

Personal electric vehicle riders growing exponentially on the island

The pack of 13 electric scooter riders who gathered at Barb's Bakery and Bistro on Saturday boast they are a silent, pollution-free force to be reckoned with.

"We're born to be mild," one rider jokes.

They may be mild on the environment, but the rationale behind their sustainable transportation choice is powerful.

Instead of leather jackets, the self-dubbed "Electric Angels" wear Gortex as they assemble for the first time en masse on Salt Spring. They are among a group of over 60 electric scooter and bicycle riders on the island which has been growing exponentially over the last year alongside rising gas prices.

"Every time gas goes up 10 cents, the phone starts

to ring," said Chris Dixon, owner of EV Riders on Salt Spring, who has been selling electric scooters and bicycles for the past two years.

On an island with the highest gas prices in North America and a bee's nest of summer traffic congestion, residents are trading in their gas-guzzlers for chic electric vehicles they can ride with pride.

Peter Clarke's pickup truck was costing him \$70 a week to gas-up last fall. So he sold it and bought an electric scooter.

"I thought it would be a neat experiment," said Clarke. "Then, all of a sudden, I was a scooter man."

It costs Clarke less than 10 cents per day to keep his battery charged enough to commute daily between Vesuvius and Windsor Plywood where he works as a salesperson.

Clarke and other "electric angels" say that in addition to cutting gas costs, there are myriad benefits.

"It's fun. That's the big thing," said Clarke. "It's a bicycle that zooms along perfectly quiet. You can hear the birds chirping and talk to people raking their yards as you drive by; it's a great feeling."

Bob Fenske has been riding his electric scooter, a silver and black Motorino HTh, for the past 12 months. As chair of the Salt Spring Community Transit and Transportation Commission, Fenske rides his scooter all over the island for business appointments, shopping for groceries in Ganges and going out for coffee.

"It's an absolute hoot," he said, adding it is his direct way of reducing carbon dioxide emissions and his dependance on gas.

While Fenske can ride from Channel Ridge to Fulford and back without having to re-charge, he admits scooters are best-suited for short pleasure rides or shopping rather than driving long distances to Vancouver or Victoria.

Lack of readily available hydro outlets for riders to re-charge their batteries is an obstacle Fenske would like to see eliminated with the installation of electrical outlets across the island, accessible for a nominal fee.

Scooters and bikes are constantly changing

The Murakami Gardens community housing project is slated to be the first spot on Salt Spring to install scooter-friendly outlets on its bike racks.

Despite minor inconveniences like being somewhat slow going up hills and having to dress appropriately for weather conditions, Fenske hopes to see many more electric scooters and bikes take to Salt Spring roads.

"My vision is to see this island festooned with electric scooters," he said.

Dixon says e-bike manufacturers work tirelessly to improve their products, and that growing awareness of environmental issues has created a strong demand for viable alternatives to petroleum-powered vehicles.

Dixon sells eight models of Motorino and Veloteq electric

scooters and a full range of electric bicycles and motor assist kits. Prices range from \$900 to \$2,000. He says the next giant step in scooter evolution will be to adopt powerful, lightweight lithium-ion batteries to replace lead-acid batteries now in use.

In the meantime, electric transportation aficionados can be frequently spotted in their candy-coloured scooters, zooming quietly around Ganges. They glide in and out of traffic with serene expressions while car drivers burn fuel like wildfire, circling town looking for a parking spot.

Fenske said it's not uncommon, after parking his scooter, to be stopped by a passerby wanting to talk "electric scooters."

On any given day, three or more scooters are parked in front of the Creekside building, turning the outdoor parking area into a veritable electric scooter show room.

"I am very happy with my 'Bee,'" said Deb LeBlanc, who has aptly named her yellow scooter.



Farm holidays make for a perfect 'green' vacation

Instead of spending their vacation sipping cocktails at a beach resort, Vancouverites Silvia Hagen and John Mason opted for something a little dirtier this year.

The couple, along with eight other farm holiday-goers, spent July 23 to 25 tenting in an organic garlic field at Duck Creek Farm on Salt Spring Island, working as farm hands and doing everything from harvesting and drying garlic to pulling weeds.

"If everybody did this just once in their lifetime, they would understand why it's worthwhile," said Hagen, as she tugs plump garlic bulbs from the soil by hand and piles them into a wheelbarrow. "Learning all about garlic; this, to me, is fascinating."

