Private Jesse Bond at age 21, 48th (Victoria) Battalion, 3rd Canadian Pioneers Division at training camp in southwest England, 1915. "Like so many others he volunteered for King and Country," writes his son Malcolm Bond. "His first night in action in France in the spring of 1916 saw his 30-man platoon wiped out almost to a man. He and one other survived. His best friend was cut in half by a machine gun while hung up in barbed wire not 30 feet from him. Jesse's ordeal prompted him not to make close friendships until near the war's end and it left him with nightmares of artillery pounding for eight or nine years after his return to Salt Spring in 1919.







Bert McCann, 1940. After training at gunnery school he reported to the 14th Fighter Squadron posted to the Aleutian Isles chain (1943). Along with U.S.-Canadian army and air force, they forced the Japanese off Attu and Kiska and stopped their drive to Alaska. Posted overseas January 1944, renamed 442 Squadron. First squadron in France, June 10, 1944 at Juno. Covered the Canadian 1st Army through Belgium and the Netherlands to last posting 12 miles from Arnhem.





He wanted to go overseas, but because of his heart was not permitted to go. He said they put in 16-hour days, seven days a week on that job."



Clarence Albert "Jock" Goodrich and John Edward "Jack" Bennett joined the Seaforth Highlanders together in Smithers. They were blended into the Canadian Scottish 16th Battalion under the command of Col. Cy Peck at the Willows Training Camp in Victoria before they were sent overseas for WWI. Both men settled on Salt Spring Island after the war. Jock Goodrich was the father of Iris Pattinson and Ruth Heinekey. (Submitted by Carol Simpson)



Harry Andrews Roberts served in the 1st Battalion, Canadian Scottish Regiment (Princess Mary's), along with many others from Salt Spring, 1940-45. Landed on D-Day. Three wounds. Awarded Knight of the National Order of Merit by France. Nominated by his battalion to represent them in April this year at the 60th anniversary of the liberation of the town of Hattem, Holland. 

In 1900, Captain James Mitchell, aged 17, left his home in Scotland for Africa and the Boer War. He served in the "Imperial Light Horse" regiment under the command of Lord Roberts. He saw action in one Zulu rebellion; an awesome sight indeed. Awarded Queen Victoria's medal for five campaigns: South Africa 1901, South Africa 1902, Transvaal Orange Free State Cape Colony. Awarded King Edwards medal 1906. In WWI he fought in the trenches and later in the Royal Flying Corp. in balloons observing for the French lines. Awarded three 1914-1918 medals and the Military Cross. (Submitted by his daughter June Mitchell)



Ronald Stewart Walter Hoole served Ken Byron Sr., Sgt. in C. Scottish in the 1st Battalion, Canadian Scottish Regiment, WWII. Regiment (Princess Mary's), 1940-44, along with many others from Salt Spring. Killed in action October 27, 1944. (Submitted by Bob Rush)

Edward had been killed in the Pacific and a nephew, Wilfred Bonner was lost in the Gulf of St. Lawrence when his ship was torpedoed.


"A whole generation of children worldwide grew up without the support of fathers and mothers, brothers, uncles and extended family.


