

One day you awaken and the numbness has gone. You look around and you begin to live again, you are alive and feelings return.

The first Christmas I coped by fleeing to Mexico. The distraction helped but I knew that one day I would have to face up to reality.

This Christmas the numbness had subsided and I remained at home. How to spend the day? I had no plans. I had arranged to bring in the millennium in Vancouver with my family, so that took care of New Year's. Christmas Eve I sat with my two cats in front of the television and tried not to think of old times. Assembling toys following Japanese instructions with a deadline of dawn, I was beginning to feel, and perhaps enjoy, being sorry for myself.

Next morning the phone rang and I was invited to spend Christmas day with five friends in a beautiful home

surrounded by trees on top of a hill. I would be picked up by noon.

I admit to a little apprehension. These friends were of the Baha'i faith and consequently were vegetarian, non-smokers and non-drinkers. In addition, they did not celebrate Christmas per se. On the other hand I was carnivorous, agnostic and a Zen existentialist, and given to the occasional bout of profanity. What did we have in common? Was there a denominator or was I simply a token stray?

The house was sheer beauty, comfortable and welcoming. The hosts were both artists: Carol, a gifted painter and Bryn, an innovative wood carver. They were charming and delightful. I proffered my gift, a red rose. Actually, it was a second-hand rose, as I had plucked it from a bowl in my home before leaving.

"The best kind, really," said Carol. I was growing fond of this lady.