She and Mason were first introduced to farm holidays while travelling in England and jumped at the chance to experience the same thing in their own province.

The farm holiday trend, already prominent in Europe, is catching on in North America. And The Land Conservancy of B.C. (TLC), which offered four B.C. farm holidays this year in addition to its existing five conservation holidays, have tapped into the growing market of vacationers looking for a closer connection with the land and a deeper understanding of where their food comes from.

We just started farm-focussed holidays last year," said Paula Hesje, TLC agricultural liaison. "It was met with great enthusiasm, so we thought we would ramp it up this

In 2007 TLC piloted two farm holidays and in 2008 they pumped that number up

Hesje said based on the high number of first-year participants who returned again

the second year, the future of farm holidays in B.C. looks to be on the upswing.

"People are looking for a meaningful way to travel," Hesje said.

"It's not enough to go to the beach and twirl an umbrella in a drink; they're looking to learn new things, get out to places that are unique... and hang out with farmers who will answer their questions."

Three Salt Spring farms — Duck Creek Farm, Foxglove Farm and Grandview Farmselected to be part of this year's TLC Farm Holiday lineup, offered vast educational opportunities, Hesje said.

All three are TLC conservation partners who bear the TLC butterfly symbol, denoting their commitment to conserving natural habitat on their farms.

has 13 acres of farmland dedicated to biodynamic agriculture and growing organic garlic, basil, cucumbers, apples, beets, carrots, squash and pumpkin on Duck Creek

Cutthroat trout and coho salmon live vear-round in the stream and ponds Wilcox helped create, and three acres along the creek have been set aside for conservation.

The educational component is a huge draw for vacationers, Hesje said.

"We've chosen farmers who are really farm savvy and can share their experiences with others."

Bringing willing volunteers onto their farms benefits the farmers as well.

Hesje said the TLC farm holidays help provide sorely needed labour their part-John Wilcox, a seventh-generation farmer, ners can use to help them during their busy

growing season.

Renowned for his passion for community farming, Wilcox believes escalating oil prices will lead to a massive shift away from industrial agriculture and towards local, organic farming methods over the next 10 years.

comes to the farm and becomes more aware of what's needed to produce food locally,"

For \$160 per person, or \$125 for TLC members, farm holiday-goers get three days and two nights of hands-on organic farming experience with home-cooked meals provided.

Stewart Boddy, a hardy senior from Victoria, signed up for the Duck Creek Farm holiday because he enjoys meeting likeminded people. Others in the group, who ranged from University of British Columbia students to middle-aged hobby gardeners, similarly sought the company of others they could learn something valuable from.

Taking a break from her garlic pulling, Hagen stands upright for a moment to look back and admire the row of garlic she was

"At the end of the day," she said, "It's great to look out and see all the weeds are gone and all the garlic harvested."



Island family tackles construction's green future

Materials, footprint size, lot location all factors to consider

Growing up on Salt Spring doesn't necessarily guarantee a green consciousness, but in some cases it seems to help.

Take Alain Grange, the young owner of one of the island's newest building firms, Green Earth Construction: Grange graduated from Gulf Islands Secondary School in 1997 and fell into an apprenticeship in carpentry almost by chance.

After 11 years of experience building homes, he's ready to take the plunge as owner of an innovative business, but for him

it's the most natural step.

"Green building is a fad that seems to have come up quickly," said Grange, "but it's something we're all going to have to keep doing soon. We're going to be reusing every little thing — the damage that's been done to the earth in just the past 100 years is incredible, considering how old it is."

Grange sees going green as a necessary part of the building trade's future, but says he's learned that the Gulf Islands and Vancouver Island are already ahead of many regions in this way.

"Going the green way is kind of the island way," said Grange. "It's like buying local."

Green Earth Construction officially began as a company in March of this year, though it's still in its early stages. The goal is to focus on normal construction (rather than alternative means such as cob or rammed earth), but to incorporate greener practices whenever possible.

A recent Built Green course Grange completed through the Canadian Home Builders Association carries a platform of ideas that Green Earth will build on, working from the "tight envelope" paradigm. Grange explained this means building as much energy efficiency as possible into home design, including good insulation, a good vapour barrier, and renewable energy sources such as solar panels and heat pumps.

A key component of his practice is to use long-lasting materials that won't have to be replaced or discarded, and Grange says there are a lot of other options for going green.

"It starts with where you buy your lot; you can go close to town so there's not as much driving."

Keeping the size down is another important element. As Grange points out, a 5,000square-foot house for two people doesn't make sense, even if it's made of rammed

Many mills on the island provide local wood, and having your own wood milled to build your home is the ideal situation, Grange said.

"Even a small tree can be made into a 2 X 4 or a 1 X 4 for trim. It can be sent to Chemainus to make flooring, if it's fir. There's lots of options other than firewood.

"Having a house that's going to make it

easy to be green at home, like having Energy Star appliances — in the end that's going to bring energy bills down," Grange suggested.

"Even small things are going to help, like using eco-friendly paint, or getting rid of old insulation."


Bringing green consciousness into the construction business requires supportive clients, but Grange has found the local climate is already warm.

"We'd like to be building houses on the island here. We're not trying to change the world with building, but to build homes that are going to last a long time and be healthy. We'll employ some local people and have fun doing it.

"I think Salt Spring will be a pretty good place for it — people are receptive to new ideas."

Expert offers tips for a guilt-free lawn

Speaker gives different options

Lawns have had it rough over the past sev-

Whether it's people advocating for more local food production, waterless gardens or having to ween ourselves off chemical fertilizers and insecticides, the need to green up our act has pretty much demonized the preeminent symbol of suburbia — a green lawn.

Yet, according to an expert speaking at a recent workshop as part of the Capital Regional District's campaign to promote the reduction of pesticide use, your lawn need not just look green on the outside.

"A lot of people want to wipe out all the lawns, but I'm going to give you another perspective," said speaker Heide Hermary.

In addition to providing an ideal playing surface, lawns are a great way to increase green space and produce oxygen.

"They are extremely efficient carbon dioxide sinks and that's something we are going to have to be looking at as we are becoming more and more concerned about global

Hermary's philosophy is simple: solving the problem is always better than solving symptoms.

Instead of deploying an arsenal of chemicals to neutralize weeds and keep lawns green as problems arise, the key is to make sure your lawn has a healthy growing medium to begin with.

The first thing to do is mow high with a sharp blade. An ideal height is between two and three inches.

Grass cut too short means sensitive root systems and crowns get more exposure to sunlight and traffic. Shorter lawns have a harder time absorbing nutrients from the sun and take longer to recover.

"A short cut lawn is not going to be drought tolerant, it's going to get sick and it's not going to get enough nutrients," Hermary

said. "It traumatizes your lawn."

The second step in maintaining a healthier lawn is to leave grass clippings on the lawn after it's cut.

"This one doesn't require any work at all," she said.

Nutrients provided by decomposing grass clippings is a fundamental building block for good healthy soil.

These two steps alone are enough to keep lawns in great shape for most of the year.

Applying compost to the lawn once or twice a year, and sea water every two or three years, also promotes healthy soil, she said.

Because of grass' strength, good soil will generally mean it can out-compete just about any of the weeds in your yard.

"The grasses we use in our yards are really really tough grasses," she said.

If you don't have access to enough com-

post to liberally spread across your lawn, try adding a brew of compost tea or a diluted microbe solution such as Effective Microorganisms or Biosa.

The stronger your lawn's root system, the harder it is for weeds to gain a foothold.

A healthy lawn in good soil can generally last up to six weeks without needing any water. It will turn brown and go dormant but will come up just like new when the rains

Developing a healthy lawn that is safe to work and play on, Hermary said, is all about using the nutrients that nature provides and living within your yard's seasonal demands.

It may require patience and a little bit of work, but the effort is worth every penny you'll never again have to spend on toxic





Next big green design idea is ... going small

Farm workers' cabins are one use for buildings

Having a small environmental footprint is something many people are working toward these days, but few people are thinking as small as Johanna Murray.

A resident of the Gulf Islands for 27 years, Murray has become something of an expert on how to work creatively without a lot of space. She's put her knowledge and passion together for a new venture called Small Footprint Designs, Salt Spring's first building company to focus on the really tiny.

Close to 30 people came out to an open house held on July 26 to see Murray's first completed project under the Small Footprint banner: a cozy, lofted studio with a barn shaped roof and a bright blue door. The size? 107 square feet.

Murray is quick to point out that the legal uses of her designs are limited by land use bylaws: she is not creating cottages or guest houses and her buildings do not have kitchens or plumbing - and 107 square feet is the maximum one can go up to without acquiring a building permit. But such a space has many practical uses, including as an art studio, workshop, meditation hut, office or garden room.

A potential use that Murray is particularly interested in is as a farm worker's cabin.

'I've felt there's a need for this in the community for some time," Murray said during an interview. "I'm working closely with the Salt Spring Island Area Farm Plan."

Published in January 2008, the plan calls for agriculture to become a core element of the community and the economy. Living sustainably by producing the island's food on-island is not impossible; statistics in the report show that in 1893, Salt Spring produced 156 tons of potatoes and 144 tons of grain, compared with two tons of potatoes and a few bushels of grain in 2006.

One of the problems with reintroducing farming to the island is the lack of affordable housing. Murray said that her designs are one solution. Travelling WWOOFers and farm labourers could sleep in small cabins and rely on the farm as headquarters for eating, bathing, etc. Land within the ALR is currently the only type allowed more than one residence.

"We have a chance to build a sustainable farming community," said Murray. "If the workers had a nice place to stay it might make it attractive enough for them to keep staying

Another potential idea that would use the buildings just for sleeping cabins would provide housing for homeless people.

Murray's experience in building includes several carpentry jobs, including building six or seven homes with carpenters. She's also done woodshop jobs, musical instrument building and wooden boat refinishing, sailed schooners and been a kayak guide in the summer. She said having knowledge of boats has probably helped influence her design ideas.

"Boats have to be the most efficient use of space — everything is

People interested in Murray's design ideas can contact her with their needs, and she'll work with a carpenter to design and construct a suitable building. She hopes to be able to provide alternative energy sources soon, and already works with local mills to use local lumber.

Murray also works closely with Uli Temmel and the Capital Regional District's Building Inspection Office to ensure her designs conform to bylaw requirements.

In the near future, Small Footprint Designs will also feature prefabricated buildings, which Murray said will be constructed in one place locally and then delivered on a flatbed truck, saving fuel and other

Although many designers would be tempted to go bigger and more complex as they develop, Murray is looking at quite the opposite trend.

"I'm interested in really small spaces, and I want to become an expert in it - so I want to stay



Mysteries of life explored in new Slomka artwork

Acrylics exhibited at Coffee Co. through August

A new art exhibit at Salt Spring Coffee Co. cafe in Ganges expresses the artist's life experiences and emotions in dynamic, bright works on canvas.

Like many Salt Spring Islanders, Julianna Slomka has worn many hats and has diverse interests. The short list includes raising Morgan horses and driving a school bus for nearly two decades. She is very active, has practised several gruelling sports and teaches Argentine tango which she learned while in Argentina.

"I thought I had found a moving art form I could not live without," she said.

Life experiences have informed her painting, explains press material, "and one piece in the exhibit deftly shows that movement in dance, a pair of tango dancers, the gentleman's right foot blurred in a shuffle while the rich red-heeled feet of the lady anchor the moment."

"As life would have it, circumstances forced her to return to her first passion — using her hands to turn a flat white surface into an illusion of the opposite. She works in acrylic, enjoying the versatility and bright colours the medium affords her. And this show is bright. In one six-foot-long canvas, four vibrant red pairs of lips, as luscious as one can imagine, mouth words which she has yet to reveal."

Slomka hopes the passion in her pieces is apparent, and offers the following statement to help viewers understand her intentions.

"The mysteries of life are both exciting and painful./Struggles with our dreams, happiness and sensuality, our losses and memories mean little to others, but mean the world to us./No one is immune to these experiences./ They're what make us all the same."

She adds: "It is my hope that in viewing my work, it rings a bell of familiarity with these emotions we all have."

The exhibit runs through August.

Organic dancing vibe comes to Moby's Pub

Multi-instrumentalist Shane Philip

A one-man show said to inspire audiences and "package up the West Coast outdoor party" comes to Moby's on Saturday night.

Shane Philip plays seven instruments, including the didgeridoo.

"Swelling in primordial pulses and wholloping whoops, the tacit tones of Shane Philip's didgeridoo hold the power to still listeners into silence or encourage audiences to rise up in a tribal swell of intoxicating spirit — with sometimes but a heartbeat in between," states his web-

"Meanwhile his hands will be skillfully juggling between shaking up rhythms with his aslatua, driving the dance floor with his djembe and sliding out grooves on his Weissenborn-style guitar while his foot taps in earthshaking electronic kicks wherever they might fit."

Philip's newest CD, released earlier this year, is called In the Moment.

A cut was played on CBC Radio One's North by Northwest show last Saturday morning.

"The album is a huge leap for him as an artist beyond the traditional folk rock [realm] into an organic, dancing vibe and it teeters on the verge of clearing an evolutionary gap in the entire genre," states press material.

Philip's previous releases were Om Cooking (2005) and Earthshake (2006).



Geezers hit the mark in making fun of all

Missing tennis bubble also found at lake bottom

Many islanders would assume that if you are going to put on a show about the Islands Trust, the jokes write themselves

As the reader can well imagine, the packed ArtSpring houses entertained by messieurs Chalmers and Filkow on Friday and Saturday night had, shall we say, a certain political bent. The mere name dropping of any of the miscellaneous players in the local political arena was enough to elicit gales of laughter. The comedy duo was indeed preaching to the converted.

In spite of that, the night was not preachy. In fact, it was only vaguely political. That was surprising on two counts. Given Arvid Chalmers' recent run-ins with the Islands Trust, one may have expected the man to make a lunch out of the subject, turning his personal saga into a modern-day Lenny Bruce performance, waving a court summons over his head like a bloody shirt. But that was not to be.

Surprise number two: Given the name of the performance, The Islands Trust Story (or T.I.T.S. for short), many of the island's left-leaning intelligentsia may have been disappointed that the evening was more about fun and less about the politics suggested by the title on the marquee. This was about as far from a political rally as you might get. This was part Corner Gas and a healthy dose of Benny Hill.

The political shots tended to be delivered with kid gloves and touched on everything from federal Foreign Affairs Minister Maxime Bernier's recent resignation to the new Capital

Regional District proposal for a septic tank monitoring system. Enter Mr. Chalmers in a dangerously tight Superman outfit — the big "S" representing "Septic-Man"

The biggest laugh came with Geezer Filkow explaining that if you look way down into the centre of the giant aerators bobbing around St. Mary Lake, you can see the tennis bubble resting on the bottom.

Of course, if we can't make fun of each other, who can we make fun of?

The two self deprecated all over themselves, with loads of references to the aches and pains of hitting the downside of 50, single life on the rock, and the glorification of the ever expanding, ponderous waistline. Talk about your belly laughs.

Enter the Benny Hill portion of the show. Perhaps the jewel of the evening was Filkow (I really hope he runs another 'Geezers' Yoga class) showing off his considerable yogic talents hovering above a splayed out Chalmers dressed up as a shall we say — matronly — female, all performed on top of a very spindly kitchen table. Homegrown yoga positions

such as "Beaver Point" and "Mount Bruce" were demonstrated. Use your imagination here.

In this age of political correctness, anything goes when you are parodying your own race, religion, gender or profession. Frankly, I don't know how comfortable I would be sitting in the audience had I been of East Indian origin. For better or worse, cultural sensitivities have evolved into hypersensitivities over the past decade. Just ask Salmond Rushdie.

A somewhat abbreviated second half was given over to improvisation, courtesy of Q&As from the audience. As Chalmers explained, the evening's performance was the first to be taped for the upcoming Salt Spring radio station.

This may well explain the relative dearth of sight gags and the enthusiastic audience participation via the Q&A format. Sight gags don't play well through home stereo. On the other hand, everyone looks good on radio.



Meditate, appreciate, cry

Thompson show renews love and grounds present

Oft times it takes an outside perspective to allow us to see clearly; a disruption to our everyday patterns of experiencing and knowing present the world in fresh light.

Diana Lynn Thompson's installation Being Here, composed at the invitation of The Point Gallery, brings about the change that allows a renewed appreciation of life on the island, while at the same time promoting a meditative tranquillity.

Thompson is well known as an artist who is skilled at whatever medium she takes up. Her materials and approach change with each project, and she has often incorporated a political or environmental message.

Being Here is Thompson's first solo show on Salt Spring since 1990. She has spent many years travelling with her art, and was regularly booked two years in advance until a house fire upended her life in 2006. Thompson has only recently been getting back onto her artistic feet, contributing sculptural works to last year's group show Salvaged.

The invitation by The Point Gallery's owner/curator Margaret Day, who Thompson calls "a great patron of the arts," gave the artist the space to create a solo show celebrating her home.

Many artists and friends were on hand for Sunday's opening reception. While several people recalled other of Thompson's works that had moved them in the past, all were completely taken with the current installation.

One visitor was overheard saying, "I've never seen anything more joyful that makes me want to cry."

fellow artist, said he thought the work was among Thompson's best.

"I think it is transcendental. The level of design is so subtle and precise. It's ethereal."

As Day observed, the physical beauty of this work makes it an easy show to appreciate. Entering the shadowing lower level from the bright light outside, one's breath is taken away by the large floor piece to the left.

A large, black carpet has been covered by two large, connected patterns of white limpet shells, clam shells and porcelain pieces. Five circular shapes on the left and six on the right are placed together in mandalas. Concentric circles reduce the space inwards and are centred by smooth, inverted porcelain cones. The negative space of the black field found between each circle and each object is as important as the individual points of light.

Thompson's placement of the shells is precise and striking in white on black, capable of producing a meditative effect after a few minutes of looking. She spent four and a half days composing this piece, using shells she has collected over a lifetime on the West Coast. Despite a long creative process that began in February, Thompson feels the impermanence of the work is partly why it works so well.

crush it.

In Being Here II, Thompson has hung hundreds of shells and handmade porcelain objects from linen thread, four or five layers deep along an 18-foot stretch of gallery wall.

The porcelain cones and squiggles suggest forms from the natural world without imitating them, while the natural, slightly off-white colour of all the pieces creates subtle variations in light and perception. The shadows created by track lighting add additional layers of depth.

Another piece on the floor again suggests a mandala. It's made of dozens of shallow porcelain bowls, from tiny to cup-sized. Most are off-white, some are more white, and some have just the subtlest hint of soft green. A few of the bowls have tiny shells inside.


Although Being Here reveals the artist's meticulous control of her materials, the actual designs were all of the moment during her eight days installing the work, as initial ideas did not necessarily work with the gallery space.


"Part of why an installation is an installation is because you are responding to where you are," Thompson explained.

"People say it would take a lot of patience, but to me it's just love. When I'm doing installations, I'm completely focussed. I'm not being pulled here and pulled there, there's no phone ringing.

"There's something so calming about putting things in order."

Serendipity creates amazing show

Photosynthesis features work of 25 photographers

One of Salt Spring's most eagerly anticipated large group exhibitions opens at ArtSpring for the eighth year on Tuesday, Aug. 12.

Work of 25 Salt Spring photographers will be displayed at Photosynthesis, beginning with the opening reception from 5-8 p.m. on Tuesday, and then daily until Sept. 2.

"Its appeal is often attributed to the participants being a loose connection of artists with dissimilar tastes who appreciate each other's work and trust to serendipity that when the prints arrive the morning of the show they will, when hung on the wall, coalesce into a unique if somewhat anarchical representation of the best photography on the island," explains a press release.

"The photographs will be slices of time taken from the world around us. As David Borrowman recalls, "I met Kim Kornbacher at the mailbox one evening and she said, 'I've rented ArtSpring for three weeks in July, now what do we do?"

Borrowman suggested calling a meeting, which was done, and various

names were suggested as possible participants. The show's success means more people now want to take part than space permits at ArtSpring.

Harold and Kumar 2: Escape From Guantanamo Bay

Harold and Kumar 2: Escape From Guantanamo Bay suffers from from the problem so common to comedy els: the filmmakers care more about recycling jokes from the original than they do about making a half-decent

The first effort, Harold and Kumar Go To White Castle, had our pot-addled heroes (John Cho as the neurotic Asian guy Harold, Kal Penn as the id-ruled Indian Kumar) on a New Jersey-wide search for a White Castle Restaurant to satiate their munchies. It ended with Harold finally making a connection with hottie Latino Maria (Paula Garces), but she left for Amsterdam at the last minute.

As the sequel starts, H & K are heading to said pot capital of the world to chase her down. Disaster strikes when the two are misidentified as

terrorists on the airplane ("it's a bong, not a bomb," says a stoned Kumar) and taken by a bullish federal agent named Rob Fox (the Daily Show's Rod Corddry) to Guantanamo Bay for interrogation.

Of course they escape and a wild trip from Cuba to Miami to Alabama to Texas begins, the two hoping that Kumar's ex-girlfriend's soon-to-behubby can use his connections with the Bush government to try and fix everything. Along the way they'll meet a friendly black orthodontist, Guccisporting rednecks, soft-hearted Klu Klux Klan members, and just maybe Dubya himself.

The first film was really funny, and the filmmakers this time around are hoping to continue its irreverent take on American racism while adding a touch of criticism towards the Bush administration's war

But Harold and Kumar 2 never really comes together, for it has no heart. I hated both the main characters . . . Kumar is an insufferable, stupid ierk and Kumar is a whining pain in the butt. It's quite a change from the first, in which their gentle winningness helped us sympathize as their inane odyssey in search of burgers went from weird to crazy to downright ludicrous.

It doesn't help that the sequel is so full of "oh hey, I remember that guy!" cameos from the first film as well as oodles of boring bodily-function jokes. Combined, they really rob the story of any sense of integrity or purpose.

Yeah, yeah, I know... it's a "stoner" film, but I could have been as high as Willie Nelson and Cheech Marin's genetically engineered baby and would still have laughed at H & K 2 only a few more times.

Ancient Bloodlines Trilogy launched

North Pender writer's work for young readers now available

Magic, mysticism and mayhem: young readers will find this and more in the first two books of the Ancient Bloodlines Trilogy: The Power of the Dark, and Shadow of the Swords, by North Pender Island writer Barry Mathias.

Although these two novels were published this year and enjoyed a successful launch last month, The Power of the Dark is actually a revision of an earlier book, apparently already in use in some B.C. schools. It's not difficult to see why. In these times of religious zealots and murder in the name of God, books with subtle messages of tolerance and humanity are good things to put in the hands of youth.

In the first novel, readers are introduced to the mysterious John, who seems to have no idea of his parentage and only scant memory of his past. In true romantic form, he attempts to rescue a beautiful young girl from the clutches of a massive and fearful stranger and he becomes the temporary owner of a powerful sword, and for a short time, a leader of men. But he's only a boy, and boys need to grow up, no matter how special they are. There are mistakes to be made and wisdom to be slowly and painfully acquired.

It's England in 1112, 13 years after the fall of Jerusalem at the end of the First Crusade, an unsafe and hostile period. Gwen, the daughter of a blacksmith, is adored by her father, Tom, but ignored by her mother. Schooled by the local priest, she has entered the forest to gather flowers for the church when the dark monster swoops down on her.

She'll be captured, knocked unconscious, rescued, hunted, and recaptured before the day is through. She'll face hunger, thirst, a raging forest fire, betrayal and more, but she'll still notice the handsome lad who pops up now and again with fumbling rescue plans. For his part, the would-be rescuer will fare only slightly better. Nothing much is going right for this pair, but in the process they are beginning to realize they may be larger than life.

In Shadow of the Swords, which ricochets back and forth from John's story to Gwen's, and expands to France, Cyprus and Jerusalem, the pair are largely apart, reuniting only at book's end. It's 1112, and during the next two years, John will experience love, assassination attempts from an unlikely source and new friendships. He'll find a home with a lord, Ralph d'Escosse, whose life he saves during a surprise attack at Stonehenge. It's this rescue that's later responsible for the two young men winding up in the Holy Land where John is finally reunited with Gwen.

She, in the meantime, was unwillingly spirited away from her beloved father by the Knights of the Order, fell gravely ill during the voyage to "safety," was reunited with a devoted old friend, and taken to a convent in France. For 18 months she has been eagerly devouring knowledge while challenging and repudiating many aspects of the Christian education the nuns have been trying to give her in preparation for her new role — a role she still doesn't understand.

So are these Knights of the Order friend or foe? What do they have to do with the Crusades? Who is the mysterious Tegwin, and will John see Owl again, or the Pagan Priestess and Ralph's sister, the beautiful Aelfreda? What is the connection between Gwen and John? Will they be able to acknowledge their love? All will be revealed in the third book, Mathias promises, and he is already hard at work on it. The Keeper of the Grail is slated for publication next year.


